
On July 4th, the United States bursts into celebration with fireworks, parades, and gatherings that paint the nation in red, white, and blue. This Independence Day, as we commemorate the birth of our nation, we pause to reflect on the profound significance of the freedoms we hold dear—freedoms secured through the sacrifices of countless people, the

privilege of living in this remarkable country, and the enduring truth of our national motto, "In God We Trust." These pillars remind us of the cost of liberty, the blessings of our nation, and the spiritual foundation that guides us toward true freedom.

Living in the United States is a privilege that sets us apart. This nation, built on the ideals of liberty and justice, offers opportunities that many across the world can only dream of. We are free to innovate, to express our beliefs, and to shape our futures in ways that reflect our individual aspirations. Yet, this privilege comes with responsibility—to uphold the values that make this nation exceptional and to ensure that the freedoms we cherish are preserved for future generations. In sub-Saharan Africa, particularly Nigeria, thousands of Christians are killed annually by groups like Boko Haram and Fulani militants, with over 8000 deaths reported between 2021 and 2022, alongside church burnings and forced displacement. In India, Hindu fanatic groups fuel a rise in anti-Christian violence, with rise in hate crimes, including church arsons and forced conversions. Elsewhere, from North Korea's labor camps to Eritrea's mass imprisonments. Christians face harassment, torture, and death for their faith. As we honor America's freedom, let us remember and pray for our brothers and sisters enduring these trials, standing firm in their faith despite immense hardship.



Let us pray and do whatever we can to help our Christian Brothers and sisters around the world. Let us embrace the privilege of being Americans by fostering unity. And let us never forget that "In God We Trust" is more than a motto—it is a reminder of the divine grace that underpins our liberty.

# **Gospel Meditation**

## Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

In the days after the awful 2020 killing of George Floyd, a Catholic friend remarked, "Racism is today's great evil. We should put all our energy into fighting it." I admired her intuition that the church must stand firmly against evil. Amen, I thought. At the same time, something felt wrong. As months went by, I saw her steadily slide into bitterness and anger. Soon, despondency. She spoke of giving up the fight. Don't we too wonder how to fight evil without losing our joy or energy?

Jesus' words this week help. He says, "Rejoice not that you have power over demons, but that your names are written in heaven" (Luke 10:20). Notice the asymmetry in where he wants our focus: on the latter, not the former. Should we confidently embrace our God-given power to overcome evil? Absolutely. But even more so, we should emphasize the positive element of our relationship to God. It is tempting but dangerous to define ourselves by what we oppose. It is better to define ourselves by—to rejoice in—what we celebrate: in Jesus, God has written our names in heaven. This sustains our battles.

This week, our marching orders are: fight evil. But more deeply, rejoice that God knows and loves us personally, individually. We allow this joyful knowledge to undergird our fight against the darkness of our day. Then we enjoy long-term stability to be cheerful warriors, who never forget the reason for the contests we are called to fight and win: love.

# EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

#### When God Speaks Like a Polish Grandmother

A friend of mine had a Polish grandmother who was famous for giving her children some blunt advice every time they left the house: "Eyes straight ahead. Mind your own business."

Every mother knows her children best, and this mother knew hers liked to argue and sometimes liked to show off. She knew that could lead to trouble. She could not anticipate every scenario they would encounter each time they departed from her. All she could do was distill what she knew about life, safety, and manners into a few simple words, and hand them over to her children like a set of car keys or a hastily scribbled map. In this way, a woman who rarely said "I love you" expressed her devotion. And long after she was dead and buried, her aging sons and daughters repeated these words to themselves, like a child wrapping himself in a warm blanket.

Jesus does much the same for us, in many portions of the Gospels. "Ask the master to send out laborers for his harvest...Carry no money...Eat what is set before you... Know that the Kingdom of God is at hand...Rejoice because your names are written in Heaven."

He knows us best – knows our strengths, but even more importantly, he knows our weaknesses. He doesn't always have the space to address each of these explicitly in the pages of Scripture, but what he can do is distill the truth of effective evangelization into a few simple words, and hand them over to us as food for our journey of discipleship. In this way, a God who addresses the entire world and every soul who ever lived also speaks intimately to each one of us.

# WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A PRACTICING CATHOLIC?

We often receive requests to sign a statement that a certain individual is a practicing Catholic and eligible to serve as a godparent, Confirmation sponsor, or OCIA sponsor. The letter assures the requesting parish that the person recommended is serious about his or her Catholic faith and will share that faith with the one to be baptized or confirmed. Therefore, please take note of the following guidelines for requests that you may make in this regard.

#### WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A PRACTICING CATHOLIC?

- 1. Has formally registered and participating in the life of the parish for at least 3 months.
- 2. Attends Mass at least 75% of all Sundays.
- 3. Contributes financially to the parish according to ones means

Please understand that we welcome everyone. The guideline above is helpful for me to exercise the duty of granting those requested letters from my conscience and my limited authority within the parish. Finally, please note our parish registrations are to be used only by our parish and our Archdiocese. In no way do we share the information you give us with the government or any outside organization.

Please put unused rosaries you wish to donate into the slot on the ministry table in the


narthex at St. Hubert Church marked "Rosaries for the Missions."

#### MAY YOUR KINGDOM COME, BUT NOT YET

A friend of mine likes to humor about his struggles in growing up. When I was in my twenties, he quips, I felt that by the time I was forty I would have grown-up enough to let go of my bad habits. But, when I turned forty, I gave myself an extra ten years, promising myself that by age fifty, I'd have conquered these habits. Well, now I'm my fifties and I've promised myself that by age sixty, I'll be more mature and more serious about the deeper things in life.

Most of us, if we are honest, have a similar story. We're well intentioned, but we keep pushing the things we need to change in our lives off into the future: Yes, I need to do this, but I'm not ready yet. I want more time. Sometime in the future I'll do this.

That's a near-universal sentiment, and for good reason. The tension we experience between our desire to grow-up and our perennial procrastination and infinite stalling in doing that, reflects in fact a tension that lies at the heart of Jesus' message, a tension between God's promises as being already here and God's promises as still coming. Simply put: Everything Jesus promised is already here and everything Jesus promised is still coming. We're already living the new, resurrected life, even as we're waiting for it still to come. What lies inside this paradox?

Biblical scholars and theologians tell us that everything Jesus came to bring us (the Reign of God, the Kingdom of God, the New Age, the Final Age, the reign of justice on this earth, new life, the resurrection, eternal life, heaven) is already here, except that it's also still coming. It's here now, but not fully; a present reality, but in tension. And it's still coming, in its fullness; still to arrive, in ecstasy. It's already here and it's still to be realized. For instance, when Jesus says that he has come to bring us new life, he is not talking simply about our future our lives in heaven; he is also talking about our lives here, already now. The new life is already here, he assures us. Heaven has already begun.

Jesus preached this very clearly and the problem was not that his hearers didn't understand him. They understood; but, almost universally, they resisted that message. Much as they yearned for God's Kingdom to be already here, like my friend who keeps asking for another ten years to get his life in order, they preferred to push things into the future. Having God become concrete in their lives was far too threatening.

Gerhard Lohfink, the renowned Biblical scholar, aptly articulates both the resistance that Jesus' hearers had to this part of his message and the reason for that resistance: "Jesus' hearers prefer to push everything off into the future, and the story comes to no good end. The reign of God announced by Jesus is not accepted. The 'today' offered by God is denied. And that, that alone, is why 'already' becomes 'not yet'. .... It is not only in Nazareth that the 'today' of the Gospel was not accepted. Later also, in the course of the church's history, it has again and again been denied or rendered toothless. The reason was the same as in Nazareth: apparently it goes against the human grain for God to become concrete in our lives. Then people's desires and favorite notions are in danger, and so are their ideas about time. It can't be today, because that would mean that our lives have to change today already. Therefore it can lie, hygienically and snugly packed, at rest, inconsequential."

I suspect that all of us can relate to that: It's very threatening to have God become "concrete" in our lives, as opposed to God simply being a reality that will one day become very real. Because if God is "concrete" already now that means that our worlds have to change now and we have to stop pushing things into the indefinite future. This isn't so much a fault in faith as it is a procrastination, a stalling, wanting of a little more time before we need to get serious. We're like the guests in the Gospel parable who are invited to wedding banquet. We too want to go to the feast, intend to go to the feast; but, first, we need to attend to our marriages, our businesses, our ambitions. We can get serious later. There's time. We fully intend to take Jesus seriously; it's just that we want a little more time before we do that.

We are all, I suspect, familiar with St. Augustine's infamous prayer. After converting to Christianity at age twenty-five, he struggled for another nine years to bring his sexuality into harmony with his faith. During those nine years, he prayed this way: Lord, make me a chaste Christian ... but not yet!

To his credit, unlike many of us, at least eventually he stopped pushing things into the indefinite future.
