

#### INDULGENCES ASSOCIATED WITH THE EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS:

#### Plenary Indulgence for National Eucharistic Pilgrimage

A decree issued by the Apostolic Penitentiary and approved by Pope Francis indicates that the plenary indulgence will be granted to the Christian faithful who participate in the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage at any point between May 17 and July 16, 2024. It will also be granted to the elderly, infirm, and all those who cannot leave their homes for a serious reason and who participate in spirit with the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, uniting their prayers, pains, or inconveniences with Christ and the pilgrimage. This indulgence is granted under the usual conditions of sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father. The faithful may also apply this indulgence through suffrage for the souls of the faithful departed in Purgatory. In recognition of this extraordinary event, the Apostolic Penitentiary also requests that all priests who have been endowed with the appropriate faculties for

hearing Confessions present themselves willingly and generously in administering the Sacrament of Penance to all who participate in the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage.

## Papal Blessing with Plenary Indulgence for National Eucharistic Congress

The second decree issued by the Apostolic Penitentiary and approved by Pope Francis, says that Archbishop Broglio or another prelate of episcopal rank assigned by him, following the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, may impart the Papal Blessing with a Plenary Indulgence to the Christian Faithful who participate in the National Eucharistic Congress, who are truly repentant, and who are motivated by charity, if the usual conditions for indulgences—sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father—have been met. Faithful individuals who, due to reasonable circumstances and with pious intention, have participated in the sacred rites and received the Papal Blessing through media communications, may also obtain a Plenary Indulgence.

#### FROM THE FEDERATION OF DIOCESAN LITURGICAL COMMISSIONS

#### Newly-Revised: Holy Communion and Worship of the Eucharistic Mystery Outside Mass

The revised rites were approved by Pope Paul VI and promulgated by the Congregation of Divine Worship on June 21, 1973, the solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. *That editio typica* was entitled *De sacra communion et de culta mysrerii eucharistici extra Missam*. Our current English translation has been in use in the dioceses of the United States since 1976. In recent years, this rite has undergone a revision and retranslation. The International Commission on English in the Liturgy (ICEL) completed its work in 2020. On November 17, 2021, the United States Bishops approved a new translation and sent it to the Holy See. The Dicastery for Divine Worship and Discipline of the Sacraments approved that text on March 7, 2023 (the feast of Saints Perpetua and Felicity). After the usual dialogue, proofing and editing, a Decree of Publication was issued by Archbishop Timothy P. Broglio, President of the USCCB, on January 25, 2024.

The text may be used in the liturgy on September 14, 2024, the Exaltation of the Cross. Its use is mandatory on the First Sunday of Advent, December 1, 2024. The ritual edition may be sold by publishers no sooner than August 1, 2024. It will be printed by several publishers -- Catholic Book Publishing, Liturgical Press, Liturgy Training Publications, Magnificat, and Midwest Theological Forum. [N.B. ## The New Translation of the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) Approved by Rome

The Dicastery for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments has confirmed the revised translations of the *Order of Christian Initiation of Adults* and the *Ritual de la Iniciación Cristiana de Adultos*. The decrees of confirmation were issued on Ash Wednesday, February 14 and were received by the USCCB shortly thereafter.

The final texts have been received and will undergo the customary review by the Secretariat for Divine Worship before an implementation schedule is recommended to the USCCB President. Those dates will be contained in an official Decree of Publication.

The revised OCIA/RICA retains the identical arrangement and numbering as the current USA editions. One notable change is the numbering of the chapters: Part I (for the catechumenate) is marked as Chapter I, while the chapters in Part II (for Particular Circumstances), is now numbered as chapters 2-6 (formerly nos. 1-5). Appendix I contains the combined rites and Appendix II contains the Acclamations, Hymns, and Chants. The National Statutes (formerly in a third appendix) will now be moved to the front matter of the text, along with the Introductions, decrees and other legislation.

As noted earlier, terminology has been refined to better clarify titles, e.g., "inquirer," "catechumen," "elect," and "candidate." New sample introductions are provided for use by the celebrant in the combined rites, making clear the distinctions between groups. The combined rites for Easter Vigil also now include texts for the baptism of an infant (adapted from the *Order of Baptism of Children*) since the Missal and other liturgical texts provides for this possibility.

FDLC Formation for the OCIA: For over fifty-five years, it has been the mission of the FDLC to provide formation on new liturgical texts. In the coming weeks/months, the FDLC will offer a timeline of its formation efforts, which will include diocesan workshop kits, in-person workshops, and webinars.

LITURGICAL CALENDAR: THIS MONTH

#### THE MONTHS OF MAY AND JUNE

May is traditionally regarded as a Marian month. Please recall, however, that the Easter Season should remain the primary focus in both prayer and in the liturgical environment. Popular devotions are to take their life from the liturgy, not overshadow it.

Sunday, May 12, the <u>Solemnity of the Ascension</u>, is also Mother's Day this year. As a secular holiday, it should in no way overshadow the primary celebration of the paschal mystery and Eastertime. The Book of Blessings (#1724ff) contains an appropriate rite for parish use. The same applies to Father's Day, June 16 (See BB #1729ff) – which is the 11<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time.

#### May

- May 12 In our Province, the Ascension of the Lord always replaces the 7th Sunday of Easter. This is also World Communication Day, and Mother's Day (as noted above). Please see:

- May 19: Pentecost. The Paschal Candle remains in the sanctuary next to the ambo throughout Eastertime until the conclusion of Vespers II on this day.

#### LITURGICAL CALENDAR

## Lent / Triduum / Easter 2025

- Ash Wednesday will fall on March 5, 2025.
- The Rite of Election is scheduled for March 9, the 1st Sunday of Lent.
- The Chrism Mass is tentatively scheduled for April 14, the Monday of Holy Week.
- The *Triduum* falls on Thursday, April 17 through Sunday, April 20 with the Easter Vigil falling on the night of Saturday, April 19. On that night, sunset is at ~7:45 pm. In order to insure sufficient darkness, at least 45 minutes (preferably one hour) should elapse after sunset before the Vigil may begin. Therefore, the earliest that the Vigil may begin is 8:30 pm CDT, preferably 8:45 pm.
