

# THOUGHTS FROM FR. DAVID LAWRENCE

## EPIPHANY—GOD'S PLAN

My first recollection of Epiphany, at about the age of 4 or 5, was to crawl under the Christmas tree and gaze at all the figures in the nativity set. There they were ---the three kings or magi. They were the best-dressed in the nativity and they brought expensive gifts. The story says that they followed a star that led them to the Christ child.



It never occurred to me to question whether the magi traveled only at night. That's when stars shine, certainly a dangerous option for crossing the desert in the Middle East. And where did they come from? Why would it be so important for them to make a long journey to a child born in poverty? Once they inquire from Herod and his court, who are nominal Jews, why is it that Herod and his court of Jews don't join the magi on their journey?


As I have grown older and read between the lines of this amazing story, I discover that these magi are the first foreigners to come to see the Christ. The Messiah is not born only for the Jews but for all people. The first reading from Isaiah emphasizes this point: that "nations" shall come to the light. That's more than Israel. Paul will say emphatically in our second reading that the Gentiles are coheirs and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel. So rather than a very narrow outreach to the Jewish people, it appears that Christ is born for everyone. We may take this for granted, but it has not always been evident. When I was a Jesuit novice in Louisiana, the Society administered two churches in a small town, one for the black folk, one for white folk. There were historical and cultural reasons for this division, one that the Society eventually corrected by merging the two churches. Still, this earlier separation demonstrated an ugly sign of diminishing people unlike ourselves.

The revelation that Christ is born for all people is more than a concept. It actually has to do with behaviors and the way we treat other people. What is being revealed is *God's plan* for the world. The magi story points to God's love and mercy for the human race. All people are invited into God's holy embrace. There can be no conditions that exclude a person from God's love.

As we look out onto the world of our present time, we discover so many artificial barriers of human construction and exclusion. People who are poor are put in a certain class. People who belong to a minority or racial grouping find themselves separated. People who practice another religion or hold immigrant status find themselves pushed aside and threatened by the people who have power. The misguided temptation is to build a wall. In the political sphere, we find our country divided after the last election. We find it difficult to speak to one another, and characteristically, we don't begin by listening. Politicians have a way of stoking fear in the hearts of people who have a narrower experience. We are not born to fear the other. We grow into prejudice by observation.

Epiphany is a clarion call to embrace our common life with our sisters and brothers. We desire peace, harmony and security. We want to work with dignity and live as beloved creatures in God's image. But so often, we do not envision that these same desires hold true for the person disagreeing with us. Herod obviously felt threatened by the news of another king. He superficially and fearfully reacted that he might lose control. His response was violence. The response in our own times is often a violent one, based on prejudice or fear of the unknown. Pope Francis, a man of peace, offers us the example of one who fosters dialog even in the most contentious of situations.

What will it take for our world, our nation, to open our hearts to our sisters and brothers who are different from ourselves? The Epiphany cannot take hold in us until we pray for the Light of this World to change us. This may be a good day to pray for Jesus' eyes and heart that allow us to see our sisters and brothers with new eyes and embrace them with God's kindness and compassion. God's plan, the Epiphany, begins in our hearts.





# PENSAMIENTOS DEL PADRE DAVID LAWRENCE

## EPIFANIA – EL PLAN DE DIOS

Mi primer recuerdo de la Epifanía, es cuando tenía 4 o 5 años más o menos, y recuerdo gatear debajo del árbol de Navidad y contemplar todas las figuras en el Nacimiento.



Allí estaban--los tres reyes magos. Eran los mejores vestidos de la Natividad y traían regalos costosos. La historia dice que siguieron una estrella que les condujo al niño Jesús.

Nunca se me ocurrió hacerme la pregunta que si los Reyes Magos viajaban solamente en la noche. Es entonces cuando las estrellas brillan, sin duda una opción peligrosa para cruzar el desierto en el Medio Oriente. ¿Y de dónde proceden? ¿Por qué sería tan importante para ellos hacer un viaje largo a un niño nacido en la pobreza? Una vez que preguntaron a Herodes y su corte que son los judíos nominales, ¿por qué es que Herodes y su corte de judíos no se unieron a los Reyes Magos en su viaje?

Según he ido envejeciendo y leo entre las líneas de esta increíble historia, descubro que estos magos son los primeros extranjeros en venir a ver al Cristo. El Mesías no ha nacido sólo para los judíos sino para todas las personas. La primera lectura de Isaías destaca este punto: "las Naciones" vendrán a la luz. Es más que Israel. Pablo dirá enfáticamente en nuestra segunda lectura que los Gentiles son coherederos y partícipes de la promesa en Cristo Jesús a través del Evangelio. Así que, en lugar de un alcance muy estrecho para el pueblo judío, parece que Cristo ha nacido para todos. Podríamos tomar esto por costumbre, pero no siempre ha sido evidente. Cuando estaba en el noviciado Jesuita en Luisiana, la sociedad administraba dos iglesias en una ciudad pequeña, una para la gente negra, uno para la gente blanca. Hubo razones históricas y culturales de esta división, que la sociedad finalmente corrigió uniendo las dos iglesias. Esta separación anterior demostró un signo feo de disminución de personas a diferencia de nosotros.

