Dear Parish Family,

I don't know about you, but there's something about this weekend's Gospel that kind of bugs me. Who in their right mind wouldn't be upset about getting equal pay with someone who labored almost an entire day less than you? Yet, that is the whole point. The absurdity of conclusion of the parable is supposed to be the twist in the story. We aren't dealing with an ordinary landowner, and we aren't encountering ordinary laborers. This story is about the kingdom of heaven, and the economy of this kingdom works differently. Here's the question that bridges the parable with our reality as Christians: what if God wishes to give of Himself to a convert in his last hour in similar measure to the one who has been laboring for the Mystical Body of Christ her entire life? Are we jealous because He is generous?

Jesus was serious about these words. We know this because He acted on them upon the cross. The first canonized saint was the thief Dismas, who was crucified next to Jesus (historically, the head of Jesus tilts to the right in most crucifixes because Dismas was crucified to Jesus' right). I find this utterly fascinating, and a bit humbling. I've been a cradle Catholic all my life, and to this day, I've never been tempted to leave my Catholic faith. Aside from earlier youthful doubts and tribulations about the existence of God, most of what I've wrestled with in my faith have been tempered with the beauty of our Catholic tradition and any questions I may have ever had have been more than satisfied by serious studying of our religion. I've never experienced the emotional, gut-wrenching choice of "conversion," aside from moral conversions, which occur over a lifetime. Consequently, I deeply admire those who have done this, and are currently doing this.

This week we began our OCIA formation (formerly known as RCIA), and I reemphasize how admirable it is to see people making such big decisions in life. What an adventure it must be to journey to our beautiful Catholic faith! But how immense that decision-making must have been for those who are making it. Please pray for our candidates and catechumens. But other things are also in my heart as I read this Gospel. I am reminded of how I am stepping into the land of a long labor I never started. I wonder how it must feel for many of you who see me and Fr. Tim taking leadership roles with churches that have had their own history of laborers. It doesn't seem fair for us to assume to make decisions, and yet this is how God has designed the intricate and delicate work of our ecclesial life.

This week we learned that Bishop Kevin Birmingham is being transferred immediately to Vicariate 6, to replace Bishop Perry, who's retirement has been accepted by the Holy Father. This leaves us again with an empty slot, which has been filled in the interim by one Fr. Marek Smolka (who's actually my classmate). Gosh, this can make one feel almost entirely foreign - with all these changes. It's important for us now, more than ever, to look solely at Jesus Christ, who is the rock and foundation of our parish. He always has been, and we belong to an even larger universal Church. Let's not forget that. I'm encouraged, actually, by how cared for the Church is, when seats become vacant, albeit, not without its human frailties and mistakes, many of which I have to ask you in advance to forgive me for. The truth is, I feel a sense of inadequacy. But I'm learning to accept that humiliation. Because I want to be a saint, I cannot be self-sufficient.

This brings me to my final point. There's a temptation to believe that us priests come and go, and that therefore our presence is not as vital in the scheme of the community, which is the lasting presence of the local church. The opposite lack of understanding can be a temptation for priests, which is to think that only the priest is the important thing in a local community. The truth is, we need each other. Without the community, the priest has no mission. Without the priest, there is no Body of Christ, because the priest brings us the Holy Eucharist, and it is this, the source and summit of our lives as Christians, that forms what is called "the Church." It's okay to need each other, and I am asking you to grant yourselves permission to trust us, despite our inadequacies and our frequent mistakes. Change is difficult for all of us, but it won't always be this way. That which is lasting in the community is Christ, not us. We aren't the foundation stones. Jesus is. Please don't forget that.

Our brethren at the St. Matthew campus have celebrated a Solemnity this last week. Through the intercession of St. Matthew, may we all truly remain in Christ as one Body with many laborers, both the first and the last.

