Catechism of the Catholic Church

592. What is the sense of the petition "Give us this day our daily bread"?

Asking God with the filial trust of children for the daily nourishment which is necessary for us all we recognize how good God is, beyond all goodness. We ask also for the grace to know how to act so that justice and solidarity may allow the abundance of some to remedy the needs of others.

593. What is the specifically Christian sense of his petition?

Since "man does not live by bread alone but by every word that comes from the mouth of God" (*Matthew* 4:4), this petition equally applies to hunger for the *Word of God* and for the *Body of Christ* received in the Eucharist as well as hunger for the Holy Spirit. We ask this with complete confidence for *this day* - God's "today" - and this is given to us above all in the Eucharist which anticipates the banquet of the Kingdom to come.

594. Why do we say "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us"?


By asking God the Father to pardon us, we acknowledge before him that we are sinners. At the same time we proclaim his mercy because in his Son and through the sacraments "we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins" (*Colossians* 1:14). Still our petition will be answered only if we for our part have forgiven first.

595. How is forgiveness possible?

Mercy can penetrate our hearts only if we ourselves learn how to forgive - even our enemies. Now even if it seems impossible for us to satisfy this requirement, the heart that offers itself to the Holy Spirit can, like Christ, love even to love's extreme; it can turn injury into compassion and transform hurt into intercession. Forgiveness participates in the divine mercy and is a high-point of Christian prayer. Further reading: CCC 888-890, 939

How to start reading the Bible (cont.) By Mark Hart In Conclusion (continued)

Okay, so that's a substantial start. Get the tools, pull together your blueprints, and start building your love for God's Word. There are several ways to begin reading Scripture ... these are just what I've found over the years to be the best, most realistic steps to begin and keep reading it daily.

And don't just think that you have to 'study' every time you open the Bible. It's great if you set aside 30-45 minutes every day to begin studying, but that doesn't mean you can't flip the pages in other books like the Psalms, Proverbs, Sirach, Wisdom, Ecclesiastes, or in St. Paul's letters ... you'll be blessed by all of them.

I also strongly recommend the Book of James in the New Testament. Romans is a gorgeous and extraordinarily well-written book but is sometimes a little 'too deep' for the Biblical beginner. While Romans teaches us how to get to Heaven, James teaches us how to live on Earth (with people who might annoy you and try your patience). It's great.

All I can tell you from my own experience is that the Word of God has changed my life. It has deepened my experience of the Eucharist, both at Mass and in Adoration. It has deepened my love for our Mother Mary and my gratitude for intercessory prayer and the communion of saints. It has deepened my love for the Church, the Papacy, and basic human dignity. It has fueled a fire within me for truth, the need to proclaim it, defend it, and uphold it – especially in this morally relative culture. I pray it will do the same for you.

Father Marty's Corner

Last Monday we celebrated the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. This great event set into motion how we are to be connected to God by virtue of following the example that Jesus set. Therefore we belong to God and we are called to be His disciples. To be disciples, we must know Jesus and dwell with Him in relationship so that we are able to take His message forth.

In our gospel today, Jesus says to the two disciples who are following Him: 'What are you looking for?' They respond by asking: "Where are you staying?" He responds by saying: "Come, and you will see." It is interesting to note that these disciples do not ask Jesus the question: "What are we to do?" Instead they ask Him:



"Where are you staying?" They are digging deep. They want to know where He dwells. They want to know where He lives in His innermost heart.

Discipleship begins with dwelling in Christ. I believe that the true disciple wants to not just talk about God but rather have an intimate relationship with God where they experience God's tender mercy and His deep love. If we are sure of this then we can be a disciple that glows because of our relationship with God and not just our knowledge of God.

Did you know?

During the time of the Protestant reformation, St. Francis de Sales lived close to Calvinist territory. He decided he should lead an expedition to bring the 60,000 Calvinists back to the Catholic Church. For three years, he trudged through the countryside, had doors slammed in his face and rocks thrown at him. In the bitter winters, his feet froze so badly they bled as he tramped through the snow.

Francis' unusual patience kept him working. No one would listen to him, no one would even open their door. So, Francis found a way to get under the door. He wrote out little pamphlets to explain true Catholic doctrine and slipped them under the doors. This is one of the first records we have of religious tracts being used to communicate the true Catholic faith to people who had fallen away from the Church. The parents wouldn't come to him, so Francis went to the children. When the parents saw how kind he was as he played with the children, they began to talk to him.

By the time Francis returned home, it is believed he brought 40,000 people to the Catholic Church!!
