**POWERFUL PRAYER TO
SAINT MICHAEL**

Saint Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle. Be our protection against the wickedness and snares of the devil. May God rebuke him, we humbly pray; and do Thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host - by the Divine Power of God - cast into hell, satan and all the evil spirits, who roam throughout the world seeking the ruin of souls. Amen.



Praised be Jesus Christ! Today we celebrate the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. This feast, dating back to the early Church in Jerusalem, was originally celebrated by bringing crosses to the site of the Holy Sepulchre of Jesus. St. Helena, the mother of Emperor Constantine the Great, discovered the relic of the True Cross of Christ in Jerusalem. Together with Bishop Macarius of Jerusalem, she ordered the demolition of the pagan temple of Venus that covered the holy site.

Excavations uncovered three crosses; nails and a piece of wood on which were inscribed in white letters in Hebrew, in Greek, and in Latin, the following words: Jesus of Nazareth, the king of the Jews. A miraculous healing of a dying woman identified the True Cross as the one that brought her back to life.

Emperor Constantine built the Church of the Holy Sepulchre atop the tomb of Jesus and a small shrine, called a Martyrion, on Golgotha where Christ was crucified. Both sites have been venerated by pilgrims ever since. Relics of the True Cross may also be venerated in Rome at the Basilica of Santa Croce (Holy Cross) and the Basilica of San Claudio, in London at St. Paul's Cathedral, and other churches throughout the world, in small fragments. These fragments remain focal points of pilgrimage, liturgical celebration, and personal devotion, keeping the memory of Christ's Passion alive in the life of the Church. Sadly, a fragment had also been kept at Notre-Dame de Paris until it was destroyed in the 2019 fire.

Last Sunday, we witnessed the canonization of Saints Carlo Acutis and Pier Giorgio Frassati by Pope Leo XIV. Acutis is the first millennial Saint, and venerated for his love of the Eucharist and devotion to the Blessed Mother. Frassati is venerated for his life of beatitude and dedication to social justice and service to the poor. Both are wonderful examples of ordinary men living out their Catholic faith. Saints Acutis and Frassati, pray for us!

On Tuesday, I will be traveling to Galloway for our annual convocation of priests. Bishop O'Connell welcomes us to this event every year as we gather for several days of reflection, prayer, and fellowship with one another. This is the one time during the year that most of the priests of our diocese are able to be together. It is a great opportunity for us to catch up with one another. We have a guest speaker providing reflections as well as updates from the bishop and other diocesan offices. Please pray for our bishop and all the priests of our diocese. There will be no daily Masses on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday this week, but Deacon John will be offering Communion Services at the regular time.

Walking with Purpose, our women's Bible Study, began last week. This study was well attended last year and offers morning and evening sessions every Thursday. For those women who would like to join, it is not too late to get started. Please contact Anna Lorang at anna.lorang@cosij.org for more information or to sign up. This is open to parishioners and non-parishioners alike. We welcome all those women who desire to grow in their walk with Christ as they study the Scriptures together.

In our first Reading from the Book of Numbers, the Israelites were punished with poisonous serpents for grumbling against God. All sin has consequences, particularly those against God. But, the people begged Moses to ask God to take the serpents away. The Lord has Moses create a bronze serpent and hang it up in a tree so that those who had been bitten may look upon the bronze serpent and be healed. Sometimes we have to stare death in the face to overcome our fear. Fear is crippling, like being bit by a poisonous serpent. But, God gives us the strength and the courage to face our fears and assures us that if we walk with Him, He will be our God and we will be His people. In other words, we should have confidence that God is always with us, as Jesus says, even to the end of time.

St. Paul shows how God exalted Jesus in the most unlikely way through his death on the Cross. The Cross stands as a paradox: The symbol of ultimate suffering and death becomes the symbol of Resurrection and eternal life. The Israelites were dying in the desert because they failed to trust God. It was not until they did what the Lord commanded that they were saved. Jesus was completely obedient to the Father and though he suffered death on the Cross, he was nevertheless saved. Now he sits at the right hand of the Father where he intercedes for us.

