

Today is the Fourth Sunday of Advent, the final step in our four-week journey of watchful waiting, yet in just four short days we will already be singing Silent Night at Christmas Mass. The Advent wreath will have its fourth candle blazing for only a few hours before the Christ candle takes center stage. For those of us who love the quiet, expectant spirit of Advent, it feels almost unfair like the season has slipped through our fingers just as we were settling into its rhythm.

And yet, perhaps this compressed timetable is a gift in disguise. It forces us to hold two truths together: the longing of Advent and the joy of Christmas are not rivals; they are two movements of the same symphony. We do not have to choose between them. We can live both at once.

Looking back, these past few weeks have flown by in a blur of snowstorms and candlelight. The first two weekends brought real winter snow enough to slow us down, to make the roads quiet and the church steps slippery, to remind us that nature itself was keeping Advent with us. Inside the church, though, something beautiful was happening. Daily Mass attendance grew. The adoration was well attended. Ministry schedules filled up with willing hands. And the confession lines stretched longer. People came, young and old, to make straight the highway for our God in the desert of their own hearts. Our parish school children and faith formation students had their own opportunities for the sacrament of reconciliation, and every teacher, catechist, and volunteer who made that possible deserves our deepest gratitude. They helped our young ones experience the liberating joy of God's mercy at the very moment the Church asks us to prepare room for the Savior.

Today's Gospel could not be more perfectly timed. On this last Sunday of Advent, the Church gives us the visit of the Angel to Joseph in a dream. Joseph hears the astonishing word of the angel, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home. For it is through the Holy Spirit that this child has been conceived in her." Joseph does according to what the Angel told him to do. The prophecy of Isaiah that we have carried in our hearts all Advent - "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel" (Is 7:14) - is fulfilled before our eyes. God is with us. Not in some distant future, not only at the end of time, but here, now, in the hidden quiet of a young woman's yes.

That same God-with-us is born again this Christmas in the silence of our own hearts when we, like Mary and Joseph, make room for him. The snow may melt, the candles may burn down, the Advent wreath may be packed away by Friday, Christmas gifts will be opened but Emmanuel remains.

As we move so quickly from the fourth candle to the Christmas, let us carry one special intention into Christmas night. This year, let us remember in a particular way everyone who is struggling. Those who are lonely though surrounded by lights and music. Those who are grieving an empty chair at the table. Those facing illness, unemployment, broken relationships, those Christians who are persecuted for their faith or the quiet ache of depression that Christmas can sometimes sharpen rather than heal. May the Child in the manger bring them the comfort they cannot manufacture for themselves. May they hear, beneath all the carols and commotion, the gentle heartbeat of God-with-us.

The Advent season may feel as though it has raced past us, but its essential work is finished when Christmas arrives: our hearts have been widened, even if only a little, to receive the One who has been coming toward us from all eternity. Keep watch a few hours more. And then, when Thursday dawns for Midnight Mass, step joyfully into Christmas with Mary's fiat on your lips and Emmanuel in your heart.

***Merry Christmas to you all. The Lord is near.

## *Christmas 2025*

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Our Christmas celebrations coincide with the beginning of winter. There is less light at this time of year and more cold than we might want. The contrast is striking for people of faith. We remember God's only begotten Son born of the Virgin Mary. He comes into a dark and cold world as its light and its warmth.

In chapter four of Matthew's gospel at the beginning of the public ministry of Jesus, the evangelist cites words of the prophet Isaiah:

*...the people who sat in darkness  
have seen a great light,  
and for those who sat in the region  
and shadow of death  
light has dawned. (Mt 4:16)*

Events of this past year could suggest that all we have is indeed a cold and dark world. That seems to be the message of the wars fought around the world, of the tragic school shootings and political assassinations in our nation, and of our frayed connections with each other.

Again, for us as people of faith, the contrast is stark. We are realistic, and we know well the challenges of our world in this tense moment of the world's history. We also know, however, a larger narrative of God's love incarnate in Jesus Christ, the light that breaks the power of sin and death. Saint John wrote of him: "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." (John 1:5) This light enlightens us and warms us. Whatever struggles we face, we are assured because he walks with us.

As you gather with family and friends and fellow parishioners, I urge you to reassure each other with our convictions of faith. Take responsibility in the world to be a sign of hope and a source of encouragement for others. In this way, you will bring Christ the light to those who need him.

Join me and pray for our world, our nation, and our local communities that we can all walk in the light.

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## Gospel Meditation

### Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

A priest friend recently told me a remarkable story. One of his cousins reported having a vivid dream in which an angel told him the family needed to exhume their grandmother's body from a cemetery in New York and return it to her birthplace in Romania. She had been dead nearly 10 years. As you might expect, the family thought it was, well, crazy. But astonishingly they exhumed her body. It was incorrupt, showing no signs of decomposition. That experience sparked healing, faith, and reconciliation throughout the family.

