

Joy to the World!

It's Christmas! We come together as a people of faith from all walks of life, from different backgrounds and cultures, to hear the Good News. Advent waiting has turned into Christmas joy. Isaiah's prophecy is fulfilled: A child is born to us, a Son given to us. He is the Prince of Peace, and his dominion is vast (see Isaiah 9:5-6).

Once Jesus was born, people began to flock to him—from the poorest shepherds who heard the news from angels, to the richest of wise men and kings who followed a star to be with him. We follow in those same footsteps. Instead of coming to the manger, we come to our sacred meeting place here at Saint Hubert, because here we find the Christ Child eager to be held. Here we hold his very presence in the palm of our hands in Communion with Him. We take His being into the very being of our own lives. We don't just come to see Him, but to be with Him.

In the past two and a half years, we've experienced Christmases like none other in recent history. Because of the pandemic, many of us had to stay apart from this sacred place. In 2020 not all of us had a "reservation at the inn," so we couldn't be here. But through the hard realities we faced, we found ways to connect and stay together. And so, as we gather this year, after all we experienced, we can't help but feel the joy of being together.

Like Joseph and Mary experienced, the Christ child was born in the midst of uncertainty at a time and place no one expected. Joy was experienced because Jesus was born, not because the world was perfect or the conditions around them were ideal.

Jesus comes to us as we are, where we are. He comes to us in what may be the lowest of low times or the times of our greatest highs. He comes into the hearts of those who want to be with Him; to experience the kind of peace only He can give. He comes to those who need to feel loved. And nothing is meant to get in the way of that.

We're blessed because we're able to come to our parish home—to experience the joy of Christmas. And if only for an hour or so, we have the ability to find the peace that comes in being with the Christ Child, who draws us together. We've prepared a place for him to enter into our lives.

*Joy to the world, the Lord is come!
Let earth receive her King.
Let every heart prepare him room.
And heaven and nature sing!*



As we age, time seems to pass more quickly. Years seemingly fly by as one holiday flows into the next, January quickly becomes December and life maintains its hectic pace. What do we accomplish in all of that busyness? Perhaps technology is responsible for some of the frenzy, keeping us isolated in our social media worlds, communicating through texts rather than in person, and always connected to world events. We're over stimulated in many ways by information, noise, opinions, and ideologies. Yet, we still find the time to decorate our homes, purchase gifts, and plan Christmas gatherings. We know, however, that the true meaning of Christmas is not found in twinkling lights, beautifully adorned trees, perfectly set tables or exchanged gifts. We are being called to something deeper and more authentic.

Christmas reminds us to look for God along the way of our lives and not get distracted by the illusions around us. Our world's complexity can leave us feeling displaced, desperate, alone, neglected, and unimportant. Joseph and Mary felt that way too. In the midst of all that captures and intrigues us in our self-created virtual worlds, is this longing for the anchor of faith to keep us grounded and make sense of it all. Only faith can give us the perspective to see what truly matters in life. We discover our divinely

blessed humanity. The uncertain and challenging journey to Bethlehem gives way to the tender moments of birth and its embrace. Christmas softens us and slows us down a bit. It shows us Jesus as the light who enlightens everyone. It shows us the truth.

The faith that comes from Christmas calms our fears and allows us to go into the nighttime of our lives courageously. We are never lost or alone. We need to stop and savor more of life's moments before they slip away in time. God is with us, loving us, and leading us where we need to be. God is born again and again in every soul willing to give birth to His presence. God connects us and provides us with a place where we feel safe and welcome: home. Merry Christmas!

The Double Message of Christmas

I've never been happy with some of my activist friends who send out Christmas cards with messages like: *May the Peace of Christ Disturb You!* Can't we have one day a year to be happy and celebrate without having our already unhappy selves shaken with more guilt? Isn't Christmas a time when we can enjoy being children again? Moreover, as Karl Rahner once said, isn't Christmas a time when God gives us permission to be a happy? So why not?

