We Keep Going!

The readings today talk about the importance of persistence--first in our prayer life for sure, but really in all of life. Talk to any accomplished athlete, entrepreneur, business leader, educator, actor, scientist, student...you name it...and they will tell us perseverance and persistence is part of success.

It's true in our human endeavors, but it's also true in anyone growing in the spiritual life. Just when we feel disheartened and want to give up, perseverance is the very thing that keeps us going. God knows we need it!

In the first reading, as long as Moses kept his hands raised in prayer looking over the battlefield, the Hebrew people had the upper hand. Dedicated to his people, Moses spent hours in prayer, lifting up his arms toward heaven, praying for success, holding the staff God gave him—the staff that God promised would show His power and protection. Moses persevered, but he didn't do it for himself. He did it out of love for God's people. We will persevere when something means something important to us, and especially if we're looking out for others.

In the second reading, Paul talks about how important holding onto God's word is in all of life. It informs us, teaches us, motivates us, and keeps us going. It's no wonder during the times we need to persevere, we hold onto a scripture verse or passage that means something to us. For me, it's Paul's "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" (Phil 4:13). It keeps me going, especially when things get hard and I need to hold onto hope.

In the gospel, Jesus gives us the parable about the persistent widow who doesn't stop seeking justice from a judge who seems ambivalent. Eventually, the judge—worn down—rules in her favor. One of the points Jesus is trying to make, is to encourage us to keep asking, keep seeking, keep going when it comes to our prayer and our relationship with God, which is about faithfulness. Never give up. Persist. Try. Ask. Do what you can. Respond. React. And keep going. We can do it because we have an Advocate on our side (see John 14:16).

Odds & Ends

- **Renew My Church.** We've compiled all the responses we received from everyone from the parish. Thank you for taking the time to share your insights and thoughts on the five scenarios. It helps us ensure we have the sense of what you're thinking and what's on your mind as we go into discussions with the other parishes. The four Grouping Feedback & Discernment Teams will meet here at Saint Hubert on Monday to discuss the scenarios further as we work to draft a report to the Archdiocese.
- **Parking Lot & Campus Improvements.** This past Monday, some asphalt repairs to the parking lot and some concrete replacements were completed to help make the campus safer. Now completed, the next step will be the resealing of the parking lot and (finally!!) re-striping the parking spaces.
- **Sprucing Up the School.** We're grateful to our Eagle Scout candidates who did some painting around the outside of the school. Michael Kennedy and his team reapplied the yellow caution paint to curbs and steps and safety zones (and raised enough funds to help replace some of the trees we lost during the summer storms), while Kyle Wang and his team repainted the outside school classroom panels. Thank you for supporting their efforts, which in turn has helped improve our campus!

We persevere in faith and the strength that comes in being together in prayer.

Brendan wouldn't stop. He continued nagging his mom to let him have a little more time with his phone. He knew the rules but wanted to finish a game and text a few more friends. He begged, had a temper tantrum, pleaded, screamed, pouted, and used every means he could think of to get Mom to change her mind. Mom had a busy day and was tired. At first, she held her ground. Then, her son's persistence got the best of her, and she caved. “Brendan, you can have 30 more minutes and no more!” she retorted. Brendan’s determination paid off. He won.

Is this how it works with God too? If we want something enough and feel it is our due, does our persistence allow us to eventually get our way? Judging God by human standards, it would seem so. But is this the way God works? It gets a bit confusing when Jesus tells his disciples to “pray always without becoming weary” and then further tells them how God will “secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night.” If we catch God at the right time, when he’s having a weak moment, then our tenacity ought to pay off. What we want, we will get. Really? Sadly, the way many approach prayer suggests that this is precisely how it goes.

Good parents set boundaries and offer proper discipline. They learn the art of being steadfast when presented with determined minds and wills. They know what is best and, at times, have to say “no.” God is always there with His full attention and unconditional love showering itself upon us. God also knows what is best. And, as with any good parent, the one constant that is always available and never withheld is love. We can be as persistent and determined as we want if what we are seeking is God’s love. We are never a bother and requests for God’s love are never denied. This is the prayer of the heart. Desiring God alone and not only what we want God to do for us places this love relationship foremost in our minds, hearts, and souls. God is never bothered by this prayer. As we breathe in and exhale out, the Divine Life freely flows.

