THOUGHTS FROM FR. RICHARD
 PENSAMIENTOS DE PADRE RICARDO

■ VOLCANIC ISLANDS WITH ANCIENT HISTORY AND DEEP SPIRITUAL ROOTS

Friday afternoon, June 3. We are heading for Athens after a five-hour visit to the last of our Greek islands on this cruise, Kos. We decided to do nothing today in terms of tours off the ship. I decided to have a good massage instead. We won't arrive in Athens until 7am tomorrow morning.

There are many Greek islands, but many of them are not inhabited by anyone. They all look the same since they are all volcanic rock, most with nothing growing on them. There are basically two groupings of islands, some very close to Turkey and others closer to southern Greece and Athens. We have visited the more important, historic and culturally significant islands such as Rhodes, Patmos, Mykonos and Santorini. Our visit was supposed to end in Istanbul, but because of "human explosions" in tourist areas there, many cruise ships are no longer stopping there. Going there was the reason why we chose the trip. It would still be on my bucket list to do someday, but who knows whether that will happen or not?

The trip has been very good. The Azamara Journey is one of two ships which carry 650 passengers. It is smaller, with multiple restaurants, from buffet style, to dining, to Grill and Steakhouse. The food is varied, well prepared and more than anyone could possible eat. After a day or two, you realize that you cannot eat your way through the cruise. A sense of moderation, health and diet sets in for me. We were told that cruise ship people gain 2 ½ lbs. each day. There is so much, really too much. There is a gym, health spa, pool and sun bathing area and all kinds of entertainment, classes and hobby interest, Casino, and shops. The ship is a virtual world all by itself.

The Day at Rhodes: Population 15,000. Part of the day took us up a valley to ruins of an ancient third century B.C. city, Kamiros. The impressive thought is that what has been excavated and reassembled

is only about 10 percent of what is actually buried under the dirt and shrubbery of centuries. All of these ancient cities that have been excavated were destroyed by earthquakes over the centuries. Sometimes the ancient peoples would rebuild a few miles away, or gradually rebuild what was. There have been many civilizations also, of smaller city states, conquering the islands for periods of time. There have been rebuilding with different styles of architecture, depending upon which ruling culture dominated at the moment. In this part of the world, the city-state of Venice, the Greeks and the Ottoman Empire have all left their mark.

One of the great charms of Rhodes is the ancient walled city from the 14th century A.D., built by the military and religious Order of the Hospitallers of St. John of God of Jerusalem, Rhodes and Malta. The Order began in Jerusalem in the 11th century and left as the crusaders lost their wars and campaigns to Moslem influence. They centered their spiritual and hospital work wherever they went. Because the Ottoman Empire spread under the influence of Suleiman the Magnificent, the Knights left eventually for Malta. Their castle fortress, the three moats around the city, the old homes within, still make for a medieval masterpiece that survives and is filled with life to this day.

The Day at Ephesus. A few miles away from the ancient UNESCO marvel of ruins is the city of Ephesus, which was the second largest city of the Roman Empire during the time when St. Luke, St. John, Mother Mary and St. Paul were there. Here is the house where Mary and John lived, high up a valley. Today there is a simple altar within a very small stone brick building. It is a very pleasant shaded area of terraces where outdoor Mass is celebrated by visiting groups, a very quiet and contemplative shrine. That was a very wonderful way to begin the day, after which we spent three hours walking through the ruins of Ephesus, toppled by the earthquake of 227 A.D. We walked through the city along the main street, from the top of what is excavated down to the very bottom of the city. The city which once was at the edge of the Aegean

Sea is now 6 miles from the Aegean Sea. Even the Meander River has disappeared because of the ancient earthquake and the silt that has built up over the centuries, causing the great farmlands to be developed.

I had been to Ephesus 20 years ago, but there have been significant archeological excavations since then, uncovering a whole hillside of ancient family homes owned by wealthy business people. It was impressive to see how they built their homes, terracing them up the hillsides, and constructing them with hot running water, beautiful floor mosaics, painted walls, etc.

After walking through the standing ruins of Ephesus, which is outside the modern-day Turkish City of Kusadasi, we visited the ruins of the first Christian church dedicated to Mary the Mother of God, built sometime after the Council of Nicea in 351. The church was huge. What was most impressive was the baptismal pool in the shape of a cross, with steps down and up. Everything was built with red brick and mortar of some kind--thick, thick walls to hold domes and roofs. Local marbles then adorned the walls inside and out. From there we went to visit the first church dedicated to St. John the Evangelist some miles away, larger than the last, with a better-preserved baptismal area with a similar design-- fourth century brick and mortar ruins, tall walls still standing. Off to one side of the basilica was an immense platform area of arches and columns under which pilgrim travelers left their animals while visiting the basilica.

