



Each year, on Friday before Laetare Sunday, in St. Peter's Basilica Pope Francis presides at a Penitential Celebration opening the "24 Hours for the Lord" initiative.

God is the Rock of salvation from which flows living water.


Romans 5:1-2, 5-8

EXPLORING THE WORD



Living water for the asking

The Israelites are grumbling again. What is their problem? No matter what God does for them, they are never satisfied. A nation out of a childless couple? Check. A land for a race of wanderers to call their own? No problem. Rescue from famine into the abundance of Egypt? You got it. Rescue *from* Egypt when a good deal goes sour? Sure thing. A sea parted when helpful, and restored to its vigor just in time? Absolutely. A divine law to guide them? God is on it. The divine presence indwelling in their community? God is happy to come along for the ride.

And still they grumble, these ungrateful hoards, sounding so much like . . . like us, sometimes. Now it's water; next it's bread; later it's meat. And pretty soon they'll be whining about after-dinner mints. Now, I realize that bread and water are rather basic things and life is a dicey proposition without them for long. The people have a right to be concerned, and you and I would be first in line to wail if our own supply were uncertain. It's just that *this* nation in *this*particular generation ought to know better than to doubt that they are provided for. God has just proven a cosmic interest in their fate. God has taken more than mere interest: The Lord has taken up residence in the Tent of Presence and is right on board day after day. All they have to do is ask: Give us this day our daily bread. And it's done. Don't they know that?

Thirteen hundred years later, Jesus will be teaching that prayer to his disciples, who evidently still don't know that daily bread is one of God's routine commitments. It's there for the asking. Yet we don't ask. We choose to grumble.

Is the Lord in our midst or not?

It's not about stuff. And it's not necessarily about miracles, although I don't mind when human need is met in inexplicable ways. The matter with the Israelites—and the woman at the well—and us while we're on the subject—is trust. God has been as clear as daylight about being concerned for, compassionate toward, and close to the human situation. For the Israelites, God was in the Tent. In the time of Jesus, God was in the Man. For Catholics, God is in the word and sacrament, indwelling in the Tabernacle and in the Body of Christ the Church, and in the believer through the power of the Holy Spirit. God is also in the face of human need, in the neighbor and the stranger. You want to stand in the presence of God? I would say it's the easiest thing in the world. The hardest thing is to hide from the presence of God. And yet that's what we pretend to do all the time, ostrich-like, talking and acting like God's not in earshot. So we grumble about what God's not doing, instead of asking for what we need like genuine believers.

"Is the Lord in our midst or not?" the Israelites asked at Massah and Meribah. God might have replied, "You tell me!" God might say the same to us. God dwells with us; that's been the promise right along. Whether or not we buy that idea is up to us.

God: the shell game

Who's got God: the Jews or the Samaritans? And where is God, in the Temple of Jerusalem or the one on Mt. Gerizim? The Samaritans, people of the Book just as the Jews are, built the Temple on Gerizim after they were barred from the one in Jerusalem. Gerizim was the site of the prophetic blessings Moses commanded to be uttered before taking possession of the Promised Land. It seemed like a good choice for a holy place. Even though the temple on Mt. Gerizim was destroyed in 128 B.C.E., the Samaritans continued to worship there faithfully, just as the Jewish community continues to revere the one remaining wall of the Temple at Jerusalem, likewise destroyed in 70 C.E.

God is not simply the God of this people or that, or situated in one place or another. Even we Christians have to be careful in locating God too precisely, as if the Omnipresent were in any way limited. Temples and churches, shrines and holy places are helpful tools for incarnate folks, but that's not where God uniquely resides. The woman who finds herself in the company of Jesus at the well would not have mistaken him for a tangible aspect of the divinity, that's for sure. For one thing, he was a Jew, the enemy of her people. For another, he was a man, and she'd known a number of men. And yet this very worldly and world-weary woman is able to sense the divine spirit in a most unexpected place for two reasons: First, she asks the right questions, and second, she listens to the answers. The first response puts her in a rare category, and the other puts her above most of Jesus' own disciples.