Listening to Your Widows

A few years ago, I had a friend who, like Nicodemus with Jesus, would come to me at night. This scene though wasn't quite as pastoral as the biblical one. Mostly my friend came to drink and complain.

This was his issue: Publicly he was a very respected and successful man, in a position of authority with a number of persons working under him. To these, his employees, he was the penultimate nice guy. He doted on them and felt very good about himself because of this. This was, in fact, his pride. In his own eyes, because of the way he treated his employees and because of their subsequent affection for him, he was the most generous and kindly man on earth. He told me: "There isn't one of them, my employees, who wouldn't give me the shirt off his or her back. I've been good to everyone of them."

His problem wasn't there. It was at home with his family. He had a drinking problem and all the inconsistencies that come with that. Simply put, he was never as nice at home as he was at the office and his wife and kids were not nearly as adoring and generous with their praise as were his employees. His family loved him, but saw his weaknesses and suffered greatly from them. Hence, by them, he was constantly challenged, either by their direct comments to him about his inconsistencies or by their angry avoidance of him. This embittered him greatly. Here is how he would generally put things to me:

Everyone likes me, except my family. I suspect that it's because they can't deal with my popularity. I go to the office and there isn't one person there who isn't indebted to me, whom I haven't helped specially. We have a good atmosphere there. We laugh a lot and I'm appreciated. Then I go home ... well, everything changes! Half the time everyone is avoiding me. If I'm upstairs, they're all downstairs; if I'm downstairs, they're all upstairs. They're forever on my case about one thing or another. If I come home late a couple of times or miss a family thing I said I'd be there for it's as if committed murder in public. I am fed up with it, being the leper at home, just because I miss the odd thing. They don't love and appreciate me like the folks do at the office. I'm not asking for much at home, just a little understanding!"

A nice guy at office and an angry alcoholic at home! He didn't see the glaring inconsistency. For him, the problem was simply that his wife and children were not as appreciative of him as they should be and as he deserved.

Jesus once told a very similar story: Once upon a time there was a judge in a certain town. He was well respected by everyone and, in public, people used to bring out gifts and give them to him because, obviously, he had been good to them. Everyone respected him, except one widow to whom he hadn't given justice. She hounded him, demanding her just due. For a long time he avoided her and was irritated by her demands. Finally, he said to himself: "I fear neither God nor man, but if I don't give her justice she will hound me to death!" He gave her her due.

That parable has a double meaning. On the one hand, it is a parable about prayer. With it, Jesus tries to teach us that we should persevere in prayer: God is the judge and we are the widow. Wear God out and eventually God will give us what we ask for. But the parable is intended in a second way too: We are the judge and God is the widow. God's voice for us is particularly clear in the widows, in the hounds, in the poor, in those people who are not so impressed with our public persona. Simply put, one of God's important voices for us is to be heard in the persons who irritate us the most; for example, in that one particular person we would most like to avoid in life. In Christ's view of things God is both the one being asked and the one who is doing the asking. God is hounded and God hounds.

The moral of all this, then, is that we are asked to hear God's voice in the persons who upset us, that is, in those people who, for whatever reason, are not very impressed with us. Usually that is the people we live with. Obviously, the principle breaks down when that voice is an abusive one. The gospel does not ask us to let ourselves be abused, but it does ask us to make an option for the poor and that option, like the house of God itself, has many surprising rooms, some of which are not very romantic or much to our liking.

Thus, beware of the voice that humbles you: It might just be one of God's widows, puncturing your persona, and calling you to justice and honesty.

Myths Concerning Abuse In The Home - PART I

Myth: When a couple is having a domestic violence problem, it is just that they have a bad relationship. Often, it's poor communication that is the problem.

Fact: Bad relationships do not result in or cause domestic violence. The idea that bad relationships cause violence in the home is one of the most common and dangerous misconceptions about domestic violence. First, it encourages all parties involved - including and especially the survivor - to minimize the seriousness of the problem and focus their energies on "improving the relationship" in the false hope that this will stop the violence. It also allows the batterer to blame the bad relationship and the violence itself on the survivor, rather than acknowledging his/her own responsibility.

More importantly, improving the relationship is not likely by itself to end the violence. Violence is learned behavior. Many couples have had bad relationships yet never become physically violent. Many batterers are violent in every one of their relationships, whether they consider them bad or good. The violent individual is the sole source and cause of the violence, and neither his/her partner nor their relationship should be held responsible.