Well, it's complex. Christmas is a time when God gives us permission to be happy, when the message from God speaks through the voice of Isaiah and says: "Comfort my people. Speak words of comfort!" But Christmas is also a time that points out that when God was born two thousand years ago there wasn't any room for him to be born in all the normal homes and places of the day. *There was no room for him at the inn.* Peoples' busy lives and expectations kept them from offering him a place to be born. That hasn't changed.

But first, the comfort of his birth: A number of years ago, I participated in a large diocesan synod. At one point the animator in charge had us divide into small groups and each group was asked to answer the question: What's the single most-important thing that the church should challenge the world with right now?

The groups reported back and each group named some important spiritual or moral challenge: "*We need to challenge our society towards more justice!*" "*We need to challenge the world to have real faith and not confuse God's word with its own wishes.*" "*We need to challenge our world towards a more responsible sexual ethos. We've lost our way!*" Wonderful, needed challenges, all of them. But no group came back and said: "*We need to challenge the world to receive God's consolation!*" Granted, there's a lot of injustice, violence, racism, sexism, greed, selfishness, sexual irresponsibility, and self-serving faith around; but most of the adults in our world are also living in a lot pain, anxiety, disappointment, loss, depression, and unresolved guilt. Everywhere you look, you see heavy hearts. Moreover, so many people living with hurt and disappointment do not see God and the church as an answer to their pain but rather as somehow part of its cause.

So our churches, in preaching God's word, need first of all to assure the world of God's love, God's concern, and God's forgiveness. Before doing anything else, God's word is meant to comfort us; indeed, to be the ultimate source of all comfort. Only when the world knows God's consolation will it accept the concomitant challenge.

And that challenge, among others, is to then make room for Christ at the inn, that is, to open our hearts, our homes, and our world as places where Christ can come and live. From the safe distance of two thousand years we too easily make a scathing judgment on the people at the time of Jesus' birth for not knowing what Mary and Joseph were carrying, for not making a proper place for Jesus to be born, and for not recognizing him as Messiah afterwards. How could they be so blind? But that same judgment is still being made of us. We aren't exactly making room in our own inns.

When a new person is born into this world, he or she takes a space where before there was no one. Sometimes that new person is warmly welcomed and a cozy, loving space is instantly created and everyone around is happy for this new invasion. But that isn't always the case; sometimes, as was the case with Jesus, there is no space created for the new person to enter the world and his or her presence is unwelcome.

We see this today (and this will constitute a judgment on our generation) in the reluctance, almost all over the world, to welcome new immigrants, to make room for them at the inn. The United Nations estimates that there are 19.5 million refugees in the world today, persons whom no one will welcome. Why not? We are not bad people and we are capable most times of being wonderfully generous. But letting this flood of immigrants enter our lives would disturb us. Our lives would have to change. We would lose some of our present comforts, many of our old familiarities, and some of our securities.

We are not bad people, neither were those innkeepers two thousand years ago who, not knowing what was unfolding, in inculpable ignorance, turned Mary and Joseph away. I've always nursed a secret sympathy for them. Maybe because I am still, unknowingly, doing exactly what they did. A friend of mine is fond of saying: "I'm against more immigrants being allowed in ... now that we're in!"

The peace of Christ, the message inside of Christ's birth, and the skewed circumstances of his birth, if understood, cannot but disturb. May they also bring deep consolation.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

We know that the Word was made flesh and made his dwelling among us. He walks with us. He sustains us. He gives us a hope that will not disappoint.

Join me in prayer this Christmas season. Let us ask God to deepen our faith in the Incarnate Word. Let us ask God to renew our hope and lift us up when we are weary. Let us ask God to keep our hearts joyful in all circumstances, because we have come to know God’s love for us.

God bless you and all your loved ones. As I celebrate the Eucharist in this Christmas season, know that I bring all of you to the altar with me.

Renew My Church: Waiting on the Holy Spirit

Our Grouping Feedback & Discernment Team presented to the Executive Committee of the Renew My Church Commission on December 15. It was a very good discussion about the local realities of our parishes and communities.

