May the Lord give you His peace. Someone thanked me last week for writing these letters in the bulletin. I hope that these little love notes from the pastor keep everyone informed of what is going on in the parish and inspire us to talk more about the readings. Before I was ordained, I used to read what the pastor had to say in the bulletin at my home parish. In addition to the liturgy, it helped me feel connected to what was going on in my parish. Suffice to say, there is plenty going on behind the scenes, especially during the Summer.

Summer is usually the time I try to catch up on projects that cannot be done during the year, whether because Children's Religious Education is in session or other important seasons and feast days are being celebrated like Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. We also have to be mindful of the different vendors' time tables and when they are available to do certain types of work.

One of the most pressing projects to complete this Summer is the replacement of our fire alarm system. The Simplex system that was installed in 2002, while state-of-the-art for its time, has long since reached end-of-life and is no longer serviceable. To ensure the safety of our parishioners, staff, and all who visit our church and parish center, we need to replace the system, smoke detectors, and emergency pulls throughout the building. Fortunately for us, we have only a handful of smoke detectors and pulls to replace. The majority of the spaces are covered by our sprinkler system. Nevertheless, the cost of this repair is about \$25,000. Fortunately, we do have money in savings to cover the immediate cost of this repair, however, it would be better if we did not have to dip into our savings. If you are able to help with a one-time donation, it would be most appreciated. Please call or visit the parish office. Thank you for your generosity and support.

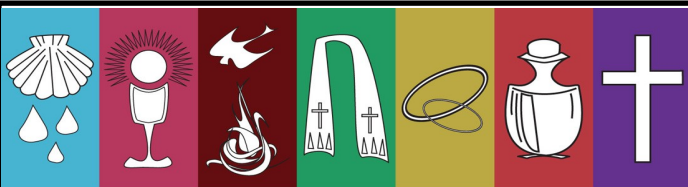
Yikes! Now I almost feel as though it might be better not to write these letters. But, this is all part of being a parish family. Just like we have homes that need care, so too do our parish buildings. Together we make the Church of St. Isaac Jogues a beautiful place for worship and fellowship, catechesis and growth in our faith.

In today's readings, the Book of Wisdom says, "For in secret the holy children of the good were offering sacrifice and putting into effect with one accord the divine institution." We are part of those holy children putting into effect the divine institution. What is the divine institution but the Kingdom of God in our midst? And as Moses says, "For what great nation is there that has gods so close to it as the LORD, our God, is to us whenever we call upon him" (Dt. 4:7). The primary way we call upon God is through the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, whereby we present the One True Sacrifice of Christ on Calvary. A sacrifice that was made once for all time, for all people; a sacrifice by which we remember the salvation of God throughout history, but in a particular way, by the Most Precious Blood of Christ, shed for the forgiveness of sins. Indeed, the slavery the Israelites endured while in Egypt is a type of slavery to sin that all mankind suffers, but thanks be to God our Blessed Lord put an end to it all through the Cross. We have redemption through Christ.

And so, we are called to be people of faith. People who remember. People who listen to the voice of God and respond. Abraham heard the voice of God and the Lord gave him descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky. We count ourselves among those descendants, which is why we call Abraham our father in faith. But, do we keep this faith? Will we keep this faith to the very end? That is the encouragement of Jesus in the gospel: "Gird your loins and light your lamps and be like servants who await their master's return from a wedding, ready to open immediately when he comes and knocks. Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival." May we be vigilant servants constantly keeping our hearts focused on Christ and our eyes towards the Kingdom of God. As St. Paul says, "Think of what is above, not of what is on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ your life appears, then you too will appear with him in glory" (Col. 3:2-4). This glory is for each of us who keep the faith until the very end, no matter what.

May the Lord strengthen our faith, that together we may carry out his holy and true command, namely, to love one another as He loves us. As Jesus says, "Much will be required of the person entrusted with much, and still more will be demanded of the person entrusted with more." We all have been entrusted with God's gift of love. How are we observing his command to love one another today?

