

# **Being Trustworthy**

In today's gospel, Jesus shares the parable about the "Unjust Steward" who thinks quickly on his feet after being caught cheating his employer. To save his reputation and his honor, he quickly negotiates debts to make the best of a not-so-good situation. The employer doesn't praise him for his dishonesty, but he does like his ingenuity. The unjust steward was shrewd, astute; prudent. Jesus goes on to make his point: "The children of this world are more prudent in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light" (Luke 16:8), which is a way of saying that Christians should be just as practical as those who only think of themselves. As Catholics, we can be quick on our feet, too; just as quick as the dishonest. Instead of using our talent and gifts thinking just about ourselves and what's in it for us, we can think of others. Instead of being "unjust stewards" we can be "just stewards," making the world a better place.

That leads to Jesus' sayings about being trustworthy. If you Google "being trustworthy" this insightful piece of wisdom suddenly appears: "The Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines trustworthiness as being worthy of confidence and being dependable. It can also be described as being reliable, responsible, safe, secure, and steady. Trustworthiness is one of the most important qualities in life. It is the quality on which all relationships are built."

I really like that description because it makes Jesus' point and it's prudent advice. Jesus says that if we're trustworthy in small things, we'll be trustworthy when it comes to bigger things. I think we learn that from an early age. And if we've been blessed, we've had mentors who have instilled that trait within us. Being trustworthy makes us honest, dependable, and someone people can rely on.

We may like the cleverness of someone "who gets away with it" (whatever "it" may be), even admire it; but we trust the one who is forthright, dependable, honest and authentic. That's what it means to be "a child of the light."





"You cannot serve both God and mammon." Merriam-Webster defines mammon as material wealth or possessions, especially having a debasing influence. While God does not take issue with our need to use money for the business of our lives, there can be a problem with the attitudes we bring to it. We can easily become so preoccupied and obsessed with money that it becomes the real "god" we worship. Do we serve mammon instead of God? In their book, Wealth, Riches and Money, Craig Hill and Earl Pitts outline symptoms of mammon's influence in our lives. Some of these are worry and anxiety over money, money mismanagement, fear over "never having enough," an "I can't afford it" mentality, impulse buying, stinginess, greed, debt, and discontent.

Many of the things on that list can consume us to the point that we are distracted from what we really need to be doing. Many people spend an inordinate amount of time worrying about money and it becomes the source of their worst fears. If we are honest with ourselves, we need to admit that

we place far more emphasis on our material securities than we ought. In fact, we have actually convinced ourselves that we cannot live without it. Are we that certain about the presence of God? Many of the world's problems, especially those involving inequity and injustice, result from conflicts about money. Many equate money with happiness. Those successful in accumulating large amounts of it quickly realize just how wrong they are.

"Your ultimate allegiance is not to the government, not to the state, not to nation, not to any man-made institution. The Christian owes his ultimate allegiance to God, and if any earthly institution conflicts with God's will it is your Christian duty to take a stand against it. You must never allow the transitory evanescent demands of man-made institutions to take precedence over the eternal demands of the Almighty God (Martin Luther King, Jr.)." This is the point Jesus is trying to make. Unfortunately, when we look around our man-made kingdoms are far more prevalent than God's kingdom. When we start seeing greater evidence of justice, equity, dignity, respect, opportunity, gentleness, holiness, solidarity, honesty, simplicity, care for creation, and a decrease in ambition, then we will know that God's kingdom is being served. We will be doing what we are supposed to do.

# Beyond Criticism and Anger—The Invitation to a Deeper Empathy By Ron Rolheiser, OMI

Recently I attended a symposium where the keynote speaker was a man exactly my age. Since we had both lived through the same cultural and religious changes in our lives, I resonated with much of what he said and with how he felt about things. And in his assessment of both the state of affairs in our politics and our churches today, he was pretty critical, even angry. Not without reason. In both our governments and our churches today there isn't just a bitter polarization and an absence of fundamental charity and respect, there's also a lot of seemingly inexcusable blindness, lack of transparency, and self-serving dishonesty. Our speaker was plenty eager to point these out.

And for the most part, I agreed with him. I feel the same way that he does. The current state of affairs, whether you're looking at politics or the churches, is depressing, bitterly polarized, and cannot but leave you feeling frustrated and accusatory at those whom you deem responsible for the blindness, dishonesty, and injustice that seem inexcusable. But, while I shared much of his truth and his feelings, I didn't share where he landed. He landed in pessimism and anger, seemingly unable to find anything other than indignation within which to stand. He also ended very negative in terms of his attitude towards those whom he blames for the problem.

I can't fault his truth and I can't fault his feelings. They're understandable. But I'm not at ease with where he landed. Bitterness and anger, no matter how justified, are not a good place to stay. Both Jesus and what's noble inside of us invite us to move beyond anger and indignation.

Beyond anger, beyond indignation, and beyond justified criticism of all that's dishonest and unjust, lies an invitation to a deeper empathy. This invitation doesn't ask us to be stop being prophetic in the face of what's wrong but it asks us to be prophetic in a deeper way. A prophet, as Daniel Berrigan so often said, makes a vow of love not of alienation.

