A Note from Our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

I have had three meetings with the Property Task Force to discuss the need and use of all our properties in the parish. The first

meeting was an overview of all the properties we own, the second meeting dealt with all the statistics of the parish and this month we looked at the finances and the state of our buildings. The plan is to now move into processing the information as a task force and begin committing to texts that will be used to come to some decisions. Once this phase is completed, the hope is to present it to the parish and to host a few town meetings to hear the reaction from everyone in the parish. This is a slow process, but I really want to do it right and bring people along with me. Some people have said statements such as, "I already know what Father wants to do." This is not really fair or true. Some decisions that have to be made are obvious, and it is my hope that once all the information is presented, everyone in the parish will say, "this is what should be done," and "this is what I think has to be done." Getting to this point takes time so I am not rushing things. Know that there is more to come.

We are sending out our yearly letter to all parishioners for Easter with all the times for Holy Week services and information on all our programs in the parish. I believe it is important to reach out to everyone in the parish, practicing or not, to invite them to Church, to let them know what is going on in the parish and to connect with those who may be far away from the faith to ask them to consider joining us for Mass. If you do not get a letter from me in the mail before Easter, maybe you are not a registered parishioner here in the parish. Please register online or call the parish office so that we know that you are parishioners here in the parish.

I hope those who join us online for the Catechism classes on Monday nights are finding it meaningful and enriching. It is really getting fun as we discuss elements of faith that are widely unknown or shocking to Catholics. Many times, it is discovering that what we always believed is not Church teaching or actually contradicts it. For many of us, we got our beliefs from images in media or lines from a movie. If you have not joined us yet, turn your computer on, get a cup of cocoa and join us from the comfort of your home. If you are having trouble connecting to our website, Facebook, YouTube or Teams account, please speak to someone in the office who can help you.



- Kool aid pouches or juice boxes
- Rice Krispy treats
- Small individual purse size tissues
- Gift cards to Wal-Mart and or BJ's. We do a lot of bulk shopping there.
- Amazon gift cards- this is where we get Mylar blankets, tissues, hand warmers, bulk gloves and hats.
- 30 gallon trash bags- these help to keep the homeless community's things dry. They appreciate them.



Rooted In Scripture The Catholic Faith Explained Sacred Scripture & The Catechism



(John 3:14-21 RSV) And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life." For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. For God sent the Son into the world, not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. He who believes in him is not condemned; he who does not believe is condemned already, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil. For every one who does evil hates the light, and does not come to the light, lest his deeds should be exposed. But he who does what is true comes to the light, that it may be clearly seen that his deeds have been wrought in God.

CCC 219 God's love for Israel is compared to a father's love for his son. His love for his people is stronger than a mother's for her children. God loves his people more than a bridegroom his beloved; his love will be victorious over even the worst infidelities and will extend to his most precious gift: "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son."

CCC 457 The Word became flesh for us in order to save us by reconciling us with God, who "loved us and sent his Son to be the expiation for our sins": "the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world", and "he was revealed to take away sins":

What's the big deal about love?

John 3:16 is probably the most cited scripture of all time. We see it plastered on t-shirts and bumper stickers, all over Facebook and the home decor aisle of Hobby Lobby. "For God so loved the world he gave his only son..."

The thing is, when I read this passage the meaning seems to shift. Depending on where I am in my life love takes on a different meaning. Some days my definition of love feels as broad as the horizons. Other days I am not sure I could muster a smile for the stranger walking down the street. I don't know about you all, but it seems to me that this world is crazy—left, right, and center. Our priorities have shifted, family dynamics are often complicated, and everyone seems to have their own "truth". To quote a man who wanted to wash his hands and slip away into the background of history, "what is truth?"

Truth in it's most essential state is a word. Words convey a message that are often spoken, but written down when time and distance make speaking difficult. Our scripture tells us in the opening lines of John that,

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

If the Word is God, then truth must be measured against God. So truth, the real truth comes from God. So if God speaks he speaks with the truth. When God tells us that he loves the world so much that he gave us his only son. We know that God's love for the world is the truth. That's wonderful, but there are some days I do not feel a part of this world, and I feel distanced from God's love. Our Catechism tells us that God's love for us is stronger than that of a mother over her children, or a husband for his bride, that his love will conquer our short comings and that he does this freely! Only there is a catch.

The Catechism goes on to say that "The Word became flesh to reconcile us with God..." Well it takes two to tango as they say. This love which is everything, means nothing, if we are not ourselves open to receiving it. The Father has given us absolute free will to reject him and his son. Why? Because he loves us. Even in the darkest corners, God still wants to shine his light in, but only if we want him.

I cannot say that. Cut me off in traffic, forget to say thank you, or fail to even smile at me and I am off into judgment land. When things don't seem to go according to my plan and people let me down, I sometimes fail to love them as God has asked me to do.

"Our love is imperfect, We had lost the possession of the good; it was necessary for it to be given back to us. Did they not move God to descend to human nature and visit it, since humanity was in so miserable and unhappy a state?" CCC 457

God does not only love the world, he loves you and me, and all that he has created. God came here to earth to show humanity how to love as he does. As the Father loves the Son, so the Son loves the Father and all his works. I pray that this be the Lent that we let God shine his light in us, into the cracks and crevices, to purge out the dark and let love shine in. Let this be the Lent we love one another simply because God loves them and us. There is a reason we see John 3:16 everywhere, it is because it is the truth and we need to be reminded of that truth everyday, until all is revealed and we get to see God face to face.




