PARISH CATECHISM CLASSES 2016-2017

Catechism classes are scheduled to begin in our parish with an ORIENTATION SESSION for parents/guardians and children at 10:15 a.m. on Sunday, September 11th in the parish hall.

We are excited to begin using this fall a new catechetical program in our parish which might be a better fit for our circumstances. As a great alternative to more expensive textbooks, the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies* is a liturgically-based catechetical program that provides weekly handouts with a short description of the Sunday Gospel plus suggested activities and discussion starters for each age level. In keeping with the seasons and feasts of the liturgical year, children in class and with their families can have fun while learning about Jesus, his Church and the teachings of our faith.

FAITH FORMATION PROGRAM**

Those who would like their children to take part in catechism classes are asked to submit a completed REGISTRATION FORM for each child as soon as possible so we may better assess the situation and be sure to have the adequate materials required. As recommended by our Parish Visioning and Strategic Planning Committee, a catechism registration fee is being instituted this year (as is done in most parishes) to help defray some of the costs of running our program. Nevertheless, this requested fee should in no way be considered a reason to refrain from enrolling children for whose parents the fee would impose an undue hardship.

If we have enough volunteers to serve as catechists and assistants, according to the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies* program we can provide catechetical classes divided into the following age groups: SEEDS (Preschool), PROMISE (Kindergarten – Grade 1), GOOD NEWS (Grades 2-3), VENTURE (GRADES 4-6) and VISIONS (Grades 7-8). The lessons provided for Sundays of long weekends and at Christmastime may be given out beforehand to the students so they may be utilized at home.

As a rule, each Sunday children participating in our parish catechism program gather in the parish hall with their parents/guardians by 10:15 a.m. for some initial prayers and announcements. Then children break into their various catechetical groups and proceed with their catechists to their designated classrooms. Parents/guardians are asked to return to the parish hall by 11:15 a.m. to be ready to pick up their children.

We are in urgent need of volunteers to serve as catechists and assistants for each designated catechetical group. If you are willing to help in any way, please advise Sharon Camier (our Pastoral Assistant) or Father Robert Polz (our Pastor) as soon as possible. Let us all pray for volunteers and for the success of our program.

We are hoping to designate the lounge area downstairs as a place where parents may choose to gather for coffee, refreshments and fellowship while their children are in catechism classes. If anyone wants to volunteer to assist in the ministry of preparing coffee and refreshments for parents/guardians during catechism classes, please advise Sharon Camier or another member of our parish office staff.

PREPARATION FOR THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION

On **Sunday October 2nd at 1:15 p.m.** classes will begin for youth (and interested catholic adults not yet confirmed) who wish to prepare to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in 2017 to be conferred when the Archbishop comes to our parish sometime in the spring. A "Confirmation Commitment Ceremony" will tentatively take place during the 11:45 a.m. Sunday Mass on November 13, 2016. **Please contact Sharon Camier or Fr. Robert to register and to find out what the preparation program will entail.** We look forward to meeting our new confirmation candidates at our first preparation session on October 2nd.

OF DOORS, GATES, AND TABLES

Recently deceased Mother Angelica insisted that those who love us tell us the truth. Jesus loves us with a great bounty of truth, but we can be sure not everyone receives such love with gratitude. We've spent this year proclaiming a Jubilee of Mercy, widening the door of admittance to many who've been—or perhaps felt—uninvited and unwelcome. This open Door of Mercy is received by the wounded as a sign of God's relentless compassion and care. It's also viewed by the self-righteous as an indication that church standards are at an all-time low, and cheap grace is being given away at bargain-basement prices.

Why not? The sower sows the seed with abandon on his own soil. It's his to scatter extravagantly and even to waste if that's his preference.

Yet today's message seems to go in another direction. The open Door of Mercy is replaced with the metaphor of a Narrow Gate, through which many will find the way impassable. What's the difference between an open door and a narrow gate? In a word, girth. Luke's gospel pursues the theme that accumulating wealth, power, prestige, and even pious appearances acquires us nothing in the bank of heaven. Now comes the downbeat of that teaching: Not only does worldly advantage count for nothing useful, it's actually detrimental. It makes us too "big" to pass through the standards of heaven. The untrimmed ego strives to lumber through in vain.

The next metaphor is even more devastating: that of the Locked Door! Once the door is barred, size doesn't matter at all. We can vow to go on an all-alms diet at this point, but it's no use. The time for making the better choice has foreclosed. Even the Door of Mercy can't admit us if we've refused to seek it in the proper season, which is the season of the living. Jesus tells us the truth in love, but not all want to hear this. It's especially disconcerting to those who "ate and drank" in the company of the Lord—a stunning reference to early church members who thought that fidelity to the Table of the Lord was the be-all and end-all of Christian practice. They find themselves treated no better than "evildoers"! Even though they showed up routinely, the Lord treats them like strangers!

