PARISH FAITH FORMATION 2025 – 2026

Catechism Classes for children and youth

The beginning of the school year also marks the resumption of catechetical programs in most parishes. Once again we have ordered the *Pflaum Gospel Weeklies* liturgically-based faith formation program that provides weekly handouts with a short description of the Sunday Gospel plus suggested activities and discussion starters for each age level. As many will recall, this faith formation program has materials divided into the following age groups: SEEDS (Preschool), PROMISE (Kindergarten – Grade 1), GOOD NEWS (Grades 2-3), VENTURE (GRADES 4-6) and VISIONS (Grades 7-8 and up).

Those who would like their children to take part in our program are asked to submit a completed **REGISTRATION FORM** asap for each child so we can prepare adequate materials for regular catechetical lessons to be done in the parish hall on Sunday mornings at 10:15 a.m. and, as circumstances suggest, in the home setting. **THANK YOU** to parents who have already registered their children for parish catechism classes.

FURTHER REGISTRATIONS WILL BE TAKEN at the main counter in the parish office on Sunday, September 21st from 10:00 am to 11:15 am and on Sunday, September 28th from 10:00 am to 10:30 am. If materials arrive and all goes as planned, in-person catechetical sessions will begin on Sunday morning, October 5th at 10:15 am.

Designated registration fees help defray some of the costs of running our faith formation and sacramental preparation programs. Given increased costs for materials, we continue to request a registration fee for each child/youth/candidate participating in our faith formation programs. Nevertheless, requested fees should in no way be considered a reason to refrain from enrolling for those persons and families for whom such fees would impose an undue hardship.

Preparation for the Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Eucharist

Children who will be receiving the Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Eucharist in the spring of 2026 as a **PREREQUISITE** **SHOULD BE ENROLLED NOW** in our regular catechism program held on Sunday mornings. Later this year further details will be made available to parents/guardians about proximate preparation sessions for these two sacraments which will begin shortly after Christmas and will involve a mixture of lessons to be completed at church and at home.

Preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation

The celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation for youth in our parish usually has taken place on a bi-annual basis. At this juncture, we have made no formal plans to prepare for the celebration of Confirmation in the spring of 2026. Nevertheless, if there is enough interest we could consider setting up a preparation program. In previous years, preparation sessions were held on designated Sunday afternoons from October through to May or June depending on the actual date for Confirmation assigned to our parish by the Archbishop's office. If your son or daughter is interested in preparing for the celebration of Confirmation in the spring of 2026, please contact the parish office as soon as possible to see what may be possible.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

How do I become Catholic?: Many avenues lead individuals to the Catholic Church. The journey of faith can be a winding road. Whatever path has led you to this time of searching or interest in becoming a baptized Christian or, if already baptized, to be received into the full communion of the Catholic Church, the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is a process that could be Good News for you in your journey of faith. **Our parish will soon be starting up the RCIA process in our parish. Initial inquiry sessions will be held on WEDNESDAY EVENINGS. Please contact Sharon at the parish office and/or speak with Father Robert if you are interested in participating.** Our first session is scheduled to be held on **Wednesday, October 8, 2025 downstairs in room 9 at about 7:40 pm**, i.e. immediately following the 7:00 pm Wednesday evening liturgy.

Reflection for the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross – September 14, 2025

The sign at the center of our faith

Teachers should know more than their students. I think most of us hope that the people who are training us in any capacity have more expertise than those whom they are mentoring. But we've probably all taken courses in which we found out that our teachers were posers, or we've held jobs in which our supervisors had less expertise than we did.

Nicodemus has such a credibility gap. He's a teacher of the people, a member of the Sanhedrin. Yet after hearing Jesus, Nicodemus realizes he's discovered a teacher who knows more than he does. And when Jesus tells him that the way to all truth includes being "born again," Nicodemus misunderstands him, imagining an impossible second physical birth. Nicodemus should not have been so uncomprehending: Judaism itself expected a second birth from those attracted to its teachings. The fact that Nicodemus questions this image implies that he's not been doing his homework.

Yet there's something redeemable about Nicodemus. He keeps coming back to Jesus even though under cover of darkness, afraid to be known as a disciple. He may be ignorant, but at least he knows that he does not know—which puts him far ahead of the unthinking mobs in the streets. Jesus tells him that second birth means that he has to start over, from scratch, a new beginning, and Nicodemus is prepared to try. This puts him head and shoulders above the multitudes who listen to Jesus politely for an afternoon, chalk up the experience as amusing or interesting, and return to their routines.

Those who stay, like Nicodemus, will have their ignorance challenged, their understanding broadened. They'll learn that Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life. They'll come to know that Jesus doesn't come to judge and condemn the world, but to rescue it. Those who hang around for the long haul will come to experience the sign at the center of great mystery: the cross of Christ. They will come to appreciate that a second birth is also a form of death to the old way of seeing and believing and behaving. The cross changes everything. It makes the strange specter of death into an ally toward fuller, more abundant life.

