Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I would like to focus the next few weeks on the idea of Christian Atheists, which is a contradiction so let me explain. A Christian, and especially a Catholic, is a person that believes in God who sent his

Son to this earth and lived here as a normal man and died a very gruesome death, rose from it, ascended into heaven and sent his Holy Spirit to his first followers who started a community of believers that still exists today.

On the other hand, an atheist says God is dead or never existed and is part of this wishful thinking for kids, something like Santa Claus. So the Christian Atheist is a contradiction in terms. However, often people say one thing and even believe it intellectually, but their thoughts, words and actions say something entirely different. They often reflect the way of being of an atheist because there is a disconnect between what people say and how they act. St. James tells us in his letter that Christians need to be doers of the Word, not just hearers.

I am as guilty of this as you and maybe you know people who have left the Church because of this. This series will try to bridge this gap, and we will look at several key ideas where we seem to live our life as if we do not believe that God is present. This week we will look at the biggest way we live and think as those who don't believe in God, and the first one.

We hear of the creation account in Genesis and we do not have to believe that this happened in seven days. This is written in a Jewish or Eastern mentality and is told not in the same way that we would tell it. It is written with symbols in a way that we would not and is easy to misinterpret. So I invite you to humbly listen to see the deep truths that God is trying to tell us.

The author tells us that God formed man out of the clay or dirt of the ground and blew into his mouth the breath of life. He doesn't just say, "Let there be man." He tells it in a very personalistic way. It sounds like an artist molding someone out of clay. He breathes into our mouth. It is hard to find a more intimate image of creation.

Then he sets up this fantastic garden surrounding our first parents (you and me) with a special environment so that we thrive. He sees that man is not good to be alone and God creates a partner for man. But the serpent comes to tell Eve a few very subtle lies and she believes him and so does Adam, and so do you. And this is often repeated in our lives. It is not too late to Come and listen to the Catechesis on Christian Initiation.


REMEMBER ST. BERNARD'S IN YOUR WILL

ROMAN MISSAL ON THE ALTAR

(From the English translation of the Roman Missal, 2010) 296. The altar, on which is effected the Sacrifice of the Cross made present under sacramental signs, is also the table of the Lord to which the People of God is convoked to participate in the Mass, and it is also the center of thanksgiving that is accomplished through the Eucharist.

297. The celebration of the Eucharist in a sacred place is to take place on an altar; however, outside a sacred place, it may take place on a suitable table...

298. It is desirable that in every church there be a fixed altar, since this is more clearly and permanently signifies Christ Jesus, the Living Stone.

299. The altar should be built separate from the wall, in such a way that it is possible to walk around it easily and that Mass can be celebrated at it facing the people. The altar should occupy a place where it is the center toward which the attention of the whole congregation of the faithful naturally turns. The altar should be fixed and dedicated.

300. An altar should be dedicated according to the rite prescribed in the Roman Pontifical...

301. In keeping with the Church's traditional practice and with what the altar signifies, the table of a fixed altar should be of stone and indeed of natural stone. In the Dioceses of the United States of America, wood which is dignified, solid and well crafted may be used, provided the altar is structurally immobile...

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
