Part I: Reading Comprehension

For **each chapter**, complete the following:

- 1. **Chapter Summary** (3–5 sentences): Describe the major events of the chapter.
- 2. **New Characters/Creatures Introduced:** List and briefly describe any new ones **if there are any**.
- 3. **Important Quote:** Choose one meaningful quote and explain why you think it's important or interesting (2–4 sentences).

You may write these logs by hand or type them. Make sure they are **neat and organized**.

Example:

Chapter 1: "An Unexpected Party"

1. Chapter Summary:

Bilbo Baggins, a quiet hobbit who loves comfort and routine, is unexpectedly visited by Gandalf the wizard. Soon after, thirteen dwarves arrive at Bilbo's home, turning his peaceful evening into a loud and chaotic party. The leader of the dwarves, Thorin Oakenshield, explains that they are on a quest to reclaim their homeland and treasure from the dragon Smaug. To Bilbo's surprise, Gandalf has chosen him to join the adventure as their burglar. Though nervous and unsure, Bilbo is swept up in their plans.

2. New Characters/Creatures Introduced:

- **Bilbo Baggins:** A polite, comfort-loving hobbit who is unexpectedly invited on an adventure.
- **Gandalf:** A wise and mysterious wizard who believes Bilbo has hidden potential.
- Thorin Oakenshield: The proud and determined leader of the dwarves.
- **The Dwarves:** Dwalin, Balin, Kili, Fili, Dori, Nori, Ori, Oin, Gloin, Bifur, Bofur, and Bombur—all with unique personalities and skills.

3. Important Quote:

- "'I am looking for someone to share in an adventure that I am arranging, and it's very difficult to find anyone.'"
- → This quote is important because it sets the stage for the entire story. It shows how rare and special it is to go on an adventure in the world of hobbits, and it hints that Bilbo's life is about to change in a big way.

Part II: Creative Activity: "Middle-earth Passport" Project

Your "Middle-earth Passport" should include:

- 1. **Cover Page:** Title ("Bilbo's Passport"), your name, and a drawing of what you think Bilbo might look like.
- 2. **Stamped Locations**: Choose **5 major locations** Bilbo visits (e.g., The Shire, Rivendell, Mirkwood, etc.). For each:
 - Draw or decorate a "stamp" for the location.
 - Write a short **travel entry** (4–6 sentences) from Bilbo's perspective describing the place, what happened there, and how he felt.
- 3. **Travel Companion Page**: Choose **two characters** who traveled with or helped Bilbo. Write a short paragraph about who they are and how they contributed to the journey.
- 4. **Final Reflection Page:** Write a paragraph (5–7 sentences) on how Bilbo changed from the beginning of the book to the end.

Be creative! You can draw, use color, include maps or symbols, or even design it like a real passport.