But that's not easy to do. In the face of injustice, dishonesty, and willful blindness, all of our natural instincts militate against empathy. Up to a point, this is healthy and shows that we're still morally robust. We should feel anger and indignation in the face of what's wrong. It's understandable too that we might also feel some hateful, judgmental, thoughts towards those whom we deem responsible. But that's a beginning (a healthy enough starting point) but it's not where we're meant to stay. We're called to move towards something deeper, namely, an empathy which previously we did not access. Deep anger invites deep empathy.

At the truly bitter moments of our lives, when we're feeling overwhelmed by feelings of misunderstanding, slight, injustice, and rightful indignation and we're staring across at those whom we deem responsible for the situation, anger and hatred will naturally arise within us. It's okay to dwell with them for a time (because anger is an important mode of grieving) but, after a time we need to move on. The challenge then is to ask ourselves: How do I love now, given all this hatred? What does love call me to now in this bitter situation? Where can I now find a common thread that can keep me in family with those at whom I'm angry? How do I reach through, reach through the space that now leaves me separated by my own justified feelings of anger? And, perhaps most important of all: "From where can I now find the strength to not give into hatred and self-serving indignation?

How am I called to love now? How do I love in this new situation? That's the challenge. We've never before been called upon to love in a situation like this. Our understanding, empathy, forgiveness, and love have never before been tested in this way. But that's the ultimate moral challenge, the "test" that Jesus himself faced in Gethsemane. How do you love when everything around you invites you to the opposite?

Almost all of our natural instincts militate against this kind of empathy, as does most everything around us. In the face of injustice our natural instincts spontaneously begin, one by one, to shut the doors of trust and make us judgmental. They also invite us to feel indignation and hatred. Now those feelings do produce a certain catharsis in us. It feels good. But that kind of cathartic feeling is a drug that doesn't do much for us long range. We need something beyond feelings of bitterness and hatred for our long range health. Empathy is that something.

While not denying what's wrong, nor denying the need to be prophetic in the face of all that's wrong, empathy still calls us to a post-anger, a post-indignation, and a post-hatred. Jesus modeled that for us and today it's singularly the most needed thing in our society, our churches, and our families.



# **Our Annual Parish Financial Report**

As we continue to make our way forward through the challenges and aftereffects of the COVID-19 shutdown, we hold onto our parish mission: Building up the Body of Christ with Welcoming Arms, Loving Hearts and Joyful Worship. We're truly grateful to everyone who has helped us financially through your donations and gifts, which help support our liturgical and worship life, pastoral ministries, community outreach, and our commitment to education.

As you look through the Annual Report, you'll see that our regular Sunday and other parish collections were up at the close of the fiscal year and closer to the pre-pandemic level.

You'll also notice that we're just short of 80% collected on our 2020 Vision Capital Campaign. We're very grateful to everyone who has stayed committed to the campaign, even during the height of the pandemic. The savings we have will help us with the Fire Sprinkling System. Our Building Committee is currently developing a proposal for bids. We also have the funds to complete a renovation of the front office/reception area of the Parish Ministry Center, which was one of the goals of the campaign.

We still have our challenges. The church and school combined left us with a deficit of \$495,069. We needed to rely on a withdrawal from our education endowment fund once again to help us offset the deficit, while also allowing us to put funds in reserve for needed campus repairs. In the two previous fiscal years we received forgivable loans through the federal government's Payroll Protection Plan so we didn't have to withdraw as much from the endowment.

In terms of the school, earlier this year we developed a Three-Year Plan, which we presented to the Bishop and Archdiocese to help us navigate specific goals. We have increased our marketing efforts to boost enrollment, which is very much needed. As you may have noticed, our school enrollment has been decreasing over time. We finished the year with 204 students, but currently are just under 200. We continue to work on this. Because of the current Renew My Church conversations, we're also in conversation with the area parishes on how to help us support the school more effectively.

In the pages that follow, you will have the ability to look at our actual income received and expenses paid for the past three fiscal years. You will also see the budget for the current fiscal year. The fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30.

We continue moving forward, anchored to our mission to "build up the Body of Christ" through all the ways we provide ministry, educate our youth, serve one another, and worship God.

# Teen Dating, Unhealthy Relationships and Violence

Unhealthy relationships can start early and last a lifetime. Teens often think some behaviors, like teasing and name calling are a "normal" part of a relationship.

However, these behaviors can become abusive and develop into more serious forms of violence. That is why parents and other adults need to talk to teens now about the importance of developing healthy, respectful relationships.

Teen dating violence is defined as the physical, sexual, psychological or emotional violence within a dating relationship—including stalking. It can occur in person or electronically, and might occur between a current or former dating partner.

Teaching your teenager how to communicate with his/her partner, how to manage uncomfortable emotions like anger and jealousy, and how to treat others with respect are a few ways to keep relationships healthy and non-violent.

It is extremely important to help your teen recognize any signs of abuse being done to themselves or anyone around them. In particular, sexual abuse, blackmail or harassment, which may not be as recognizable to your teen. It is most helpful to educate yourself and your teen with regard to the warning signs.

Dating violence and unhealthy relationships can be prevented when teens, families and organizations work together to implement effective prevention strategies.