In this Sunday's Gospel, Joseph also receives a dream. He's confused, afraid. But in the quiet of sleep, God speaks: **“Do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home” (Matthew 1:20).** When he wakes, Joseph acts. He doesn't overanalyze or dismiss the message. He trusts, and acts.

God still speaks — not necessarily through literal dreams but through those deeper intuitions of the heart.

St. Ignatius of Loyola taught that God's voice draws us into peace, courage, and love. But we have to listen to it. Advent is a time for stillness. As we prepare for Christ's coming, we're invited to enter that quiet space where God's voice can be heard.

When and how do you become most receptive to God? Is it in silence? In prayer? In nature? At Mass? This week, go there. Be still. Listen. And like Joseph, have the courage to act on what God shows you.



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## BEING READY FOR CHRISTMAS

Many of us arrive at Christmas tired, running, distracted, and already fatigued with the lights, songs, and celebrations of Christmas. Advent is meant to be a time of preparation for Christmas; but for many of us it is not exactly a time for the kind of preparation that enables Christ be born more deeply in our lives. Instead our preparation for Christmas is mostly a time of making ready to celebrate with our families, friends, and colleagues. The days leading up to Christmas are rarely serene. Instead we find ourselves harried and hurried putting up decorations, shopping for gifts, sending out cards, preparing food, and attending Christmas socials. Moreover, when Christmas arrives, we are already tired of Christmas carols, having heard them already, non-stop, for weeks in our shopping malls, restaurants, public squares, and on our radio stations.

And so Christmas, itself, generally finds us more in a pressured and tired space than in a leisured and rested one. Indeed sometimes the Christmas season is more an endurance test than a time of genuine enjoyment. Moreover and more seriously, if we are honest with ourselves, we have to admit that in our preparations for Christmas, we, in fact, make very little space for the spiritual, for Christ to be born more deeply in our lives. Our time of preparation is generally more of a time to prepare our houses than a time to prepare our souls, more of a time of shopping than of prayer, and more of a time of already feasting than a time of fasting as a preparation for a feast. Today advent is perhaps more about already celebrating Christmas than it is about preparing for it.

And the end result is that, like the biblical innkeepers who had no room for Mary and Joseph at the first Christmas, we generally arrive at Christmas with “no room at the inn”, no space in our lives for a spiritual rebirth. Our hearts are good, we want Christmas to renew us spiritually, but our lives are too pressured, too full of activity and tiredness, for us to have any real energy to make Christmas a special time of spiritual renewal for ourselves. The spirit of Christmas is still in us, real, but lying like a neglected baby in the straw waiting to be picked up. And we do intend to pick up the baby, but simply never get around to it.

So how bad are we?

Now, while this should challenge us to take a look at ourselves, it is not as bad as many religious critics make it out to be. Arriving at Christmas with a life too busy and too distracted to make more room for Christ doesn't make us bad persons. It doesn't mean that we are mindless pagans. And it doesn't mean that Christ has died in our lives. We are not bad, faithless, and pagan because we habitually arrive at Christmas too distracted, too busy, too pressured, and too tired to make much of a conscious effort to make this feast a time of real spiritual renewal in our lives. Our spiritual lethargy simply defines us as more human than angelic, more earthy than platonic, and as more sensual than spiritual. I suspect that God fully understands this condition.

Indeed, everyone struggles with this in some fashion. No one is perfect; no one gives a full place in his or her life to Christ, even at Christmas time. That should bring us some consolation. But it should also leave us with a pressing challenge: There is too little room for Christ in our busy, distracted lives! We must work at clearing some space for Christ, at making Christmas a time of spiritual refreshment and renewal in our lives.

How do we do that?

In the days leading up to Christmas, many of us struggle to do all the things we need to do to be ready for all that needs to happen in our houses, churches, and places of work. We need to shop for gifts, send out cards, put up lights and decorations, plan menus, buy food, attend a goodly number of Christmas socials at work, at church, at friends' houses. This, added on to the normal pressures within our lives, not infrequently leaves us with the feeling: I'm not going to make it! I won't be ready! I won't be ready for Christmas! That's a common feeling.

But being ready for Christmas, getting everything we need to do done on time, making it, does not depend upon getting everything neatly checked off on our to-do list: gifts, done; cards, done; decorations, done; food, ready; the requisite number of social obligations, completed. Even if that list is only half done, if you find yourself in church at Christmas, if you find yourself at table with your family on Christmas day, and if you find yourself greeting your neighbors and colleagues with a little more warmth, then it doesn't matter if you are distracted, tired, over-fed, and not thinking explicitly about Jesus, you've made it.
