POPE FRANCIS' MESSAGE FOR THE 32nd WORLD DAY OF THE SICK – February 11, 2024

Earlier this year, [*Pope Francis' message for the 32nd World Day of the Sick*](#), was published. The Holy Father's message for this year is entitled: ***"It is not good that man should be alone" – Caring for the sick by caring for relationships***. The Holy Father reminds us of the fundamental importance of human relationships in the process of healing and comforting the sick. The Pope refers to the biblical passage from the Book of Genesis, emphasizing that God created man by endowing him with vital relationships, and that loneliness, the result of sin, can lead to suffering and isolation. The Pope urges us to care for relationships with compassion and tenderness, while recalling the example of the Good Samaritan who approached his neighbour with deep compassion. The Pope also stresses that the sick, the fragile, and the poor must be at the heart of the Church and at the center of our pastoral concerns.

The World Day of the Sick offers us an opportunity to pray for all those who suffer and to reflect on our commitment to them. Here in our parish, on February 11th we will celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick at 10:15 am.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is not restricted, as was the former custom, to those in immediate danger of death, but the sacrament may not be given indiscriminately. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick may and SHOULD BE GIVEN to those faithful whose health is seriously impaired. Elderly people may be anointed if they have become notably weakened even though no serious illness is present. Those preparing for serious surgery may be anointed. The sacrament MAY BE REPEATED for those who recover and become seriously ill again, or for a person with a chronic illness or an elderly person who is notably weakened. The Sacrament of Anointing is NOT administered to those who are not baptized, or those who persist in manifest grave sin, or to those already dead.

Let us work together to counter the culture of individualism and indifference in the world today, so that we may grow the culture of tenderness and compassion in our society. Let us take concrete steps to accompany those who are ill and isolated, through our prayers, by visiting them, by offering assistance and gratitude to healthcare professionals and volunteers, and by making other acts of solidarity. Let us entrust ourselves and all the sick and the elderly to the Blessed Virgin Mary, Health of the Sick, that she may intercede on our behalf and help us to reach out and to deepen our relationship with one another as children of God.

EXPLORING THE WORD

Free of charge

We see a lot of things advertised with that four-letter word these days: “Free!” And we’ve grown wisely skeptical of such claims. We’ve all learned by now, sometimes bitterly, that there’s no free lunch, no free subscriptions, and no free merchandise. (And nobody in Nigeria wants to wire a lot of money to your bank account!) Everything costs something, and if we can’t see the price tag, even more reason to suspect we’re about to be fleeced.

So when Saint Paul says he offers the gospel free of charge wherever he goes, we have good reason to doubt that. The gospel isn’t free and doesn’t even come cheap. The gospel cost Jesus the cross; cost many saints their martyrdom; cost Paul himself continuous turmoil. If Paul brought the gospel to his audiences for free, it’s because he was making the down payments on their behalf every day.

And when we hear the Good News of Jesus Christ proclaimed today, it may seem like it’s free, or at least like cheap grace served fresh daily. It’s not. Think of how Peter’s mother-in-law was healed of a fever at the touch of Jesus’ hand. Was that free? Instantly she felt compelled to service. Jesus, too, after being waited on by this grateful and generous woman, might have wanted to settle in after sunset to a little casual conversation with his friends.

But no: The whole town was brought to him with their diseases and demons. And if you think he got a day off after that, you’d be mistaken. The following morning, Jesus was up before dawn to pray, travel, preach, and heal. Did Jesus give it all away for free? He may not have charged each sick person, as a doctor would, but the cost to him was everything he had: time, comfort, space for family and friends. Eventually the ministry of Jesus cost him his security and his life.

It’s ironic, really, that the lectionary folks coupled this gospel passage about the exhausting ministry of Jesus with Job’s lament: Isn’t life on earth a drudgery? I don’t think they meant to imply that preaching and teaching and healing are a drag. Or that Paul’s contortionist attempts to be “all things to all people” for the sake of the gospel was hell on wheels. On the one hand, it probably was. And those of us who preach and teach and heal are sometimes really beaten down by these responsibilities. But where Job goes wrong is in his final summary: “I shall not see happiness again.” We know the story: Job gets a happy ending, just as Paul receives his martyr’s crown and Jesus has Easter morning. The gospel may not be free, but it’s worth every penny.

EXPLORING THE WORD

In the leper's defense

So here you are, moving through life cheerfully in the midst of family, community, career. And one day you wake up with a mark on your skin. It itches. Maybe in a day or two it starts to peel, crack, bleed, or ooze. The hairs around the affected patch whiten or fall out. People start pointing and whispering, falling silent when you come near. Then the priest comes to your house and declares you unclean. With that single word, it's the end of the world as you know it.

Unclean means you can't live at home anymore. You say good-bye to your family. You can't live in town anymore, so you take a blanket and supplies and make a tent in the hills with a view of your old house. Your front door is just a small dark spot from here. People come and go there.

But not you. You can't provide for your spouse anymore, can't care for your kids. You wonder how long before they make plans that don't include you. Charitable folk sometimes carry old bread and maybe spoiling vegetables to the edge of town and leave it there—for you or for the other lepers, whoever gets there first. You're still itching, oozing, and hoping this thing will clear up on its own. It's not like you can see a doctor; and with a poor diet and this harsh environment, chances are the condition gets worse before it gets better.

And then Jesus comes to town, and you remember hearing amazing things about him, and so you decide to take the chance and force an audience when he comes close to the edge of the community. "You can make me clean," you insist. "If you want to," you add. And he does. And he says, "Don't tell anybody. Just see the priest to pronounce you cured." What would you do?

Not telling is simply not possible, it seems to me. Even if Jesus asks you, not telling that you've gotten your life back—your health and family and home and livelihood—is out of the question. When the news is this good, you simply have to tell. You have to shout, sing, dance, and do performance art describing what happened. You have to occupy the village square for the next five years and deliver the story from the top. It has to become a fixture in your identity: the lady or guy who got cured of leprosy by Jesus. And this is what the gospel writers mean by proclaiming the kingdom of God. If this good news comes to you, if your life is restored and renewed as a result of meeting Jesus, you'll talk about it. You have to. You have no choice.

SAINT JOHN XXIII PARISH BUILDING GOD'S HOME FUND

Saint John XXIII Parish in October 2023 obtained a loan from the Trustees of the RCAW Inc. for the purposes of paying off by October 31, 2023 the \$500,000.00 owed to the Diocese of Rupert's Land for the purchase of our parish facility, the former Assiniboia Christian Centre. According to the loan agreement, over the next five years, through a capital campaign and other fundraising efforts, we now must raise the funds to pay off the principal sum of \$500,000.00 CDN together with the requisite interest. To this end, we recently began a capital campaign and have been soliciting pledges from parishioners towards our "Building God's Home Fund". As of January 2024, the total of pledges received from parishioners is just over \$187,000.00. ***Thank you to those parishioners who already have submitted their pledge forms. We ask other parishioners to prayerfully consider their response to our capital campaign. Envelopes containing pledge forms are available at the parish office.***
