How do I publicize my ministry's event or information in the unified bulletin?

Please email any information on upcoming ministry events or information you would like publicized to publicity@sainthubert.org and indicate which date(s) you would like your article or flyer to be published. Please make sure to include which church the event will take place at and any specific information that pertains to location.

Submit articles or flyers for the bulletin at least 2 weeks prior to the weekend they will run. Often, there is not room for a full-page flyer or article. If submitting a full page, please also include half and quarter page options. Please note, that around holidays, the submission date may be as early as 3 weeks in advance due to our publisher's holiday schedule. If submitting a pdf, png or jpeg file, please also include an editable version, such as Word or Plain Text, as your article may need to be edited or modified to fit the space available.

How do I post a flyer at the Churches

If you would like to post a flyer for an event or ministry in the narthex at St. Hubert or vestibule at St. Matthew, email your request to publicity@sainthubert.org or drop off a flyer in the Parish Offices. As we come together as a parish, we are making an effort to publicize the same information at both churches. Please include your name and contact info in case there are any questions. Items posted without approval will be removed.

How do I request an announcement at Mass?

There is a very limited amount of time for announcements at Masses on the weekend. Announcements should be a short paragraph (2-3 sentences) that is no longer than 20 seconds. The deadline for submission is the Tuesday prior to the weekend the announcement is requested. Prepared announcements should be sent to publicity@sainthubert.org.

Please note that all submissions for the bulletin and Mass announcements may be edited to meet space/time constraints.

Please be sure to have the permission of the person that you are asking to add to the prayer list, since it will be printed publicly.



Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Why do we believe in Jesus and the Catholic Church? Why should we continue to do so? We've never seen him face-to-face (at least not most of us, I assume). Most of us have never had mystical visions of angels or saints. We live in the same world as our atheist and secularists friends. Why do we believe in Christ if we've never seen him?

The simple, symbolic answer the Gospel presents to us this week might surprise us: we believe because of John the Baptist. Early in John's Gospel we hear: "There was a man sent from God, his name was John. He came for testimony, to bear witness to the light, that all might believe through him." The Baptist powerfully announces Jesus. This is a historical fact, and it is also now a pattern at work in our lives.

John the Baptist stands for the entirety of the old covenant, everything entrusted to the Jewish people. And yet he prophetically opens the door to something entirely new in Jesus, to the revival and fulfillment of God's promises. In every generation, and in every human life, God continues to do this. He has done it through people named Augustine, Francis, Catherine, Theresa, and countless others. In my life, the Baptist's spirit has come through persons named Eric, Paul, Mary, and Ron. I challenge you to name at least three people through whom God has announced the coming of Jesus in your life. Consciously thank God for their testimony. And let's commit ourselves to listening to the spirit of John the Baptist testify again this week so that we might more strongly believe in the light.

PRAYER AS SEEKING GOD'S GUIDANCE

[Third in of a four-part Advent series on Prayer]

In her autobiography, The Long Loneliness, Dorothy Day tells of a very difficult time in her life. She had just converted to Christianity, after a long period of atheism, and then given birth to her daughter. During her season of atheism, she had fallen in love with a man who had fathered her child; and she and this man, atheists disillusioned with main-stream society, had made a pact never to marry, as statement against the conventions of society.

But her conversion to Christianity had turned that world upside down. The father of her child had given her an ultimatum; if she had their child baptized he would end their relationship. Dorothy chose to baptize the child, but paid a heavy price. She deeply loved this man and suffered greatly at their breakup. Moreover, given that her conversion took her out of all her former circles, it left her with more than a missing soul mate. It left her too without a job, without support for her child, and without her former purpose in life. She felt painfully alone and lost.

And this drove her to her knees, literally. One day she took a train to Washington, D.C., from New York and spent the day praying at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. And, as she shares in her autobiography, her prayer that day was shamelessly direct, humble, and clear. Essentially she told God, again and again, that she was lost, that she needed a clear direction for her life, and that she needed that direction now, not in some distant future. And, like Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, she prayed that prayer over and over again.

She took a train home that evening and as she walked up to her apartment, a man, Peter Maurin, was sitting on the steps. He invited her to start the Catholic Worker. The rest is history.

Our prayers aren't always answered that swiftly and directly, but they are always answered, as Jesus assures us, because God does not withhold the Holy Spirit from those who ask for it. If we pray for guidance and support, it will be given us.