The Day at Patmos. Each island has a principal small bay and port. Patmos is a small town of stone, whitewashed houses built up the hillsides. Grape and wine production has been restored in Patmos as well. Remember that the islands are mountainous, with many valleys, where hardly anything grows. One could understand how the Roman governor of Ephesus of the late first century would exile St. John the Evangelist to Patmos, where he lived in a cave. By tradition, he spent about a year and half there, in which what is now the last New Testament Book of Revelation was written. We do not know if Mary was with him at this

time. There is a small Greek Orthodox monastery built over the cave. The town of Patmos is picturesque and compact and very peaceful.

Day at Santorini. This is the beautiful iconic island of whitewashed buildings with blues domes, that leads everyone to believe that all the Greek islands look like Santorini. Not so. All are very different and unique. The ship parks within a volcanic crater, so that you cannot see the famous looking town, which is one of two towns on the island. It is beautiful to stroll through the streets and the shops of the upper town, clothed in white and blue. The Greek flag is also white and blue - white representing the land and the sun, blue representing the bright blue sky. There is a blue cross at the upper left hand corner. Greece is a Christian nation where the Greek Orthodox Church flourishes. Olive trees and vineyards abound everywhere.

The Day at Crete. The Italians called Crete “the Grand Island,” the largest of the Greek Islands. We went out into the countryside to visit an ancient village, to see an old winery, to visit an old monastery, to come back into the old downtown and to return to the town square in the evening for a piano concert by an outstanding Greek pianist.

The Day at St. Bonaventure. That would be today, Monday June 6, finishing this travelogue for you and back at work. Now on to emails and phone calls? So much for the Greek Isles!

■ **JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY –**
June 12, 2016
Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time



On today's Jubilee for Those Sick and Suffering Disabilities, Jesus encounters a woman who is "spiritually ill." She is thus "disabled" from participating in Israel's worshipping community

or polite society. Bathing Jesus' feet with tears, drying them with unveiled hair, anointing them (Luke 7:38) risk Jesus' becoming "unclean." Yet his mercy welcomes even such inappropriate behavior as her sincere manifestation of love: "Your sins are forgiven. Go in peace" (7:48, 50). Go not just in "peace," but in shalom, the all-enveloping, life-changing assurance of God's mercy. She is anonymous, "known in the city" only as "a sinful woman" (7:37). The character with name and religious title, "Simon the Pharisee" (7:36, 40), judges her harshly, but himself not at all, and thus forfeits God's mercy. This Jubilee Year of Mercy challenges us to self-examination. In which role do we most often cast ourselves, humble sinner or judgmental Pharisee? Jesus declares that only by an unfailing willingness to show mercy to fellow sinners can we hope to obtain mercy ourselves (see *Misericordiae Vultus*, 9).

■ **THE SPIRIT IN YOU**

The Grail Prayer

Lord Jesus

I give you my hands to do your work

I give you my feet to go your way

I give you my eyes to see as you do

I give you my tongue to speak your words

I give you my mind that you may think in me

I give you my spirit that you may pray in me

Above all, I give you my heart

that you may love in me

your Father and all mankind

I give you my whole self that you may grow in me

so that it is you Lord Jesus

who live and work and pray in me.

Catholic Social Teaching (CST) is an immense school of thought that can be so overwhelming people don't know where to begin. I was once so overwhelmed with the work that needed to be done, I shut down and couldn't do anything. So I tackled it the way I do most things that scare me: I studied.

In grad school, I studied CST and wrote my thesis on Catholic Social Teaching in the US in the last 115 years (since *Rerum Novarum*). *Rerum Novarum* is an encyclical, written by Pope Leo XIII in 1891, that is considered the foundational document of CST. I still have so much to learn and still feel overwhelmed, but I have a basic test I give myself before I start on any project: Where is the human dignity? How can my hands, feet, voice, mind, spirit best help this cause? What can I bring to the cause that best honors the grace and love the Father has shown me?

In the Gospels, Jesus tells us again and again to think of others before ourselves. He commands us to love our neighbor. He shows us by example how to build bridges to those who are ignored or forgotten. Jesus steps his teachings and actions in the dignity of the human person. That is the bedrock of all social teachings. At all times, in all phases of life, we are entitled to the dignity that comes from being created in God's image.

If we are created in God's image, should we not act in God's likeness? If we want others to come to know God, the first place they will look is at the person trying to bring them closer to God. How do you act in the world? Do you treat others with courtesy and dignity? Like thanking the clerk behind the counter; or smiling at strangers on the street and saying "hello"; or really stretching and acknowledging the person begging on the street or the scruffy person hanging out at the park? Or do you walk by, like the "holy men" in the Gospel story of the Samaritan, looking at anything but them?

In this year of Mercy, we have a special invitation to extend ourselves beyond our convenience and comfort zone to see God in *everyone*? I've always liked the ancient Sanskrit greeting, "Namaste." May the Spirit in me acknowledge the Spirit in you.