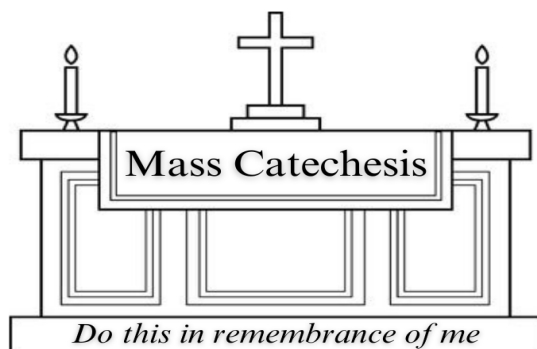

**Eucharistic Prayer I - The Roman Canon**

Eucharistic Prayer I, also known as the Roman Canon, holds significant importance in the celebration of the Mass due to its historical depth, theological richness, and specific liturgical applications. It is the oldest and most traditional of the Eucharistic Prayers in the Roman Rite.

**Historical and Theological Significance**

The Roman Canon is deeply rooted in the Church's tradition, with its origins tracing back to ancient times. It is characterized by its comprehensive commemoration of the Blessed Virgin Mary and numerous saints, reflecting the Church's communion with the entire heavenly host. Pope Paul VI noted that the Eucharistic Prayers, including the ancient Roman Canon, contain a significant commemoration of the Blessed Virgin Mary, expressing the desire of the faithful to share in the inheritance of the saints with her.

**Structure and Elements**

Eucharistic Prayer I is composed of several key elements that articulate the Church's prayer of thanksgiving and consecration:

- **Thanksgiving (Preface):** The priest, on behalf of the entire holy people, glorifies God the Father and gives thanks for the whole work of salvation.
- **Acclamation (Sanctus):** The entire congregation joins with the heavenly powers in singing the "Holy, Holy, Holy Lord God of hosts".
- **Epiclisis:** The Church implores the Holy Spirit to consecrate the gifts of bread and wine, transforming them into the Body and Blood of Christ, and that those who partake may receive salvation.
- **Institution Narrative and Consecration:** The words and actions of Christ from the Last Supper are reenacted, carrying out the sacrifice He instituted.
- **Anamnesis:** The Church fulfills Christ's command to

remember Him, recalling His Passion, Resurrection, and Ascension.

- **Offering:** The Church offers the spotless Victim to the Father, with the intention that the faithful also learn to offer themselves in unity with God.
- **Intercessions:** These express the communion of the Church on earth and in heaven, and the offering is made for all members, living and dead.
- **Final Doxology:** The glorification of God is expressed and concluded by the people's "Amen".

Specifically, in Eucharistic Prayer I, the prayer "To you, therefore, most merciful Father" (*Te igitur*) is said by the principal celebrant alone. It includes specific formulas for commemorating the Blessed Virgin Mary, Saint Joseph, and a long list of Apostles and Martyrs, emphasizing the continuity of faith with those who have gone before. The saints mentioned here are worth noting: First the Apostles are named. The rest are all martyrs representing various stations in life. Linus, Cletus, and Clement were Popes who were ordained by Peter; Sixtus and Cornelius were also early Popes. Cyprian was a bishop and Laurence a deacon. The rest were laymen. Since the Canon is of very early origin in the Church, the most profound reverence was given to those who offered up the ultimate sacrifice for their faith.

**Appropriate Usage**

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal provides guidance on when Eucharistic Prayer I is most appropriately used:

- It may always be used.
- It is especially suited for days when there is a proper text for the "Communicantes" (In union with the whole Church) or in Masses with a proper form of the "Hanc igitur" (Father, accept this offering).
- It is particularly appropriate for the celebrations of the Apostles and Saints mentioned within the prayer itself.
- It is also suitable for Sundays, unless pastoral considerations lead to a preference for Eucharistic Prayer III.

In summary, Eucharistic Prayer I is a venerable and theologically rich prayer that underscores the Church's continuity with its apostolic roots and its communion with the saints, making it a profound choice for the celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.
