2022 Wednesday Evening Lenten Retreat

Teacher and Lord: On the Last Supper

in Saint John XXIII Church immediately following 7:00 pm Mass (approx. 7:40 pm)

From the first centuries of Christianity, the forty days of Lent leading up to Holy Week have been a time of special significance. Lent is a name taken from the Old English word meaning "spring." The liturgical season of Lent is meant to be a time of spiritual spring-training, so to speak: six weeks during which we pay particular attention to prayer, penance, and works of mercy in order to prepare for Holy Week. The more deeply we live Lent, the more abundantly we will be able to receive the spiritual renewal that God wants to give us during the holiest days of the liturgical year. This retreat on the Last Supper will help to make that happen. We are holding this retreat in parts over two Wednesday evenings. The first



evening of the retreat consisting of the Introduction, First Meditation and Second Meditation was held on March 30th.

The second and concluding evening of the retreat featuring the RETREAT CONFERENCE will be held on WEDNESDAY, APRIL 6, 2022. Videos and printed resources are provided each Wednesday retreat evening to facilitate personal reflection and/or small group discussion. SOLIDARITY SUNDAY REFLECTION

The Lightning bolt of solidarity

A subtle theme emerges through our readings on this Solidarity Sunday: God's deliverance of people from danger to celebration. Isaiah recalls the parting of the Red Sea, swallowing the army of Pharoah. "I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert," God says (Isaiah 43:19). The psalmist celebrates the return of captives, saying "May those who sow in tears reap with shouts of joy" (Psalm 126:5). In the Gospel, we witness Jesus cleverly saving a woman accused of adultery from being stoned, giving her the liberating words, "Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again." (John 8:11)

From the dramatic miracle of Exodus saving a people who had been enslaved by the Egyptians, to Jesus's wisdom saving a single woman from violence, our readings give us the image of a God of solidarity, one who sides with the oppressed and makes a way for them, even when it feels impossible.

The Scriptures are full of stories like these, where God transforms a moment of turbulence and uncertainty into a moment of liberation. But this transformation is never a one- way process, as though humans were passive playthings on God's cosmic chessboard. God does not teleport the Israelites away from Egypt, but works with Moses; Jesus does not hypnotize the crowd laying a trap for him, but offers them an opportunity to consider their own consciences. We are invited to participate in solidarity—with God, with each other, and with the planet—on the path to liberation.

I like to think of this participation as a lightning bolt. When we see lightning, we often imagine that it erupts from the roiling clouds above to strike the ground below. Yet, the reality is much more interesting. As water particles bump around in the clouds, they create invisible negative charges at the bottom of the clouds. Since opposites attract, positive charges on the ground rise to meet the negative charges in the clouds. When the two charges meet, an electrical current flashes in an instant, producing the bolts of lightning that we are most familiar with. Remarkably, while this whole process begins with the gathering energy up above, the visible flash of lightning actually crackles up from the ground!

Solidarity is like that. As God's desire for justice churns in the heavens, our individual desires for justice stack on top of each other below, attracted to what the Spirit is doing. When the divine and human charges connect, a streak of light allows us to see, however briefly, our whole world in a new way.

It is only through our collective action that we can create enough energy on the ground for something remarkable to occur. On this Solidarity Sunday, Development and Peace invites you to participate in our global movement for solidarity. A single donation may not feel as powerful as lightning. But a multitude of donations, a multitude of positive charges, can change the horizon.

Like the charges accumulating in the clouds, God's desire for justice is not always visible, but it is nevertheless a constant, intensifying and attracting force. "I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" God says in Isaiah. This Lent, let us perceive and gather to meet what new thing God is doing in these dangerous times. As God's justice springs forth, may it find a people charged and ready to meet it, responding with a lightning bolt of solidarity.

