From Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

This week we hear a parable that complements the one of the Sower from last week. The parables of the gospels need to rest in us before we can be fully conscious of

their meaning for us today, and they have an importance for all of us. Did you notice that the explanation of the parable takes place back in the house? This shows a greater intimacy that Jesus Christ has with his disciples, and would like to have with us. He doesn't come to save the crowds but to save individuals, you and me. And we need to continue abiding in his presence in order to understand him, and his words on the Kingdom.

The disciples insist strongly on having Jesus explain the parable to them. They are really hungry for the truth. It is not superficiality or earthly concerns that distract them this week, but someone much more serious, the Devil, as Jesus tells to them.

This parable is very unique in two ways: first, that the identity of the seeds and the weeds is plainly told. The second surprise is the toleration of the evil growth of the weeds among the wheat. The Devil has to penetrate the field in the middle of the night, by stealth. And he does so only for one reason: to choke the wheat.

Jesus knows immediately who sowed the weeds and he knew it probably before the wheat was sown, and he sows anyway. After the damage is done he has a real concern for the wheat and forbids the slaves from pulling out the weeds. The servants have good intentions; however, they are wrong and are impatient to purge the field and the world from sin. It is easy for us to assume we are the pure ones, the ones with the light and yet why do we have this fear when we see evil in others? Jesus reminds them and us that their mission is to win disciples, and not to judge those around them, and not to be afraid. Let us do the same.

SAINT OF THE WEEK: St. James the Apostle

The English name "James" comes from Italian "Giacomo", a variant of "Giacobo" derived from lacobus (Jacob) in Latin, itself from the Greek $I\acute{a}$ $\kappa \omega \delta o \zeta$ "Iakōbos", from

Hebrew יַּעְקֹב. In French, Jacob evolves into
"Jacques". In eastern Spain, Iacobus (Jacobus) became
"Jacome" or "Jaime"; in Catalan language, it became
"Jaume". Santiago is the local Galician or Spanish
(Castilian) evolution of Vulgar Latin Sanctu
Iacobu "Saint James". "Tiago" is a popular deglutination native to Portuguese language (santiago = santiago = São Tiago); it crossed with old Diago to give
"Diego" in Spanish and "Diogo" in Portuguese, which is also the Spanish name of Saint Didacus of Alcalá.
For example, Miguel de Cervantes in his famous Don Quixote uses "San Diego" instead of "Santiago".

He is depicted clothed as a pilgrim; note the scallop shell on his shoulder and his staff and pilgrim's hat beside him. Saint James is the patron saint of Spain and, according to legend, his remains are held in Santiago de Compostela in Galicia. The traditional pilgrimage to the grave of the saint, known as the "Way of St. James", has been the most popular pilgrimage for Western European Catholics from the Early Middle Ages onwards, although its modern revival and popularity stems from Walter Starkie's 1957 book, The Road to Santiago. The Pilgrims of St. James. Some 237,886 pilgrims registered in 2014 as having completed the final 100 km walk (200 km by bicycle) to Santiago to qualify for a Compostela. When 25 July falls on a Sunday, it is a "Jubilee" year (an Año Santo Jubilar Compostelano or Año Santo Jacobeo) and a special east door is opened for entrance into Santiago Cathedral. Jubilee years fall every 5, 6, and 11 years. In the 2004 Jubilee year, 179,944pilgrims received a Compostela. In 2010 the number had risen to 275,135.