It's instructive to note that even after participating in miracles, healings, and years of teaching, it took an event like the Transfiguration for the disciples to suspect that Jesus was more than he seemed. The Samaritan woman intuited this in a short conversation. Jesus didn't miraculously fill her bucket or take the pain out of her much-used heart. He didn't even forgive her sins. He just talks to her. He talks about things that are directly relevant to her: water, relationships, God, and truth. He reveals his identity to her because she, as it turns out, has been seeking him all along. Jesus rarely meets anyone willing to look beyond religion to encounter its true purpose.

APPLYING THE WORD

Hope does not disappoint

What are we looking for this Lent? To get closer to God? To clean up our act? To feel more religious? Or just to lose a few pounds? We have to be frank about our objective, because we're bound to find what we seek. The right answer may also

not be what we think it is. We don't *have* to get closer to God. We can't: God's right here. God dwells in us. Getting closer to God's will might be a better goal, because that alignment is often very far off. If we find ourselves complaining that Lent's not working, that the magic of feeling our religion isn't happening this year, then maybe the answer is to practice a new consciousness. Spend one hour aware of God in every person you meet and every place you go. Keep searching with your eyes, your mind, your heart. If we practice believing what we profess—that God is in our midst—we may encounter Jesus at the well ourselves.

SPIRITUALITY OF THE READINGS

The Simple Eye

Most spiritualities say something like the following, and Ignatian Spirituality is no different: see more deeply. Feel more deeply. Pay attention to the quiet movements inside yourself and you will know more about what is outside you. Deepen yourself and you will learn to see.

Sometimes we are told "quit spending time on yourself and go get some work done" or "go help someone." But you can't see very well through a window if it is dirty, or if you have furniture piled up in front of it. In Lent we do housekeeping so that we can see clearly, without our usual prejudices pulled in front of the windows of our soul.

Take the Pharisees in the Gospel. They could not see clearly. When they asked the blind man how his sight had been restored, the man replied simply, "He put mud on my eyes, I washed it off, and now I can see." WHAT? screamed the Pharisees. THAT MAN "CANNOT BE FROM GOD BECAUSE HE DOES NOT KEEP THE SABBATH." He is therefore a sinner! He could not have cured you. (With these words, one high piece of furniture is shoved in front of the window).

These Pharisees run and get the man's parents, who will surely know what really happened. But the parents say an arch reply: "he is a grown man, he can speak for himself."

Back to the blind man. He explains, "It is unheard of that anyone ever opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man [Jesus] were not from God, he would not be able to do anything." (Piece of furniture number two will now rumble in front of the window of their eyes, as follows: WHAT? YOU ARE LECTURING US ABOUT MEN OF GOD AND YOU ARE STEEPED IN SIN FROM YOUR VERY BIRTH? GET OUT OF HERE!

The man born blind sees well. The Pharisees are the ones who refuse to see. If they were physically blind this would be understandable. But the truth is hidden by their own need to control others, their love of being in charge. What if they had looked the man through eyes unclouded by sin? They could have beheld a miracle, with wonder and awe.

Much later in time, Ignatius called this way of seeing "the simple eye." It is what we are trying to move toward during Lent. To have the simple eye is see with the eyes of faith. It is to let the Holy Spirit have a peaceful home within us and to help us clean house. Jesus gives the man this deeper sight. He says "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" The blind man says yes. He is simply no longer blind.

The same question faces each of us as we get ready for Holy Week. "Do you believe in the Son of Man" (the name Jesus used for himself)? Can you live in the light of the Lord (2nd reading)? Can you let the Lord be your Shepherd (Responsorial Psalm)? You can if you let go of your own prejudices and opinions, hard as that may be.

Let's ask Jesus to give us the simple eye.
