





EXPLORING THE WORD

Understanding Easter



That doesn't mean we're all on the same page when it comes to religious understanding, however. In nine short verses, John's Easter account reminds us that even those closest to Jesus could be absolutely clueless about the significance of the empty tomb. That it *was*significant they had no doubt. But such a finding could be read in so many ways—and apparently was—that even standing there on the morning of the third day could be a mind-boggling experience.

Being there

What did Mary Magdalene understand that morning in the dark, as she stood nearby and saw the great stone had been removed? Grave robbers; most likely the temple cohorts. When she says "they" have taken the Lord, she leaves us in little doubt as to which group she suspects. Meanwhile, folks on the Sanhedrin side of the equation, if Matthew's account is to be credited, are saying the same thing, only blaming the 12 apostles for the grave heist. The politics around the death of Jesus had been so acute that it eclipsed any theological reflection. Her report sets Peter and the other disciple running.

The gospel then provides us with a little insider politics of its own. Peter and that other guy race to the tomb, but the nameless other outpaces him—the gospel writer is always looking for a way to point out that Petrine leadership is a little slow. The winner of the footrace sees the interior of the tomb, what's there and not there. But he doesn't go inside; he knows better than to supersede Peter. When the First Fisherman arrives, he does enter, does a thorough inspection of the scene, but comes up with no answers. Then the other disciple steps in, sees the same evidence, and believes. Believes what, we ask? That the tomb is indeed empty?

Because the next thing we are told is that they, both of them, did not yet understand that Jesus had to rise from the dead. Whatever it is that they might believe, they are not believing that. The consolation for us Christians living 20 centuries later is that being there would have put us at no advantage in the realm of faith. We still, like Mary and Peter and the nameless disciple, have to put our heads into that hollow space and draw our own conclusions.

The saving mystery of Christ

The scripture scholar Pheme Perkins writes: "The ultimate goal of Christian life is not merely surviving death but transformation into the image of God, which is the risen Christ." For people who struggle with the meaning of the Easter event, this message might help. Paul often reminded his audience that the Resurrection was not a one-time episode—the idea is not to acknowledge the resurrected Lord and to cheer, "Good for him!" If we die with Christ, we also rise with him. The victory of Easter is our victory, too.

But the goal of resurrection is not merely cheating death of its sting. Resuscitated bodies and reanimated identities, even immortal ones, would be a poverty compared to the true objective, which is to be one with God in Christ. The glorified body of the Risen One is not just Jesus back again once more. He's unrecognizable to his dearest friends. He's transformed into the fullness of divine life. "The life of the world to come," then, is not more of the same, or even the best of the same. That image



of heaven we've clung to since childhood—living on a cloud, with all the cake you can eat and no calories—has got to be relinquished. Transformation into the image of God, whose very nature is love, will be quite a change for people like ourselves whose hearts are quite limited and whose ability to love is often disappointing.

We are the witnesses

When it comes to the Paschal Mystery, we can claim Peter's words from Acts as our own. Through our celebration of the Eucharist, we, too, become witnesses who eat and drink with Christ after he rose from the dead. Our liturgy is not a mental act of remembrance, sacramental theology insists. It is a divine activity through which we *are* there, present to and participating in the death and Resurrection of Christ. Liturgy "collapses past, present, and future into a single moment pregnant with meaning," as liturgical scholar Joyce Zimmerman writes in an essay on Christian mystery. The mystery aching to be revealed is in full flower when we approach the Table of the Lord.

This mystery, as Paul says in one of the two possible second readings for the day, is that as Christians we have already been raised up with Christ. We have already died to the way that leads to mortality and chosen the hidden life with Christ in God. Or, if you prefer the other reading for this day, Paul invites us to celebrate this feast of the Paschal Lamb with sincerity and truth. In both Colossians and Corinthians, we celebrate the divine mystery that is always and everywhere an open secret designed to be proclaimed, celebrated, and shared far and wide.

APPLYING THE WORD Entering the mystery

Today we're not gathered to enter into an empty tomb. That's "so 2,000 years ago." We come together to enter into a mystery that is, by contrast, full of life. The emptiness of the tomb on Easter Sunday morning might be hollow enough to echo back our fears, suspicions, and doubts. But the glorified life of the Risen Christ that we celebrate this morning, and every Sunday of the year, enables us "to share in the divinity of Christ, who humbled himself to share in our humanity." With Mary, with Peter, and every other disciple named and unnamed, we lift our voices in thanks and praise.

