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PALM SUNDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION April 5, 2020

1st reading, Isaiah 50: 4-7 The Servant, Israel's Hope

In this third Servant, the Lord's special Servant affirms His faith in the Lord. He has carried out the Lord's commission in the face of ridicule and opposition, confident that the Lord will sustain and vindicate Him. This song gives insight into the Suffering Servant's commitment to carry out God's will.

Jesus the Suffering Servant has endured hardship and encountered resistance. There is no beauty in him or comeliness. He embodies the mystery of human suffering. In him we can see the suffering people of the world: the victims of war, disease, violence, abuse. We can see our own sorrows in the Man of Sorrows.

2nd Philippians 2: 6-11

The Humbled and Exalted Christ

These verses are very likely a hymn or poem that Paul wrote or borrowed as an illustration. They offer Jesus as the perfect role model for Christian unity. While the story of the cross is recorded in the gospels and explained in the epistles, only this passage views the Crucifixion through the eyes of the Lord Himself. It presents a glimpse of His perspective so that His followers might see the price of unity: His death.

Jesus Christ emptied himself and took the form of a slave. He became obedient even unto death

on a cross. The emptying was total. Jesus took upon himself all the trials of our human condition. When his emptying became total, exaltation happened. He rose from the dead and received the name above all others, "Lord."

The Gospel Matthew 26: 14 – 27: 66 The Plot to Kill Jesus

Jesus had told His disciples several times that He would be arrested, tortured, and **crucified.** Here, He specifies the time it would happen. He probably spoke these words on Tuesday; the **Passover** lamb would be killed Thursday afternoon. The disciples did not at first understand that Jesus himself is the Passover Lamb, but later, they and their fellow believers would grasp this enormous truth.

The passion narrative has a human fascination; we sympathize with the suffering victim; we recoil at the cruelty which human beings can inflict on one another. But for believing Christians, the story tells much more. It tells the story of salvation. It shows the Way of the Cross each of us is called to walk on our way to exaltation.

Jesus was crucified around 9 am. Or the third hour. Approximately three hours later, a strange **darkness** covered the land of Judea and lasted for another three hours. Clearly, this was a sign both of divine judgment and mourning. Not only would judgment fall on Israel for rejecting her Messiah, but even a greater judgment fell on her Messiah when Jesus became the divine sacrifice for sin.

A few words from the crucifixion of Jesus to pray with them:

"Barabbas!"
"Let him be crucified!"
"His blood be upon us and upon our children."

"Truly, this was the Son of God!"

HOLY WEEK & EASTER 2020

Holy Thursday

The feast of Passover begins its important "remembering," with a "why" as well: "Why is this night different from other nights? asks the youngest child. Repeatedly, the father responds with the meaning of the important symbols like the bitter herbs or unleavened bread or paschal lamb.

In the original Passover some might have asked: "Why are we doing this? And the answer could well have come back: "You'll understand later." In fact, Jesus uses just such a reply for his disciples: "What I am doing, you do not understand now, but you will understand later." Little did they know that God, through Jesus, was saving them that night. This new ritual would no longer be the "Passover" of the Old Testament but a whole new "Passover": Jesus' death and resurrection.

Good Friday

What happened to Jesus? John's Gospel tells us that Jesus' free attitude towards religious codes and laws, and his criticism of the Jerusalem establishment and temple practices upset the powerful in Jerusalem: both the religious leader and the head of the Roman occupation, Pontius Pilate. In a typically brutal way, with the cooperation of the local Jesush leaders, the Roman authorities seized Jesus, tortured him and executed him. In Jesus' suffering and death there is an outpouring of grace!