EXPLORING THE WORD

The servant will lead


When someone shouts, "Follow the leader!" most of us know instinctively what to do. We get behind the person who's ahead of the pack. Generally speaking, the leader is the dominant one, perhaps the fastest or smartest among us, but not necessarily so. Often, the leader is simply the one with the most power, money, chutzpah, or the greatest amount of celebrity. Much of the time, we end up following a leader who is not morally superior or ahead of us in any meaningful sense. The person in command may wind up in that position mostly for having claimed it.

Leadership—whether it's exercised in families, government, business, or religious institutions—is largely wielded from the top down. We expect that parents will administer authority over their children, just as lawmakers govern their constituencies, employers make decisions for their employees, bishops instruct their priests, and priests run their parishes. Leadership is about big people controlling the fate of little people, in a nutshell. Is there any other way of envisioning this?

There is. At the Last Supper, the disciples of Jesus are still arguing about leadership and authority in terms of who gets to be on top. They are trying to define greatness as the capacity to lord it over their peers, to be granted distinguishing titles and special powers of authority. Meanwhile Jesus, contemplating the hour of his death, asks them to consider leadership from the bottom up—from the viewpoint of service. From the servant's perspective, leadership is not about control but about surrender. This kind of leadership doesn't concern itself with honors and titles but remains focused on smaller, immediate details like serving at table, washing feet, and breaking bread. The servant leader does not get out in front of the crowd but leads by example at its feet. Such leadership doesn't require special skills or even charisma. Humility and love will suffice.

The cross is the way

How does Jesus lead? By exercising what the church calls works of mercy, which are the paramount acts of service. Throughout his ministry, Jesus instructs the ignorant, forgives the sinner, heals the sick, feeds the hungry. Even during the excruciating hours of his final Passion, we find Jesus still teaching his disciples, praying for Peter's repentance before his denial, warning the arresting elders of their wrongdoing, and comforting the sorrowful women on the way of the cross. In Luke's account of the Crucifixion, Jesus' three last acts are to forgive his persecutors, encourage a sinner, and surrender his spirit to God. When the prevailing attitude is mercy, every act is one of gentle concern for the well-being of others. How often did Jesus say that the least are the greatest and the last will be first? His final act of service on the cross is to demonstrate what that looks like.



Needless to say, not many people are rushing forward to assume this kind of leadership. The servant who does not shield his face from spitting is a far cry from the contemporary mogul who organizes a press conference to "spin" the latest accusation in his favor. Jesus, before high priest and governor alike, is mostly silent when others testify falsely against him. If the Lord God is his help, the faithful servant cannot be disgraced by human testimony. The one who refused to lord it over others will one day be confessed as Lord by every creature on bended knee in heaven, on Earth, and under the Earth. Humility is the only way to genuine exaltation.

Worldly leaders won't get it

Obviously, Judas didn't comprehend this most basic of Jesus' teachings. He thought he alone was the true leader among sheeplike disciples, capable of changing the course of this runaway mission by his own initiative. Peter shared this same obtuseness about the direction things were taking. When his teacher talked about suffering and death, Peter heartily objected. When Jesus was actually on trial, Peter publicly disassociated himself from the danger.

Certainly the high priest thought his own authority—compromised by his association with the Romans yet still privileged—was a more practical application of leadership than what Jesus was up to. Herod was even more of a figurehead than Caiaphas, enjoying only the veneer of authority and yet preferring not to disturb that with an authentic exercise of judgment. Pilate did not seem particularly challenged by Jesus or his alleged authority. But that's because he was so firmly convinced of the absolute power of the empire behind him. Those who equate leadership with control will find it impossible to appreciate the one who leads by the example of service.

It would seem that the only true leaders of the day were the ones who escaped the public eye. Joseph of Arimathea, who refused to be a yes-man for an unjust council, took it upon himself to bury a condemned and executed criminal. The women from Galilee noted the place of the tomb and resolved to prepare the body properly. By exercising these final corporal works of mercy, these disciples proved that they had been paying attention when Jesus demonstrated servant leadership all along the way.
