Dear Brothers and Sisters,

A World Beyond we ponder the beauty of a wedding feast where the ten virgins represent Christians waiting for Christ. He may be slow in coming but they must be watchful and keep their lamps burning. Jesus' burning concern for the Kingdom and

his desire to find new and creative ways to describe it is striking. The reality of this Kingdom must be so intensely rich and multi-layered that even human language used by the Word Incarnate cannot fully describe it. How could it be otherwise since the Kingdom of God is nothing less than the full participation in the very life of God? Only the Son can reveal this to humankind.

This Parable of the Ten Virgins is only found in Matthew and so must have held a special significance in his vision of the Kingdom. He goes on to say, "Then the Kingdom will be like..." He gives one the impression that its eruption into our human world is around the corner. This idea of a marriage feast is not just a metaphor of the Kingdom but actually states that the Kingdom of God is a Marriage Feast. Every nuptial experience is a revelation of the Kingdom.

Jesus says that these ten virgins do not go out to meet *a* bridegroom, but *the* Bridegroom, and this encounter is what the kingdom will be like. It is mysterious that there is no mention of a bride. The very heart of the parable is readiness and willingness to engage in a wedding celebration, and having enough oil to generate light. The *light* acts as the symbol of the glory of God's love erupting into our world in the person of Christ and the wholehearted joy when men reciprocate God's advances. The oil represents man's self-surrender, which provides the "fuel" to enable God's love to be a shining light.

This great encounter between God and mankind is a spousal encounter. Other metaphors give a partial view of the encounter, only marriage imagery ultimately does justice to the deepest nature of the God-man relationship. It is an image recurring consistently throughout Scripture and perhaps is the most comprehensive one. Due to Mary's fiat (let it be done) the Most High has taken to himself a bride and conceived his Son in time and in the flesh. In her flesh our human nature is married to the divine nature in Jesus Christ. In and with Mary, the whole human race becomes the Bride of God.

By Mary's highly personal and all-engaging surrender to God can his will take root in our world. How beautiful and mysterious that these nuptials of a Creator Lord uniting his creature to himself as spouse takes place under the humble and very ordinary form of the marriage of a lowly Jewish couple in Galilee. As we saw in the parable of the wedding feast the guests are the bride, which is the Church! The gospel reminds us that the Lord delights in you and wants to marry you!

# A CATECHESIS FOR ADULTS AND YOUNG PEOPLE COME AND LISTEN TO THE ANNOUNCEMENT OF GOOD NEWS

This week we will see how the Word of God acting, accompanying and surpassing our history, which God is making with each one of us.

This is the last week remaining in the talks and it is not too late to come or join us for the weekend retreat from Friday 9 pm to Sunday 4 pm.

In a few short months you will see how many questions of your life are answered and your knowledge of the Bible will help you to understand and be grateful for your life.

For sure there is someone in your life who is going through a tough time so bring them and come & listen.

Visiting the Graves of Loved Ones: This month is a traditional time for visiting the graves of loved ones. Rooted in ancient tradition, St. Odilo of Cluny established a memorial of all the faithful departed in 988 AD. St. Augustine reminds us: "If we had no care for the dead, we would not be in the habit of praying for them." The theological basis of this feast is the acknowledgment of human frailty. Since few people achieve perfection in this life, but, rather, go to the grave still scarred with traces of sinfulness, some period of purification seems necessary before a soul comes face-to-face with God. Please remember to pray for the souls of the dead. To bury the dead is a corporal work of mercy, to pray for the dead is the spiritual work of mercy.

The Church teaches that every spiritual soul is created immediately by God - it is not "produced" by the parents - and also that it is immortal: it does not perish when it separates from the body at death, and it will be reunited with the body at the final Resurrection. Catechism of The Catholic Church, 366.

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
