Transfigured & Touched

It doesn't happen too often, but this year the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord has fallen on a Sunday. And so, we'll enter the mystery of this great feast today just as we also do each year on the 2nd Sunday of Lent.

This Sunday, we'll hear the account through the words of Matthew. Jesus took Peter, James and John with him to the top of a mountain. What we begin to notice, is that as the events unfold, it overcomes them. It's too much for them to take in—first the climb up the mountain, then the change in Jesus' appearance, followed by the appearances of Moses and Elijah, followed by the cloud that shadowed over them in which they actually heard God's voice.

Matthew tells us they fell down to the ground and covered their eyes. It was too much. He writes, "They were very much afraid." It was "awe-full"—meaning they were filled with awe beyond what they could possibly take in. They experienced a moment of heaven on earth.

But that's also when something touching happened, too. Just as quickly as the events unfolded before their eyes, the three were grounded again. Matthew tells us Jesus "touched them" and told them *not* to be afraid. When they looked up, it was just him—the One they climbed the mountain with. And then, together, they went down the mountain and back into the world. An ordinary day became extraordinary but not really ordinary again. The journey changed them.

In our Catholic faith, the Sacraments are moments when Jesus touches us, when heaven meets earth. It's when we feel his presence, his indwelling, his forgiveness, his healing, his confirmation of our faith; his affirmation of our vocation. For us, they're significant moments that, when they happen, can fill us with awe. Jesus touches us in his divinity, and then in our humanity he walks with us back into our normal, everyday lives. We experience a transfiguration moment—seeing Jesus as he truly is—human and divine and with us. And it can change us.

The Process of Experiencing Something New

As we unify Saints Matthew & Hubert, in some ways we're being transfigured, too. As we go through these months of what the Archdiocese calls "Data Gathering" we're looking to see how we can bring out the best in us to make our parish shine.

This Sunday you'll notice that we're launching the very first bulletin that has the same content for both churches. It's been a joint effort between our staffs, and we know that as we go along we'll need to continue to adjust and keep evaluating week after week. For instance, we're working with Steve Munoz of the Archdiocese, who is helping us with finances, on how best to report on financial matters like our weekly collections. Our two sites have handled it differently, so we'll work with the unified Finance Council to come up with a good format going forward. In the meantime, you can always call our offices if you have any questions.

Another thing that may be new to many of us is having a parish with a school. Our principal, Mrs. Julie Martin, gives us a "Report Card" today on page 8. She takes us through some of the good things that are taking place as we head into a new academic year. She'll also be available at the Sunday Masses at St. Matthew so that you can meet her and hear more from her.

Finally, if you need any help scheduling a baptism, wedding, or anything you normally need, please know that the offices at each site continue the same hours of service. We're ready to help.

As we continue on our own transfiguration journey, we take each step forward, together, as a community grounded in faith and hope. It's really good to be on this journey with you.

Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

What is Christianity finally about? These days if you ask almost anyone who doesn't know the Bible you'll probably hear an answer like this: "Being a good person" or "following the golden rule." No offense to the golden rule, but our faith is simply much stranger than that. This week's feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord is a luminous example of this. Jesus becomes radiantly and overwhelmingly beautiful. The glory of God literally shines forth from his body and even his clothes. Here we see that Christianity is not mainly a moral system, but a relationship with God in Christ, one that finally makes human beings gloriously beautiful.

Now we can see our good and bad deeds in a new and de-centered way. Our morality isn't about a heaven or hell scorecard. It's about lives open (or closed) to transfiguration, lives capable of revealing the glory of God in Christ to the world. Spouses, children, friends, co-workers, priests, consecrated women and men, and so on — we are all called to let the beauty of Jesus make our lives beautiful, little by little. His beauty in us is the center of our faith.

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5 Meditation: Ron Rolheiser, OMI

DOING VIOLENCE IN GOD'S NAME

Blaise Pascal once wrote: "Men never do evil so completely and cheerfully as when they do it from a religious conviction." How true! This has been going on since the beginning of time and is showing few signs of disappearing any time soon. We still do violence and evil and justify them in God's name.

We see countless examples of this in history. From the time that we first gained self-consciousness, we've done violence in God's name. It began by sacrificing human persons to try to attain God's favor and it led to everything from actively persecuting others for religious reasons, to waging war in God's name, to burning people for heresy at the Inquisition, to practicing capital punishment for religious reasons, and, not least, at one point in history, to handing Jesus over to be crucified out of our misguided religious fervor.