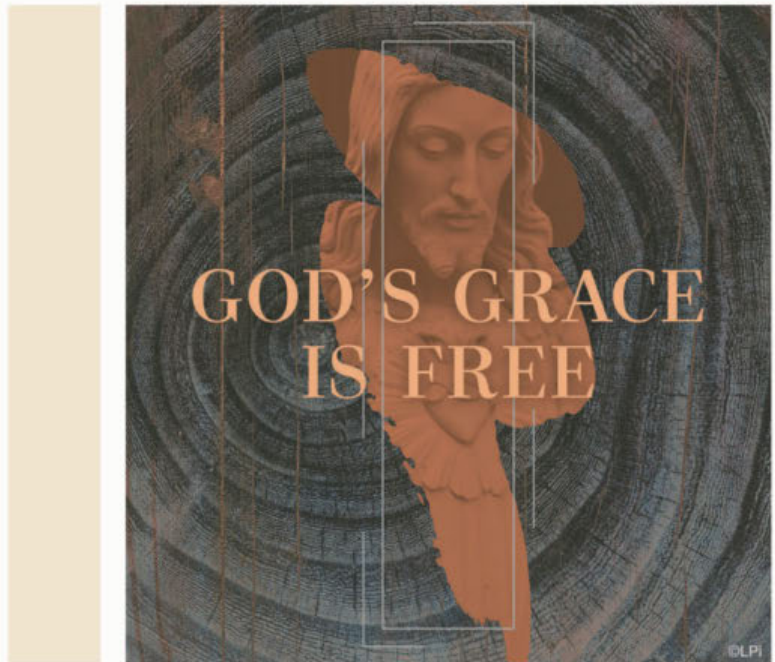

Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Once I gave my three-year-old niece a certain toy for Christmas. When she opened it, she was happy. Shortly thereafter her five-year old sister opened another present from me: the same toy, along with some play jewelry. The three-year-old cried out: "That's not fair! Why'd she get the jewelry, too?!"

Let's face it: there's something about God's grace in our religion which bugs us. We love to look at others' blessings and cry out: "That's not fair!" Catholicism is not fair in the sense that it is a religion founded on God's grace which is *unmerited* favor. God pours his mercy, love, and divine life upon us not because we're good but because He is infinitely good.

If you think the "not fair" quality of grace is easy to accept, consider how typically angry we get when we hear the parable of the workers who get paid way more than they deserve. The hyper-generous landowner says to the indignant hard workers, "Are you envious because I am generous?" Well, yes, they are, and so are we! Therefore, we *have* to reckon with this painful truth in order to move into the divine sphere of gifts, which is the world of Christ and his Church. Then we are able to move beyond a tit-for-tat world and into one where gifts are poured forth on those who don't deserve it — namely, upon us.

5 Meditation: Ron Rolheiser, OMI

EMBITTERED MORALIZING: AN OCCUPATIONAL HAZARD FOR GOOD, FAITHFUL PERSONS

In a masterful book on grace, Piet Fransen suggests that we can test how well we understand grace by gauging our reaction to this story:

Imagine a man who during his whole life is entirely careless about God and morality. He's selfish, ignores the commandments, ignores all things religious, and is basically consumed with pursuing his own pleasure - wine, sex, and song. Then, just hours before his death, he repents of his irresponsibility, makes a sincere confession, receives the sacraments of the church, and dies inside that conversion.

What's our spontaneous reaction to that story? Isn't it wonderful that he received the grace of conversion before he died? Or, more likely: The lucky beggar! He got away with it! He got to have all that pleasure and still gets to go to heaven!

If we felt the latter emotion, even for a moment, we have never deeply understood the concept of grace. Rather, like the older brother of the prodigal son, we are still seeing life away from God's house as fuller than life inside God's house, are still doing the right things mostly out of bitter duty, and are secretly envying the amoral. But, if this is true, we must be gentle with ourselves. This is an occupational hazard for good, faithful persons.

