The Here & Now

Jesus shares another parable in today's gospel, the parable of Lazarus and the rich man. Lazarus (which means "God has helped") is poor. What Jesus sets up is an extreme difference—a type of chasm—between the two that didn't have to be there. The rich man is very rich—Jesus gives details about his extravagant lifestyle—while the poor man is very poor, very hungry and very neglected.

As Catholics, the thing that tugs at our heart is that the rich man isn't even aware of the poor man who sits outside his house; a man who is starving who he practically climbs over each day. In terms of a human connection, or a desire to help, the rich man had none, while Lazarus was dying to be noticed by him.

When the two men eventually die, the rich man goes to the netherworld while the poor man is carried to the "bosom of Abraham." Everything is reversed. The rich man now begs for help from Lazarus in his poverty and his thirst. But, what is done is done. The chasm is still there—it was dug by the rich man and remains. It's the rich man whose eyes have been open and is on the other side and there's nothing more than to live inside of the reality and choice he made.

I have to admit, the parable still shocks me because our heart goes out to the rich man who is now left out and looking for help. How could God ignore it? I read an interesting commentary that opened my own eyes. In the parable, the rich man doesn't show remorse or a sense of failed responsibility for another human being. Instead, he's still negotiating to get what he wants. The key to living in the Kingdom of God is realizing we're part of the goodness of humanity—we live the reality that we're meant to be together and we're meant to help each other, which starts in the here and now. God doesn't force us to choose the way of life he offers us, but, certainly, has let us know He desires it. We make the choice.

When our heart is open to it, and we see the world the way God is urging us to see it, we understand Jesus' cry to change our way of seeing. Instead of always looking inward, we look outward and begin to notice others. And then, we even take the next step and help.

That's why, as a Church, we have a heart for the poor and those in need. Our monthly food drives and the drives we have for needed essentials are always overflowing. We're not turning our eyes to the reality of people who are struggling or hurting. We're helping, and that's why our ministries like Right to Life, Domestic Violence Outreach and the new Social Outreach Ministry help us stay aware of the issues that affect the human person and what we can do. By noticing, we begin to develop a desire within the heart to create what the Church calls a "preferential option for the poor," which mirrors God's desire to embrace everyone.

We reach out. We notice. We help—and the greatest thing of all, as a parish, we do it together. And, it makes a difference.

"If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead." Regardless of how the message of faith is received, a total conversion of mind and heart is needed for it to take root and have meaning. It is easy to become complacent and comfortable with all that life can afford us. Life can become "all about me," preserving my livelihood and protecting my securities. Often, this drive can become so strong that we eagerly strive to protect our self-interests at the expense of others. Other people are necessary only to the extent that they are "useful" to us and profitable.

Merriam-Webster defines entitlement as "the belief that one is deserving of or entitled to certain privileges." In a world that pretends to offer us so many necessities, this is perhaps the greatest contemporary sin. When we feel

"entitled" to something, even if it is perceived necessary, our relationships can get skewed. Unless we adopt a global vision of entitlement wherein everyone is entitled to the same things, we risk becoming extremely self-focused and selfish. All we care about is defending our rights and protecting our turf. This impulse can be so strong that we pursue it even at the expense of another. Is this what God intends for his children?

Holding on to this myopic vision, the plight and station of others are off our radar and of no real concern to us. Relying on our own merits and becoming resilient to life's challenges, we replace the true and real God with the one we created ourselves. Jesus and the prophets before him have consistently reminded us of the dangers of wealth, ignoring the poor and the needy, and becoming too fiercely independent and arrogant. Yet, we conduct our lives as if that message has never been preached. We give our faith a nod and never consider for a moment that we may be wrong in terms of what we see as important. "The things that we love tell us what we are (attributed to St. Thomas Aquinas)." Ponder those words a bit and remember that when we leave this world and go to the next one, what we loved here is what we will look for there. What we sought here may not be there.

The Danger of Riches

"Nobody gets to heaven without a letter of reference from the poor!" That's an axiom attributed to James Forbes, the pastor of Riverside Church in New York City.

He's right. If Jesus is to be believed, then we need to believe that the poor stand before us always as that place where we are judged. We get to heaven (or don't) on the basis of our response to the poor. The cross of Christ is the key to life and the cross is forever being erected at that place where the excluded ones, the poor, suffer. Only at that place can we learn the crucified-wisdom that, at the end of day, puts us inside the circle of discipleship, or, stated in another way, opens up for us the gates of heaven.