These are some salient historical examples; sadly not much has changed. Today, in its most gross form, we see violence done in God's name by groups like *Al-Qaida* and *Isis* who, whatever else might be their motivation, believe that they are serving God and cleansing the world in God's name by brute terrorism and murder. The death of thousands of innocent people can be justified, they believe, by the fact that this is God's cause, so sacred and urgent that it allows for the bracketing of all basic standards of humanity, decency, and normal religion. When it's for God's cause, outright evil is rationalized.

Happily, it's impossible for most of us to justify this kind of violence and murder in our minds and hearts, but most of us still justify this kind of sacrilegious violence in more subtle modes. Many of us, for instance, still justify capital punishment in the name of divine justice, believing that God's purposes demand that we kill someone. Many too justify abortion by an appeal to our God-given freedoms. Not least, virtually all of us justify certain violence in our language and discourse because we feel that our cause is so special and sacred that it gives us the right to bracket some of the fundamentals of Christian charity in our dealings with those who disagree with us, namely, respect and graciousness.

Our language, in both the circles of right and the left, is rife with a violence we justify in God's name. On the right, issues like abortion and the defense of dogma are deemed so important as to give us permission to demonize others. On the left, issues of economic and ecological injustice, because they so directly affect the poor, similarly give us permission to bracket respect and graciousness. Both sides like to justify themselves with an appeal to God's righteous anger.

There's a story in John's Gospel, delicious in its irony, which helps expose how we are so often blind to the violence we do in God's name. It's the famous incident of the woman who is caught in adultery. They bring her to Jesus and tell him that they caught her in the very act of committing adultery and that Moses commanded, in God's name, that women like this be stoned to death. Jesus, for his part, says nothing. He bends down and writes with his finger, twice, on the ground and then tells them the one among them who's without sin might cast the first stone. They understand the gesture: why he is writing on the ground, why he is writing twice, and what that means. What does it mean?

Moses went up a mountain and God, with his finger, wrote the Ten Commandments into two tablets of stone. As Moses approached the Israelite camp on his return, carrying the two tablets of stone, he caught the people in the very act of committing idolatry. What did he do? In a fit of religious fervor, he broke the Commandments, literally, physically, over the golden calf and then picked up the fragments and threw those stones at the people.

So here's the irony from which to draw a lesson: Moses was the first person to break the Ten Commandments. He broke them in God's name and then took the fragments and stoned the people. He did this violence in all sincerity, caught up in religious fervor. Of course, afterwards, he had to go back up the mountain and have the Commandments written a second time. However before giving Moses the Commandments a second time, God also gave him a lecture: Don't stone people with the Commandments! Don't do violence in my name!

We've been very slow to grasp this mandate and take it seriously. We still find every sort of moral and religious justification for doing violence in God's name. We are still, like Moses, smashing the Commandments on what we consider idolatrous and then stoning others with the fragments. This is evident everywhere in our religious and moral discourse, particularly in how we, as Pascal might put it, in God's name, "completely and cheerfully" bracket charity as it pertains to graciousness and respect.

Helping Hands Ministry



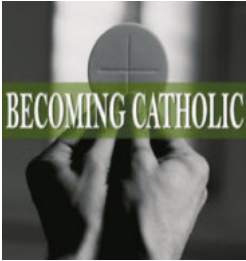

Adult Ministry of Initiation (AMI): Becoming A Catholic Inquiries Welcome



You may have a friend or family member who has never been baptized or was baptized in another Christian faith. An acquaintance or coworker may have asked you questions about the Catholic Church. Someone may indicate to you they are searching for a sense of

community or a desire to hear more of the Good News of Jesus, the Gospel.

They are all cordially invited to inquire about the Catholic Christian Faith by attending an inquiry session beginning **Tuesday August 29 at 7:00 PM**. This is their opportunity to ask questions about "Catholic things," such as what do Catholics believe and what do Catholics do? This is their opportunity to raise the issues that are on their minds or in their hearts. This is their chance to get information with no commitment!

Those who have never been baptized can investigate what it means to be Christian. Those baptized in another Christian tradition can explore the process to come into full communion with the Catholic Church. And those baptized Catholic as infants can learn about being Confirmed and receiving the Eucharist.

The three phases of the parish based process to become Catholic will be outlined. The first phase, appropriately called the period of inquiry, is an informal opportunity for interested individuals to begin the journey that may or may not result taking the next step toward full membership in the Church.