EXPLORING THE WORD

Without seeing, we believe

Why do you believe what you believe? What makes you so sure that your faith isn't simply wishful thinking? What do you cling to, when people challenge the tenets of religious belief? What makes the gospel more than just a ghost story to you?

After all, none of us were there when Jesus passed beyond a locked door and stood before his followers holding out hands marked with wounds. None of us heard his greeting of peace with our own ears, or felt his breath on our faces when he bestowed his Spirit. All of the events recounted by the evangelist are hearsay, handed on to us by a generation of folks who are themselves long gone. There are no videos, no medical reports, no notarized documents of these occurrences. Just a handful of testimonies and a hint that many other things happened that are not written in the book.

This is what gives me hope most of all: those other signs that didn't make it into the record. If all we had was the record itself, it would be the word of the evangelists against the story of human history. And human history tells us that the dead don't rise. The crucified and suffering ones are not made whole again. There is little peace after the horror of pain and loss. In all the accounts of history, the evidence of a Holy Spirit at work in the world is very spotty at best.



In search of other signs

"Although you have not seen him, you love him," the First Letter of Peter says with a note of congratulations. "Even though you do not see him now yet you believe in him." The rest of the passage is about joy so indescribable it can scarcely be contained.

Where does this spirit of rejoicing come from? I suppose some people are natural optimists, and others simply gullible. But beyond that small subset of the perky and the credulous are people like me and, I hope, you. Our faith isn't about what's easy or most comforting to believe. Maybe it's even dragged reluctantly from hearts ruled by skepticism much of the time. Left to our own tastes, some of us would not be joiners, followers, or believers. We might well be on the outside looking in at church, discipleship, and faith—but for one thing: an encounter with the person of Jesus.

I'm not talking about the walking-through-walls Jesus of that upper room in Jerusalem. Some saints of the church report miraculous visitations, but most of us are not so favored. But we have recognized Jesus in the places where he promised we'd find him: in the least of our sisters and brothers.

Though we may not have peered into literally empty tombs, we have known people once hollowed out by sin and suffering who returned to the land of the living. We have heard the stories of friends and neighbors crucified by the events of their lives who nonetheless walk free into the future, with glorified wounds that encourage us to live in hope. We read about people in war-torn lands who have every right to hate and hurt but choose instead the way of reconciliation, peace, and healing. If some question whether there is a Holy Spirit in the world, we can point to the places where love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control are practiced daily.

Sharing the signs increases faith

Anyone still practicing religious faith after these past centuries of rationalism, scientific hubris, and elitist doubt probably has stories to tell about why he or she chooses to believe. These stories are among the signs not written in John's book, and it is the responsibility of each new generation to share such signs as a virtual extension of the gospel. Peter tells what he knows to the Gentiles at the home of Cornelius. We tell what we know in the marketplace and the workplace when we cast our vote at city hall and when we use our resources with respect for creation and concern for our sisters and brothers.

The early communal life portrayed in Acts provides us with the template for how we should consider our power and our property: as vehicles for loving service. Our shared meal in the eucharistic assembly is itself a sign that we take our communal life as the Body of Christ seriously. We are one in the Spirit and one in the Lord. We cannot walk away from this table as individuals clutching our privileges and possessions too tightly.

If we hope to recover the depths of that original faith of the early disciples, our friend Thomas shows us how. His ability to believe in Jesus, shattered at the cross, is reaffirmed and illuminated when he reaches out and touches the wounds of Christ. Now he no longer needs to rely on hearsay reports of the Risen Lord. Nor does he depend on seeing in order to believe. No, when he dares to come in contact with the sacred wounds, to put his hand into that gaping side, what he experiences is enough to dredge up one of the greatest professions of faith in the New Testament: "My Lord and my God!"

We don't have to go far to touch the wounds of our world, and it is there that we may meet our Lord face to face and find the ultimate reason to believe.

APPLYING THE WORD

Four steps to discipleship

The life of a disciple involves teaching, community, Eucharist, and prayer. So we learn from the early community of Acts, whose faith was nurtured by these four elements. Parishes that provide opportunities for their members that encompass all of these vital components will raise up more disciples and fewer people who define themselves merely in terms of Mass attendance. Genuine disciples will be prepared to take the next step, from being on the receiving end of the community's benefits to reaching out to the world in its need for healing, consolation, and the testimony of hope. The Easter season is a great time to renew our parish communities as places where the signs of faith not contained in John's gospel are written down daily.