Saint Paul, the best posthumous pupil Jesus ever had, seemed to be born again in a single encounter with the Risen Lord. He perceived how humility leads naturally to glory, how death is the doorway to life. Paul, who, unlike his fellow Pharisee Nicodemus, probably never met the human Jesus nor saw the cross of Jesus, unpacked its tremendous significance and confessed his allegiance to its great saving mystery. If Nicodemus had been born again, he might have crept out of the shadows and become a memorable teacher of the faith. We might be reading his letters to the church today. — *Alice Camille*

Learning the new math

Pedagogy is an ugly word to use at the start of a homily. Better to talk about the way we learn and how it shapes what we learn. It's Catechetical Sunday, not exactly a church feast but a significant feature on the landscape of religious understanding. It's a time to remind ourselves that when it comes to religious education, none of us ever graduate. Religious education gets pegged as something that happens to parochial school children or in Confirmation classes. It's something new parents are forced into to get their kids baptized. Certainly religion teachers and DREs offer a tremendous service to our community in their careful presentation of the faith.

But have you considered how the presider is also a catechist, as is the preacher? Liturgy is the most important catechism of the church because it's the one everyone learns just by showing up. We learn by saying our part and attending to the responses. But we also learn from songs, gestures, the movement of the action from the Sign of the Cross to the Act of Contrition, from word to sacrament, from responsorial psalm of praise to silent prayer of thanksgiving after Communion. While the homilist's primary motive is not catechetical, a little "stealth catechesis" once a while doesn't hurt.

Liturgy and sacrament are great teachers. So is the moral life as a whole. Practice makes perfect, and even those of us who aim much lower than perfection still learn a lot from every attempt we make to love better, forgive more, fear and judge less, be more generous. Environment shapes our learning, too. Remember all the posters in your early classrooms? The alphabet and numbers running colorfully around the room? Catholic environment is composed of words of grace and images of holiness. If you doubt it, try putting a crucifix in every room of your home. Erect a small prayer shrine in a corner. Post your favorite scripture verse on the fridge.

Of course it's good to make conscious choices for adult learning, too. Read a Catholic book; for suggestions, check out the catholicread.org website or visit the nearest Catholic bookstore. Attend a retreat or parish workshop. Join a faith-sharing group. Subscribe to a Catholic magazine, paper, or news site. Find out what the bishops really said; don't settle only for media reports.

Reflection for the Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time – September 28, 2025

To hell in a very nice basket?

People in [North America] are among the most generous on Earth. We're also among the guiltiest: That is, we feel guilty about our many advantages. But are we actually guilty of anything besides success—and is it a sin, in the end, to be comfortable? That's the lurking suspicion that makes many of us uncomfortable. Somehow we've absorbed the idea that God doesn't like rich people.

Does the Bible make the case against the rich? On the contrary, it's easy to make a defense *for* the rich. "Blessing theology" fearlessly maintains that prosperity is evidence of virtue. Wealth, health, lots of children, and a long life are biblical signs of God's favor. It's a *quid pro quo* spirituality that's always been popular and remains intact despite the prevailing economic conditions. Its primary attraction is that it puts all the control for our quality of life in our hands. We know what to do to make God and ourselves happy in one fell swoop. Blessing theology is the best insurance policy you can buy.

But is it vaporware? In the poem by Edwin Arlington Robinson, Richard Cory glitters when he walks and still puts a bullet in his head. Otherwise physically healthy folks experience depression. People with umpteen children may not enjoy happy families. Not all who reach the age of 90 are glad they did. Material success and satisfaction are not birthed as twins. On the other hand, the mythical relationship between poverty and virtue is likewise fiction. In the parable of Lazarus we see no mention that the man covered with sores is morally superior to the rich man who barely notes him.

What bothers the prophet Amos (who's easily bothered) and what condemns Dives (Latin for "rich guy") is the same fault: not that people are prosperous but that prosperity has led to indifference. Amos never says that folks on beds of ivory chowing down on farm animals sin by doing so; that is not an indictment against Sealy Posturepedic or a manifesto of vegetarianism (Amos is both a shepherd and a tree farmer!). Nor does Jesus imply that Dives does badly in eternity for doing so well on Earth. The crime that enrages the prophets and consigns Dives to the netherworld is, simply, not caring. The poor suffered, and the comfortable changed the channel.

"I've got mine" can seem like a good life plan. We can extend that to "my family has theirs" or "our nation has ours," but it all comes down to the same dangerous scenario. You know that chasm between where Lazarus is and Dives wants to be in the end? Dives dug that with his own two hands. Too bad it never occurred to him to build a bridge instead. — Alice Camille