La revelación de que Cristo ha nacido para todas las personas es más que un concepto. Realmente tiene que ver con comportamientos y la forma en que tratamos a otras personas. Lo que está siendo revelado es el plan de Dios para el mundo. La historia de los Reyes Magos nos muestra el amor y misericordia de Dios para la humanidad. Están invitadas todas las personas en el abrazo Santo de Dios. No puede haber condiciones que excluyan a una persona del amor de Dios

Así como miramos el mundo en nuestro tiempo presente, descubrimos muchas barreras artificiales de construcción humana y exclusión. Personas que son pobres se ponen en una cierta clase. Personas que pertenecen a una minoría o agrupación racial se encuentran separados. Personas que practican otra religión o mantienen la condición de inmigrante se encuentran relegados y amenazados por las personas que tienen poder. La tentación equivocada es construir una pared. En el ámbito político, se encuentra nuestro país dividido después de la última elección. Encontramos difícil hablar uno al otro, y característico, no empezamos por escuchar. Los políticos tienen una manera de inculcar temor en los corazones de las personas que tienen una experiencia más estrecha. No nacemos para dar miedo a otro. Crecemos en perjuicio por observaciones.

Epifanía es un toque de Clarín para abrazar nuestra vida común con nuestros hermanos y hermanas. Deseamos paz, armonía y seguridad. Queremos trabajar con dignidad y vivir como criaturas amadas a la imagen de Dios. Pero tan a menudo, no prevemos que estos deseos verdaderos para la persona están en desacuerdo con nosotros. Herodes obviamente se retiró amenazado por la noticia de otro rey. Superficialmente y temeroso reaccionaba porque él podría perder el control. Su respuesta fue la violencia. La respuesta en nuestros tiempos es a menudo violenta, basados en prejuicios o miedos a lo desconocido. El Papa Francisco, hombre de paz, nos ofrece el ejemplo de quien promueve el diálogo incluso en las situaciones más polémicas.

¿Qué haremos para que nuestro mundo, nuestra nación, abra nuestros corazones a nuestros hermanos y hermanas que son diferentes de nosotros mismos? La Epifanía no puede afianzarse en nosotros hasta que no oremos para que la Luz de este mundo nos cambie. Esto puede ser un buen día para orar para que los ojos de Jesús y su corazón nos permitan ver a

nuestros hermanos y hermanas con nuevos ojos y abrazarlos con bondad y compasión de Dios. El plan de Dios, la Epifanía, comienza en nuestros corazones.

## LA EPIFANÍA O MANIFESTACIÓN DEL SEÑOR

Queridos hermanos y hermanas celebramos la Epifanía del Señor: la manifestación del Señor, pues él se reveló a los paganos en la persona de los magos. Los nombres que se les ha atribuido a los tres reyes magos son: Melchor, Gaspar y Baltasar. Los magos supieron utilizar sus conocimientos – en su caso la astronomía de su tiempo y descubrir al Salvador prometido por medio de Israel, a todos los hombres. Los magos llegados al lugar donde estaba el niño con María su madre, ofrecieron oro, incienso y mirra, sustancias preciosas en las que la tradición ha querido ver el reconocimiento implícito de la realeza mesiánica de Cristo (oro), de su divinidad (incienso), y de su humanidad (mirra).

### La Rosca de Reyes

Cada 6 de Enero se celebra la Rosca de Reyes, que es una tradición mexicana y nos recuerda la llegada de los tres reyes magos a visitar al niño Dios. Pero, ¿cuál es el significado de la rosca de reyes? La rosca es un pan de forma circular que representa una corona, la cual se adorna con frutos secos y cristalizados de colores, simulando las joyas que estaban incrustadas en las coronas de los Santos Reyes que significan Paz, Amor y Felicidad. También, la Rosca de reyes representa la corona de adviento que es circular y significa que el amor de Dios no tiene principio ni fin. Los dulces o frutos cristalizados son las distracciones del mundo que nos impide encontrar a Jesús. Tradicionalmente en la rosca de reyes se introduce la imagen del niño Jesús y hace referencia a que Herodes quería matarlo y sus padres lo escondieron y en este sentido solo podía encontrarlo la persona que tiene buen corazón.

La Rosca de Reyes es una tradición que nos une, que hace que todas las familias se unan para compartir y disfrutar de la rosca y ver a quien le sale el niño Dios pequeño en medio del pan, que será quien lo cuide hasta el 2 de febrero, lo vestirá y lo presentará al templo como lo presentó la virgen María.