Next Steps:

1. The Executive Committee will form a recommendation for the full Renew My Church Commission.
2. The Commission will convene and discuss the recommendation, ensuring that the Grouping Team's feedback and the foundational principals for structural viability and vitality have been fully considered.
3. Per Canon Law (i.e., Church law), the Commission forwards the recommendation to the Presbyteral Council (an elected body of priests) for their consultation with Cardinal Cupich.
4. The Cardinal will discuss the recommendation with the Presbyteral Council and after this consultation, the Cardinal will make a final decision.
5. We expect to learn of the Cardinal's decision in January. As more details emerge specific to timing, we will share that with everyone.



What are we to do as we wait? When we feel that so much hangs in the balance? When we are uncertain as our Lord calls us to step out onto the water and meet Him? St. Paul tells us very directly: **"Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing."** (1 Th 5: 16-17)

Pray for Cardinal Cupich, our bishops, the Presbyteral Council, Church of the Holy Spirit, St. Marcelline, and St. Matthew, and the lay faithful who are leading the work of renewal within our archdiocese.

END OF YEAR GIFTS

Our parishioners are extremely generous. In addition to on-going donations of time, service, and helping those in need, some also ask how they can help give back in other ways. There are some short-term and long-term methods that some parishioners have used in the past, but are not always immediately known. As the holiday season and end of the year approaches, here are a few different vehicles some people have used for their charitable giving.

Tax Efficient Ideas

Please be sure to consult your tax accountant or financial advisors in regard to the effect of these ideas based on your individual income tax situation.

- **Invest In Kids Tax Credit Scholarship Act.** Contribute to a scholarship fund that will directly benefit Saint Hubert School families while reducing your state income tax bill. Beginning December 1 there is a 1:1 Matching Gift incentive for donations received through Empower Illinois—the organization that coordinates the scholarships. Donations will be matched up to \$75,000 school while funds remain available. For more information visit sthubertschool.org/tcs or scan the QR code.
- **Gifts from an IRA.** If you are over 70-1/2, you must take Minimum Required Distributions from your IRA or pay a penalty on the amount not taken. Funds transferred from the IRA directly to the parish by check or wire transfer are considered Qualified Charitable Distributions, which may be excluded from taxable income on the Federal and State of Illinois income tax returns up to \$100,000 annually.
- **Gifts of Appreciated Stock.** These may be tax advantageous when it comes to capital gains. The parish works through the Archdiocese of Chicago to accept gifts of stock or other securities. If this is of interest, please contact our parish Operations Director, Joyce Manfre, for more information.



Other Charitable Vehicles

- **Matching Gifts.** Parishioners and friends of the parish can double their gift to St. Hubert if their employer has a matching gift program. Contact your employer's HR or benefits manager to learn more.
- **Special Donations.** If you would like to make a special end-of-the-year donation, you can do so through the regular collections at Mass, electronically through Give Central at givecentral.org, through the mail, or dropping off a donation at the parish offices. The amounts received will be included on the contribution report you receive at year end.

Double your gift starting December 1!

Did you know you can support Catholic education and help provide direct scholarships for St. Hubert School students in need and receive a 75 credit on your Illinois state income taxes through the invest in

kids tax credit scholarship program? If you make your donation between between December 1 and March 31, 2023, **your donation will be doubled through the Archdiocese of Chicago's 1 for 1 Matching program.**

For example, if a person donates \$1,000, they will receive a state tax credit of \$750. Scan the QR code for more information. This means that your out of pocket donation has an 8 times impact on scholarships!

- If you already have an account, enter your username and password to verify.
- If you do **not** have an account, scroll down to the "Individuals" box on the left.

Step 2

Click on "Request a Letter ID."

Step 3

Enter your Social Security Number and one of the following:

- IL-PIN
- Most recent adjusted gross income
- IL driver's license number
- IL state identification number

Click "Submit" confirm your email address, then click "OK" and receive your confirmation.

Your Letter ID will arrive in the mail at the address on your previous year's tax return within 7-10 business days. The Letter ID expires 90 days from the date it is issued. 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
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