Jesus, himself, expresses this in the parable of the vineyard workers. This parable was addressed to Peter in answer to a question. Peter, on behalf of the other disciples, had just asked Jesus what reward they were going to receive for their fidelity to him. Jesus answers by telling him the story of very rich and generous landowner who goes out one morning and hires workers to work in his vineyard. He hires some early in the morning, promises them a good wage, keeps hiring others as the day progresses, each new group having to work fewer hours than the group before them, and ends the day by hiring a group of workers just one hour before work is to end. Then he tells his foreman to pay everyone a full day's wage. But this leaves the workers who toiled the whole day somewhat bitter. "This isn't fair!" they protest. "We worked the whole day and bore the heat of the sun and this last group worked just one hour. It's unfair that we all receive the same wage!" The generous landowner, obviously representing God, is gentle in his response: "Friend, didn't you agree to this wage? And isn't a good wage? Are you envious and angry because I'm generous?"

Remember to whom those words are being addressed: Jesus is addressing Peter ... and, in effect, through this parable, is addressing all good people who are morally and religiously bearing the heat of the day. And Jesus is assuring us that we will be rewarded richly for doing this. But, as the parable makes clear, there's a catch: Simply put, we will be rewarded with heaven and it will be wonderful; but, and this is the catch, we can have everything and enjoy nothing because we are watching what everyone else is getting!

I sometimes try to highlight this point rather graphically when I give retreats to priests and religious. I have them consider this scenario: Imagine you live out your life in fidelity to the your vow of celibacy, metaphorically and otherwise bearing the heat of the day and, when you get to heaven, the first person you meet there is Hugh Hefner, the founder of Playboy. In shock you protest to God: "How did he get in here? It's not fair, given the life he lived and the life that I was asked to live!" And God, the over-generous landowner, gently replies: "Friend, didn't you agree to a life of celibacy, and isn't heaven a wonderful place? Are you envious and angry because I'm generous?" And, how different this reaction to that of a true saint who, upon meeting someone like this in heaven, would, like the father of the prodigal son, rush over in joy, embrace the person, and say: "I'm overwhelmed with joy that you made it!"

Thomas Halik, a Czech writer, suggests that one of the reasons why so many people in the world reject the churches is that they see us as "embittered moralizers", older brothers of the prodigal son, doing our religious and moral duties, but bitterly, and criticizing those who don't live like us out of hidden envy. Nietzsche made a similar accusation more than a hundred years ago.

Sadly, there's more than a little truth in that accusation. Too often, we are embittered moralizers, secretly envying the amoral and criticizing our world out of bitterness. But that's an occupational hazard for the good and the faithful. Peter and first apostles struggled with it. Why should we be immune?

We needn't be immune, but we do need to be honest in admitting that, despite our real goodness and fidelity, this indicates that we are still far from being full saints.

Sacramental Preparation

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY OF INITIATION (CMI)

The Catechumenate for Children/Teens, which is an Adaptation of the Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA), is the process by which unbaptized young people of the age of reason come into the Church. (Infant Baptism is only for those children under the age of reason.) Older children who are already baptized, but who are uncatechized, also can prepare to celebrate the sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Eucharist together with their peers during the Easter Vigil or at a Rite of Full Communion.

The following is the criteria for attendance for CMI:

Does your child fall in one of these areas?

- **Unbaptized** children over the age of 7 who wish to learn more about the Catholic Faith and possibly become Catholic.
- **Baptized Christian Children** from other denominations who would like to learn more about the Catholic Faith and, possibly, be received into, the Catholic Church.
- **Baptized Catholics** who would like to prepare for Eucharist and Confirmation by renewing their understanding of their Catholic Faith.

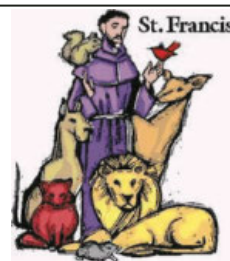
Join the Choir