In Scripture, we see many salient examples of people who, like Dorothy Day, seek out God's guidance in prayer, especially so when they are alone and afraid as they stand before some major upheaval or impending suffering in their lives. We see this, for example, in Moses who when lost in the desert and facing a revolt from his own people climbs Mount Horeb to ask for God's counsel. And we see it in Jesus who also climbs Mount Horeb to pray and who spends whole nights in prayer, struggling to find both the guidance and the courage he needs for his mission.

Looking at the prayer of Moses, Jesus, Dorothy Day, and countless other women and men who have prayed for guidance from God, we see that their prayer, especially when they feel most alone and desperate, is marked by three things: honesty, directness, and humility. They lift their own minds and hearts to God, not someone else's. They share their aloneness and fears with shameless honestly. There is no pretense, no rationalization, no hiding of weaknesses. They pour out their fears, their inadequacy, their temptations, and their confusion, as do children, begging for someone's hand to help them.

There's an interesting parallel to this inside some of our classical fairy tales where the figure of God often appears in the form of an angel, a fairy, a fox, or a horse. Invariably those who approach that God-figure with over-confidence, arrogance, or pretense, are denied all counsel and all magic. Conversely those who approach the God-figure in humility and admit that they are lost in their search are awarded with counsel and magic. There's an important prayer-lesson in that.

All of us, at different times in our lives, find ourselves alone, lost, confused, and tempted towards a road that will not lead to life. At such times we need to approach God with a prayer that is shamelessly honest, direct, and humble. Like Dorothy Day, we need to raise our true fears and insecurities to God, praying, over and over again: "I'm afraid! I feel so alone and isolated in this! I don't want to do this! I'm completely inadequate! I haven't any strength left! I'm full of anger! I'm bitter at so many things! I hate some of the places where my Christian morality has led me! I'm jealous of others who don't have my moral inhibitions! I'm tempted in ways that I'm ashamed to speak of! I need more support than you've been giving me! Send me someone or send me something! If you want me to continue on this road you've got to give me more help! I need this now!"

And then we need to wait, in patience, in advent. Perhaps no Peter Maurin will appear on our doorstep that night, but, with desert-helplessness having done its work, an angel will come to strengthen us.

It is a novena (nine-day series) of dawn Masses celebrated by Roman Catholics in the Philippines from the 16th to the 24th of December, leading to the Solemnity of Christmas on December 25. Simbang Gabi is also known as Misa de Gallo or Mass of the Rooster because the Masses are celebrated before the break of dawn, when the rooster crows.

Many churches in the Chicago Archdiocese participate in sponsoring one night of Simbang Gabi, allowing Catholics to complete the novena by visiting different churches. Some churches hold all 9 Masses, either at night or in the dawn. The theme of this year's Simbang Gabi is "Growing in Love for the Eucharist".

The Word and the Assembly

"In order to learn how to take up the cross of Christ each day of their lives, these catechumens will need to be nourished by the Word of God, for "one does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4). In the Scriptures that they will hear every Sunday in the Mass, God speaks, and in the Gospels, Christ proclaims to all those assembled that God's promises last forever. No matter what things the catechumens will encounter-suffering, pain, obstacles, doubt, fear, sin, death-God will never leave them. God's love through Christ never fails.

Where we encounter Christ and his love most clearly is in the assembly. When God's people gather on Sunday to proclaim the Scriptures, offer prayers for the world, and remember Christ in the sharing of a mealthe Eucharist-Christ is truly present. It will be through the assembly that the catechumens learn how to live as Christ. The assembly models for them how to die to selfishness, how to forgive others, how to preach the Good News, and how to live in hope through the Holy Spirit. The catechumens will depend on the Spirit of God found in the assembly to apprentice them into a life of discipleship.

Because they are not yet baptized, the catechumens cannot yet participate in the prayers of the faithful. These prayers are the Creed, the General Intercessions, and the Eucharistic Prayer which climaxes in Communion. Therefore, after the homily, the catechumens, accompanied by a member of the baptized, are sent to feast on the Word of God, to reflect on how God is continuing to call them in this part of their faith journey, and to discern how they are to respond.

For discussion: What are your favorite Scripture passages? How have these words nourished you? How do you see these words lived out in the assembly? What do these words call you to do?