■ UNDÉCIMO DOMINGO DEL TIEMPO ORDINARIO, LUCAS 7, 36-50

Queridos hermanos, la escena del Evangelio de hoy, nos muestra una mujer, a quien llaman María Magdalena, mujer de pasado oscuro, despreciada por muchos en la ciudad, sabe que Jesús es un enviado de Dios y quiere decir algo a Dios. La escena tiene lugar en una comida de sociedad. Sin ser invitada, Magdalena se acerca a los pies del Señor. Las palabras que pensaba decir se le anudan en su garganta, pero con lágrimas, besando los pies de Jesús y ungiéndolos con perfume, ella quiere expresar su dolor y su deseo de acercarse a Dios. Jesús la deja actuar en silencio, se siente conmovido por ese gesto de tanta sinceridad y la perdona. Como la Magdalena, también nosotros nos sentimos un poco más cerca de Dios. Esta historia tan humana es en cierta forma la historia de cada uno de nosotros. Hay momentos en que nos angustia un sentido de culpa, en que tenemos necesidad de estar cerca de los demás y de Dios. En la mujer del Evangelio podemos aprender la forma de hablar con Dios.

La Magdalena reconoce que es pecadora. No se engaña a sí misma ni trata de justificar su conducta. Sabe que ha obrado mal y experimenta interiormente su dolor, tristeza, y vergüenza. En medio de una sociedad que está acostumbrada a los pequeños o grandes engaños, ella no sabe mentir. Tampoco le quiere mentir a Dios; antes bien, tiene una gran confianza en Él. Ha oído que Jesús viene a traer la esperanza y el perdón, que viene precisamente para los enfermos y los que sufren. Por su

sinceridad, Dios la escucha y la perdona. Ese gesto la engrandece.

La Magdalena emplea unos signos muy humanos para hablar con Dios. El llanto es una manera muy viva de expresar el dolor y la tristeza. El beso es una forma de manifestar respeto y amor. Un regalo como un vaso de perfume, significa admiración. Dios se pone al alcance de la mano para entender este lenguaje nuestro. Él supo lo que es llorar y por eso es capaz de entender cuando ve lágrimas en los ojos de la Magdalena o en los ojos de muchos hombres y mujeres de nuestro tiempo. Dios se hizo sensible al dolor humano. Dios se hizo humano para entender la forma en que nosotros expresamos el amor. Así puede entender que nosotros necesitamos el apoyo de los demás para vivir, que necesitamos hermanos y amigos a nuestro lado para enfrentar la vida. Él sabe que el único lenguaje que nos une realmente a los seres humanos es el amor. Jesús quiso también experimentar la sensación grata de recibir un regalo. Sabe que el regalo no vale por lo que cuesta, como por el valor espiritual que encierra, por lo que significa. Un regalo en el fondo significa la donación de uno mismo a otro.

Cuando el fariseo que invitó a Jesús a comer critica interiormente a la mujer pecadora, el Señor dice unas palabras que nos hacen pensar: "Sus numerosos pecados, le quedan perdonados, por el mucho amor que demostró." Con eso nos quiere decir que el único camino para obtener el perdón y la reconciliación es el amor. La Magdalena tuvo el valor de dar el primer

paso porque no se puso a calcular demasiado la reacción de los asistentes y de Jesús. Simplemente siguió el instinto de su sinceridad. El Señor comprendió, que detrás de ese gesto externo de ungió los pies, de llorar sobre ellos y besarlos, había una persona humana de gran valor, y la levantó. Y al verla hoy como un signo de sinceridad, podemos entender nosotros que Dios está también al alcance de la mano en nuestros tiempos. De nosotros depende dar el paso para acercarnos al Señor.

El diálogo con el Señor transformó completamente la vida de María Magdalena. Vio con sorpresa que las palabras del Señor le habían devuelto la paz y la alegría de vivir, que lo importante no era la vida de antes, sino la vida que comenzaba ese día. Hermanos, que esta celebración nos ayude a reavivar la esperanza de ser mejores. Dios les ayude. Diácono Mariano Preza.

■ AÑO JUBILAR DE LA MISERICORDIA Undécimo Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario



Hoy, el Jubileo es por los enfermos y discapacitados que sufren, Jesús se encuentra con una mujer que es "espiritualmente enferma." Ella es así "discapacitada" de participar en el

culto de la comunidad o sociedad de Israel. Al bañar los pies de Jesús con lágrimas, secarlos con el cabello, lo ungió (Lucas 7:38) se pensaba que podría correr el riesgo de que Jesús quedara "impuro." Sin embargo, su misericordia da la bienvenida a tal conducta inapropiada como su manifestación sincera de amor: "tus pecados son perdonados. Vete en paz" (7:48, 50). Ella se puede ir no sólo en "paz", sino también, con la seguridad de un cambio de vida y la envolvía la certeza de la misericordia de Dios. Ella es anónima, "conocida en la ciudad" como "una mujer pecadora" (7:37). El personaje con nombre y título religioso, "Simón el fariseo" (7:36, 40), le juzga duramente, y así pierde la misericordia de Dios.

Este Año Jubilar de la Misericordia nos desafía al autoexamen. ¿En qué papel estamos nosotros más a menudo, humilde pecador o fariseo con prejuicios? Jesús