What's worse, folks from all points of the compass will find welcome through that same door: foreigners, the unclean, the patently unworthy, sitting at the table with patriarchs and prophets. Oh, how this truth would have shocked those around Jesus! And still does. If we hope to sit at the Kingdom table, the time to get in shape for that moral passage is now.

EARTHLY HONORS, KINGDOM GLORY

Once when I was giving a parish mission in a wealthy suburb, the pastor arranged lodgings for me with a humble family on the outskirts of town. While glad to meet this remarkable family, I was intrigued by the context in a very well-heeled community. As the pastor explained: "At the close of the mission, I want you to acknowledge the hospitality of this family. They are the poorest in our parish, yet they were the only ones who approached me to ask if they could host you during the mission."

How frequently this story is repeated across the church! Rarely is generosity offered in proportion to possessions. Instead, the most generous are often those with fewer resources. We give, not according to our means, but in response to our gratitude. Too often, the more we have, the more we credit ourselves with our hard work and resourcefulness.

In a similar way, places of honor in community are often meted out, not according to those who deserve to be honored, but to those who insist on being noticed. In every gathering, there are some who insist on presiding at the table's head, and others who meekly assume the lowest place. You can't tell, from this self-selected pecking order, who's worthy of attention. Often, your best bet for rewarding conversation is to sit as far from the celebrated positions as possible.

Jesus sat at enough tables to know that folks who claim the best seats are normally consumed with themselves and are not inclined to receive anything offered to them. What's the point of such conversation? The self-congratulating don't need a messiah. They are quite capable of saving themselves, or so they suspect. Perhaps Jesus secretly wished he could dine at night with the beggars, the outcasts, the sick, and the sinners he met along the way each day. Now, those conversations would be genuine, open, and revealing! Instead, he too often dined with the pious, the self-serving, the socially lauded. When I've been obliged to dine with such folks, I go home in need of aspirin.

It's easy to throw a dinner party for people you like, admire, and enjoy. People who are like you and share your opinions, values, and style. Imagine hosting a picnic for hundreds of homeless people who have few life experiences in common with you at all, like some friends of mine once did! It was a real picnic, with meat on the grill, corn on the cob, watermelon, cold sodas. When the police showed up questioning the gathering, they stayed to help with garbage collection and removal. Sometimes the rightness of a thing speaks for itself above all laws. Take a risk. Rearrange your table tonight.

WINNIPEG HARVEST ISSUES PLEA FOR KEY FOOD ITEMS

In was announced recently in the Winnipeg Free Press that Winnipeg Harvest has a shortage of key food items and needs our help. Members of the public are asked to donate whatever they can among the critically needed items of canned meat, canned beans, canned soup, canned fruit, rice and pasta. These items are needed to build food kits that are sent out to nearly 64,000 Manitobans who receive food monthly from Winnipeg Harvest, a press release said.

BUILDING ENVELOPE REPAIRS NEEDED

As most of us know, we have a good building. However, at 49 years of age it is starting to need some major maintenance and repair. To maintain the integrity of the *building envelope* (i.e. its outer shell), we need to replace many broken and cracked bricks and re-point the brick and decorative masonry trim panels. We have a quote for this work and would like to proceed prior to another freeze season. The cost of this work will be approximately \$12,500.00. So far, as of August 14th, a total of \$5,500.00 has been donated.

We are hoping to proceed with this work in September 2016, but we cannot proceed until we receive funds specific to this project. Therefore, I ask for your generosity towards this project. 

SHARING GOD'S GIFTS 2016

The total amount of the 2016 SGG's Appeal is \$1,944,100. This represents a 1.4% increase over the previous year, reflecting the impact of inflation. Our parish share of the 2016 Appeal is based on our parish's 2014 Offertory collection. **Thus, our Parish's appeal target for 2016 is \$50,670.** As of the end of July, **\$7,485.00** has been received through the parish office which represents **14.77%** of our parish appeal target for 2016. Once our workshop has taken place and the process of discernment and formation is complete, our Pastor will forward the names of those being called to this ministry to the Archbishop for (re)appointment and commissioning. Those hoping to serve or continue in this ministry especially to the sick and the shut-in are reminded to contact our pastoral assistant, Sharon, to make arrangements to complete police checks and other necessary safe environment requirements. God willing, by sometime in the fall the situation will be regularized with a new group of Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion commissioned in the appropriate liturgical rite by mandate of our Archbishop.