But, as we know, it's not easy to actually feed the hungry, clothe the naked, console the sorrowful, or help the downtrodden. Why?

Mainly because we never see them. We think we do, but in reality we don't. In fact, that's the point the gospels make when they point out the dangers of riches, namely, wealth blinds us so that we don't see the poor.

We see this clearly in the famous, gospel parable about the rich man who dines sumptuously every day, while a poor man, Lazarus, sits under his table and eats the crumbs that fall there. The rich man dies and goes to Hades and, from there, he finally sees Lazarus – implying that he had never seen him before even though Lazarus had sat just a few feetaway from him during his life.

John Donahue, a biblical scholar, makes this point about that parable: "The rich man is condemned not because he is rich but because he never saw Lazarus at his gate: the first time he sees him is from Hades, emphasized by the somewhat solemn phrase, 'He lifted up his eyes, and saw'. Here the text is bitterly ironic. In life there was a chasm between himself and Lazarus because of wealth and power; in death this chasm still exists."

The real danger of wealth is that it causes a "blindness" that renders us incapable of seeing the poor. Jean Vanier, in the Massey Lectures at the University of Toronto in the late 1990s, made the same point: The "great chasm that can't be bridged", he suggests, exists already now, in the present distance between the rich and poor. The next life simply eternalizes a present situation where the rich and poor are separated in a way so that one cannot cross over to the other. Why?

According to the gospels, the major reason is that the rich simply don't see the poor.

It is easy to miss the point here: Jesus isn't saying that wealth is bad. Nor is he saying that the poor are virtuous and the rich are not. Indeed the rich are often just as virtuous in their private lives as the poor. We sometimes naively glamorize poverty, but poverty isn't beautiful and, often times, isn't particularly moral either. A lot of violence, crime, sexual irresponsibility, domestic breakdown, drug abuse, and ugliness of all kinds, happens on the poorer side of the tracks. The rich are no worse than the poor, in these things.

But where the rich are worse is in vision, eyesight. When we are rich, we have a congenital incapacity to see the poor and, in not seeing them, we never learn the wisdom of the crucified. That's why it's hard, as Jesus said, for a rich person to enter the kingdom of heaven.

That's also why it's hard for rich nations and rich individuals to reach across the great divide that separates us from the poor. We try, but in the richest nation in the world, the United States, one in every six children still falls below the poverty line and, worldwide, despite all the resources and good-will on this planet, one billion people subsist on less than a dollar a day and thirty thousand children die every day from diseases that could easily be prevented by simply supplying clean drinking water. There's a gap that we can't find a way to cross.

We see – but we don't see! We feel for the poor – but we don't really feel for them! We reach out – but we never reach across. The gap between the rich and poor is in fact widening, not narrowing. It's widening worldwide, between nations, and it's widening inside of virtually every culture. The rich are becoming richer and the poor are being left ever further behind. Almost all the economic boom of the last twenty years has sent its windfall straight to the top, benefiting those who already have the most.

What Jesus asks of us is simply that we see the poor, that we do not let affluence become a narcotic that knocks out our eyesight. Riches aren't bad and poverty isn't beautiful. But, nobody gets to heaven without a letter of reference from the poor.

Renew My Church Update

You're Invited to a Parish Town Hall Meeting: September 26 @ 7pm in the Church

Saint Hubert Parish is currently involved in an Archdiocese of Chicago program called Renew My Church. It's a process that Cardinal Cupich launched in 2016 to face the realities of our Church in Cook and Lake Counties as we prepare for the future. It's our time to go through this process here in Hoffman Estates and Schaumburg, which involves Saint Hubert, Church of the Holy Spirit, Saint Marcelline and Saint Matthew.



All four parishes have been recently involved in discussions about how our four parishes could be structured so that we can best serve the needs of the area and our school. It's lent itself to a time of feedback, discussion and discernment—trying to prayerfully look at what is viable and prudent.

Last Monday the Archdiocese presented the four parishes with some scenarios to react to and discuss, which needs to happen before a recommendation by the grouping is made to the Cardinal for his final decision. The Cardinal wants feedback from the parishes as part of his own decision-making process.

After initial discussions with the four parishes, we met with our parish leaders last Thursday to get their input. And now on Monday, September 26 at 7PM you are invited to a Parish Town Hall meeting to open up the discussion to anyone interested in learning more and providing feedback. We hope you'll be able to join us.


