



#### **EXPLORING THE WORD**

### The house that faith built

"The right tool for the right job," my father used to say, handling his toolbox as lovingly as if it were a bassinet full of babies. Certainly it helps in any task to be clear on the goal and the steps to be taken to reach that end. You can't make a soufflé with a sledgehammer. But assemble the right ingredients, put them into the proper relationships, and you can anticipate wonderful results.

In 1 Peter, we hear a remarkable invitation to come to Jesus as "a living stone." The modern religious imagination balks at first: Nothing is less animate than a rock. But think like Michelangelo and realize that a stone contains a world of possibilities. The stone carver has a bag full of tools to chisel this rock to fit precisely into the space in a wall where it can be most useful. Each stone builds on the integrity of the whole until an edifice arises in which it plays a crucial supportive part. The humble stone is a single note in a Bach concerto. It is an incidental character in a Broadway cast. It is one sentence in *David Copperfield*. But put all the notes together, all the actors, all the sentences, and you have a masterpiece. This is the organic and vital house that faith built, and we don't have the Body of Christ without it.

#### The spiritual house

Chosen, royal, priestly, and holy. These are the attributes of the stones that comprise the church. We aren't part of this story by accident. Each one of us in the assembly has been chosen to be here, invited to the house of faith in some way. Many of us were invited first by our parents, who saw to our Baptism and religious education. Later, other mentors in the faith arose who shepherded us to the point of religious understanding and moral formation we now enjoy. Perhaps now we ourselves are issuing the invitation to family, friends, and community by our own example of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus.

Our membership in the church makes us part of a *royal* family. The royal house of David entered into a sacred covenant with God once and for all to lead the people of God forever. This promise was fulfilled in the birth of Jesus and is the heritage of the church.

We are a *priestly* people. Obviously not all of us are ordained to sacramental ministry, but all are sacramentally anointed for the service of God from our present position in the household of faith. Together we are windows and doorways to the sacred for others. We are load-bearing walls meant to share burdens and shoulder responsibilities. We are arches and cathedral ceilings that reach heavenward. We are paving stones others can pass over as they make their way toward religious understanding. We are bridges over troubled waters in the lives of those who suffer. Each one of us is as anointed for our particular role as the priest who stands at the table of the Lord.

Finally, our lives are intrinsically holy. If the church teaches that life is a gift from God profoundly sacred, that sanctity of being includes you and me. It necessarily cannot exclude you and me! This holiness is both a gift and a responsibility: the unmerited condition of participating in divinely inspired life, as well as the mandate to live as if that were true. These four characteristics are the essence of the structure that contains us and the contents of the space we likewise enclose and create.

#### Many rooms

Jesus used architectural imagery before the epistle writers when he described the house of his Father as a mansion with many rooms or an estate encompassing many dwellings. If the epistle writer's description of the spiritual house focused on its material composition and internal unity, the image Jesus uses expands the notion outward and forward.

I find it amusing that a television series years ago chose as its fantasy plot line what might happen if hell filled up and the condemned souls started escaping. No one has ever worried about a similar soul glut in heaven, but evidently it's not an issue anyway. The reign of God has plenty of accommodations for those who make their way there. The "way," of course, is most significant. Jesus defines himself as *the way* in response to an inquiry by Thomas, who always likes to have matters of faith concretized and tangible. If we embrace Jesus as our way, we will find our reservations in order when we arrive at our final destination.

The implications of multiple dwelling places in heaven have led to an exhaustive list of jokes on the subject, featuring the Jewish heaven, the Protestant heaven, the Catholic heaven, and so on. If you want to use any of these as your homily story on Sunday, just make sure the assembly gets the message that the reign of God itself is no joke.

### APPLYING THE WORD Stone by stone

Some believers find it difficult, even a bit painful, to compare the sublime spiritual edifice of Peter's letter to the complexity we call church today. Has church history followed the path of the Holy Spirit in the selection of materials that have led us to Roman Catholic Christianity in all of its institutional facets? Short answer: not perfectly. Decisions had to be made early about the direction the institution would take. In the first reading from Acts, we get the message that many of those decisions were grounded in practical factors as much as spiritual ones. The original streamlined authority of the 12 apostles worked fine until they found themselves grossly overextended. The families of widows needed to be fed. Somebody needed to make sure there was no favoritism in the daily distribution. Either they would have to do it, as they did everything else, or they could make a ruling and relinquish some of their oversight.

This tension between Mission Control and local jurisdiction remains present in the 21st-century church, as it does in matters between federal and state government. The faithful often find it confusing to distinguish between unchanging doctrine and very changeable external structures. We may from time to time take down a non-load-bearing wall, so to speak, to make room for a worthier or more timely goal. This act does not mean the church itself is falling apart or losing its fundamental framework. Every house could use some maintenance from time to time.

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# Sixth Sunday of Easter May 14, 2023

#### Acts of the Apostles 8:5-8, 14-17

#### **EXPLORING THE WORD**

#### The Spirit is a-movin'

John Henry Newman puzzles over the mystery of why Jesus left his friends after reuniting with them in the Resurrection. Things couldn't be the same between them, he suggests, after the "awful truth" of the divinity of Jesus was revealed to their formerly imperceptive imaginations. "What had been, could not be again," Newman writes rather sadly. No one can see God and live, so once they were quite clear about who their friend was, Jesus must vanish from their sight.

With all respect to Newman, a pastor friend of mine has a simpler explanation born of his own experience of embracing and surrendering parishes. "After a while, the same charisma that enables you to lead these people in the first place gets in the way of them being able to move forward themselves. So you have to step aside, for their sake. They have to let you go to come into their own."



This theory dovetails with Jesus' own observation that if he did not leave, the Advocate could not come. The plan was never to abandon the nascent church or let the disciples fend for themselves as sheep among wolves. The plan was for the disciples to become an army of good shepherds, to lead more sheep into the safety of the fold. The only weakness in this arrangement, of course, is that no disciple is fit to assume the place of Jesus. Even Peter, the most worthy character of the bunch, is a far cry from the close communion Jesus had with his Father. How to bridge that chasm?

If you look at salvation history altogether, the problem with humanity has always been the wedge that sin drove between God and us. The Incarnation covered the distance, bringing the substance of God's divinity near again. With the Risen Lord ascending, that immanence would be lost but for the arrival of the Advocate. If Jesus provided the ultimate bridge between humanity and divinity, this indwelling Spirit supplied the Chunnel.

Maybe Newman is insightful in pointing out that the glorified Christ is not the same as Jesus, friend and teacher. The intimacy of Incarnation could not be replaced with the Resurrected Lord. Sacramental intimacy in Eucharist would provide Real Presence, but a relationship to a sacrament is not identical to a relationship with a person. That is why Peter and John must revisit the Samaritans with prayer for the Spirit even after Philip brought them the seemingly sufficient trifecta of gospel, healing, and Baptism. Without the Spirit to lead it forward, a community might spin its wheels or remain on a circular track of spiritual self-satisfaction. In this church, movement is everything. You can't follow if you're standing still. — Alice Camille