For those that choose, the next step is to enter the more formal process of the OCIA process (formerly RCIA) which begins in early December and culminates with the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation) that are celebrated at the Easter Vigil at the end of March.

The first step begins with you, today, as you invite your family members, friends, co-workers or others to explore what it means to be Catholic. We welcome all inquiries and look forward to accompanying you soon.

A Saint Hubert Catholic School Report Card

Summer is rapidly winding down and we are looking forward to August 21 when the hallways of St. Hubert Catholic School come to life once again with the laughter and enthusiasm of our students. We wanted to take this opportunity to share some good things that are happening.

Academic Excellence

Our students excel academically each year thanks to the love and dedication of our talented teachers who help every child succeed and grow in a safe and supportive environment. Each year the teachers and administrators put together a Continuous School Improvement plan utilizing data from our diagnostic personalized instruction tool, iReady, to pinpoint areas of strength and areas for improvement. This plan guides our academic goals for the upcoming school year.

St. Hubert School also received good news in the **5 Essentials Survey** of teachers, parents and students, a requirement for all Archdiocesan Catholic Schools and a tool for public schools as well. We were rated **Very Strong** in the area of Involved Families and **Strong** in the areas of Collaborative Teachers, Effective Leaders, and Ambitious Instruction. Research shows that schools that score strong on at least three of these five essentials are ten times more likely to show substantial gains in student learning.

This year St. Hubert School is part of a cohort of schools involved in the Archdiocese of Chicago's "Next Level" program. This program focuses some of our curricular programming on early childhood reading skills, especially on the phonological awareness to help even our youngest students.

Continued Expansion of our Technology Program

We are very proud of our expanding technology program that empowers our students to learn and practice skills they will need in the future to keep pace with the rapidly changing world of technology. We maintain our **1:1 iPad program** providing each student in grades K-8 with an iPad.

This year we have contracted with Education and Technology Professionals. This full-spectrum model is completely unique as it combines professional IT services with STEM education. The STEM curriculum includes things like digital citizenship, coding, 3D printing, engineering, robotics, and graphic design just to name a few. St. Hubert School is the first school in the state to sign with ETP and we are so excited for all of the opportunities ahead for our students.

We continue to be grateful for the giving spirit of the Ciampini Family, who through their ongoing generosity and passion for Catholic education provides us with added ability to implement, maintain, and grow our technology program for our students.

With these innovations, we aim to create an engaging and dynamic learning environment, empowering our students to thrive in the digital age.

Building Community and Fostering our Catholic Identity

We continue to prioritize building a strong community by emphasizing and promoting Catholic values in our mission to create a common atmosphere of purpose and identity among our students, staff, and families.

As a Catholic School community, we work each day to support our students on their faith journey. We foster a culture of prayer, worship and student participation. In addition to daily faith classes and prayer, we celebrate Mass weekly as a school community encouraging our students to participate in liturgical ministries including our student choir, lectoring and altar serving. We also come together for Reconciliation, to pray the Rosary, the Stations of the Cross, and for May Crowning.

We also look forward to providing more family experiences to enhance our faith journey. For instance, beginning in August we will have “Family Masses” on weekends throughout the school year where our students and families help as liturgical ministers.

Saint Hubert School provides a culture of care attentive to the fabric of relationships. We incorporate many opportunities for our students, teachers and families to connect with one another and support each other’s achievements. We hold a number of **Knights recognition pep rallies** where students in all grade levels are recognized for displaying our Saint Hubert Knightly values of compassion, perseverance, and service to others.

And thanks to **our awesome parent volunteers**, we have fun together at events like Track-a-Thon, Halloween Trunk or Treat, Christmas Bingo, lunch raffles, Family Dinner Nights, Athletics, STEM Night, Literacy Night, and our Spring Fundraiser.

Service to Others

Giving back and helping others is a guiding principle for our Saint Hubert students. We acknowledge and recognize ways to “**Be Kind**” which is a call that we answer each day.

Throughout the school year our students are involved in a variety of activities to help others. Our students in Grades 4-8 take a field trip **to Feed My Starving Children** in Schaumburg where they “turn hunger into hope” by packing nutritious meals for hungry children throughout the world.

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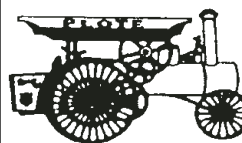
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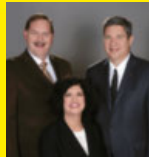
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