Jesus says, "And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life." May our belief in the Risen Christ dispel our own fears and let us always look upon the Holy Cross of Christ as the true source of our salvation.

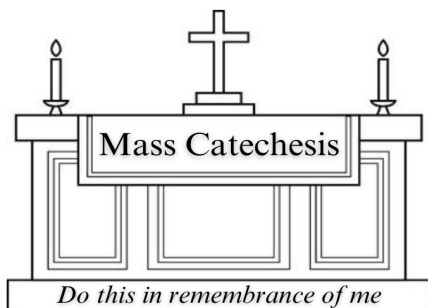

The Sign of Peace

The sign of peace follows the recitation of the Our Father at Mass as preparation for Holy Communion, signifying ecclesial communion, mutual charity, and reconciliation before the faithful receive the Body and Blood of Christ.

Expression of Ecclesial Communion and Mutual Charity

The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* (GIRM) states that the Rite of Peace follows the Our Father, during which “the Church asks for peace and unity for herself and for the whole human family”. This gesture is a concrete expression of the fraternal love and unity that should characterize those who are about to share in the one Bread of Life.

Connection to Forgiveness and Reconciliation

The placement of the sign of peace immediately after the Our Father is significant because the Lord’s Prayer includes the petition, “Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us”. This petition highlights the necessity of reconciliation and forgiveness among believers as a prerequisite for worthily receiving the Eucharist. Pope Francis emphasized that it is impossible to communicate with the one Bread that makes us one Body in Christ without recognizing that we are reconciled by fraternal love. Christ’s peace cannot take root in a heart incapable of experiencing fraternity and restoring it after it has been wounded.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church also notes that God does not accept the sacrifice of a “sower of disunion” but commands reconciliation with one’s brother first, because “God can be appeased only by prayers that make peace”. The better offering to God is peace, brotherly concord, and a people made one in the unity of one in the unity of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Christ as Our Peace

The peace offered in the rite is not merely a worldly peace but the peace of Christ himself. As Ephesians 2:14-17 states, Christ “is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us... and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through

it. So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near”. The Eucharist itself is seen as the bond of peace, gathering people, overcoming barriers, and unifying them in a new way.

Liturgical Practice

After the priest says the prayer, “Lord Jesus Christ, who said to your Apostles: Peace I leave you, my peace I give you”, he extends and joins his hands, giving the greeting of peace to the people: “The peace of the Lord be with you always”. The people respond, “And with your spirit”. The sign of peace is complete in this exchange between the priest and the people.

As an option, when appropriate, the priest (or deacon) may add, “Let us offer each other the sign of peace”, and the faithful may exchange a sign that expresses peace, communion, and charity. The manner of this sign is typically a handshake, though other culturally appropriate gestures may be used as determined by the local Bishops’ Conference, but it is generally offered to those nearest in a sober manner.

Historically, the sign of peace was a kiss. In the second century, St. Justin Martyr wrote in his letter to Antoninus, “When the prayers are concluded we exchange the kiss.” The Catholic Encyclopedia explains that “the kiss” is “the kiss of peace.” In recent times, people have found it difficult to shake hands let alone kiss each other. Many opt to simply wave or hold up their hand. This has added some confusion when exchanging the sign of peace. Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, Pope Benedict XVI, in *Sacramentum Caritatis*, noted discussions during the Synod of Bishops about the appropriateness of “greater restraint in this gesture, which can be exaggerated and cause a certain distraction in the assembly just before the reception of Communion”. At a time when Christ is truly and substantially present on the altar, some may find themselves distracted by the sign of peace. Still, Benedict XVI affirmed that “nothing is lost when the sign of peace is marked by a sobriety which preserves the proper spirit of the celebration, as, for example, when it is restricted to one’s immediate neighbours”. Nevertheless, should the invitation not be extended, for example, to foster deeper reverence for the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, the Sign of Peace is completed with the people’s response, “And with your spirit.”

In summary, the sign of peace following the Our Father is a liturgical action that concretely expresses the unity, charity, and reconciliation among the faithful, preparing them spiritually to receive Christ in the Eucharist, who is the source of all peace and unity. The peace of the Lord be with you always.
