

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Happy New Year! I hope your Christmas season was blessed in many ways as it comes to a close tomorrow. It is true that we all desire happiness and we are hoping for it in the New Year. But God does not want you to be

happy; he wants something more for you than sheer happiness. Let's look at today's gospel to get a look at what God really wants for you.

You know this gospel and it comes from Matthew and it tells of the magi who come from the East in search of the Messiah. They are pagan foreigners, completely unchurched, unreligious people who are one of the first to comprehend that Jesus is someone special. The religious people miss out on who Jesus is, while the shepherds and Persian Wise Men get it.

They had every reason not to follow the star since they had no idea where they were going, the trip was difficult and dangerous, and there were no promises that the star would lead to anything. However, there were clearly looking for something more in life. They were people of affluence who enjoyed the possibility of travel and in view of the gifts they brought. They lived a comfortable life, but were looking for something more. Discontent is not what we are looking for, but it can often lead us to something great when it motivates us to take action.

They go to King Herod asking for this newborn King of the Jews and Herod learns that this child is to come to Bethlehem and he plots to kill him. The star leads the Magi to the Holy Family and they prostrate themselves, worship him and open their gifts. Their worship is active, if not it is not really worship!

At the end Matthew tells us that they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy. For us there are different levels of well-being. One is on the physical plane, which we call pleasure and usually has to do with our senses. God created pleasure and wants us to enjoy a good meal or song or a nice chair. But this is something that passes. The next level is something more interior and includes experiences like happiness, contentment, and gratitude. Hopefully after time with family and friends these weeks you had this experience.

Saint of the Week: Elizabeth Ann Seton

Mother Seton is one of the keystones of the American Catholic Church. She founded the first American religious community for women, the Sisters of Charity. She opened the first American parish school and established the first American Catholic orphanage. All this she did in the span of 46 years while raising her five children.

Elizabeth Ann Bayley Seton is a true daughter of the American Revolution, born August 28, 1774, just two years before the Declaration of Independence. By birth and marriage, she was linked to the first families of New York and enjoyed the fruits of high society. Reared a staunch Episcopalian, she learned the value of prayer, Scripture and a nightly examination of conscience. Her father, Dr. Richard Bayley, did not have much use for churches but was a great humanitarian, teaching his daughter to love and serve others.

The early deaths of her mother in 1777 and her baby sister in 1778 gave Elizabeth a feel for eternity and the temporariness of the pilgrim life on earth. Far from being brooding and sullen, she faced each new "holocaust," as she put it, with hopeful cheerfulness. At 19, Elizabeth was the belle of New York and married a handsome, wealthy businessman, William Magee Seton. They had five children before his business failed and he died of tuberculosis. At 30, Elizabeth was widowed, penniless, with five small children to support.

While in Italy with her dying husband, Elizabeth witnessed Catholicity in action through family friends. Three basic points led her to become a Catholic: belief in the Real Presence, devotion to the Blessed Mother and conviction that the Catholic Church led back to the apostles and to Christ. Many of her family and friends rejected her when she became a Catholic in 1805.

To support her children, she opened a school in Baltimore. From the beginning, her group followed the lines of a religious community, which was officially founded in 1809. The thousand or more letters of Mother Seton reveal the development of her spiritual life from ordinary goodness to heroic sanctity. She suffered great trials of sickness, misunderstanding, the death of loved ones (her husband and two young daughters) and the heartache of a wayward son. She died January 4, 1821, and became the first Americanborn citizen to be beatified (1963) and then canonized (1975). She is buried in Emmitsburg, Maryland.

Elizabeth Seton had no extraordinary gifts. She was not a mystic or stigmatic. She did not prophesy or speak in tongues. She had two great devotions: abandonment to the will of God and an ardent love for the Blessed Sacrament.
