Saturday evening, I drove to Sacred Heart Parish in Melcher-Dallas. I visited in my capacity as a diocesan director and as a CRS Global Fellow. Though I was only able to be at their Saturday evening Mass, I wanted to thank the members of the parish for their incredible generosity expressed during the CRS Rice Bowl campaign. The funds they collected led the diocese and enabled us to realize one of the strongest collections I can remember. As 25% of Rice Bowl funds collected stay in the diocese, it also enabled Rice Bowl grant recipients to have solid support as they address hunger in communities in our diocese. For all the times we ask parishioners to prayerfully consider giving, it is important to also personally deliver the heartfelt *THANK YOU!*

The Social Action Office also has a diocesan Social Action Commission. We meet regularly on the 4th Wednesday of the month at 8:30am by Zoom. 

NICARAGUAN BISHOP WILL RECEIVE PACEM IN TERRIS AWARD:

Bishop Silvio José Báez Ortega, O.C.D., who has risked his life advocating for justice and peace in his beloved homeland of Nicaragua, will receive the Pacem in Terris Peace and Freedom Award on July 9 in Davenport.

Bishop Báez, 67, lives in exile and teaches at a seminary in Boynton Beach, Florida but continues to speak out for human rights and democracy in Nicaragua. He is among hundreds of Nicaraguans expelled or deported in recent years for criticizing the administration of President Daniel Ortega and his wife, Vice President Rosario Murillo. THE PACEM IN TERRIS PEACE AND FREEDOM AWARD HISTORY:

The Pacem in Terris Peace and Freedom Award was created in 1964 by the Davenport Catholic Interracial Council. Since 1978, the award has been presented by the Quad City Pacem in Terris Coalition. The award honors Pope John XXIII and commemorates his 1963 encyclical letter, *Pacem in Terris (Peace on Earth)*, which called on all people to secure peace among all nations.

Bishop Seitz Urges Gospel-Based Solidarity With Refugees, Migrants | OSV News

Solidarity with refugees and migrants is "not an option" but "a living testimony of the Gospel," said Bishop Mark J. Seitz of El Paso, Texas, a CLINIC board member and the chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Migration. He shared his thoughts in a statement for World Refugee Day, which is observed on June 20 and was established by the United Nations (UN) in 2001. The UN Refugee Agency says that by the end of 2024, more than 123 million people had been displaced from their homes due to persecution, conflict, violence, human rights violations, and instability. Just over 43 million were refugees. More than 73 million were displaced in their own countries. Another 8.4 million were asylum seekers, and 4.4 million were stateless persons. EXPAND YOUR HORIZONS:

With our new Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV, taking the name Leo, we have taken it as a signal that he aligns with the ideas of *Rerum Novarum*, the foundational document of Catholic social doctrine and the rights of labor written by of Pope Leo XIII. Vatican spokesperson Matteo Bruni confirmed that the name was a "direct recall" of Leo XIII's commitment to social doctrine, particularly in the context of modern challenges like artificial intelligence and economic inequality. While Pope Leo XIV hasn't issued a formal statement on the Church's social doctrine, his comments to date on fraternity, unity and the equality of all people continue in that vein. Certainly, a re-reading of *Rerum Novarum* would be appropriate now. The Catholic Labor Network, a Catholic non-profit devoted to the promotion of the principles of Catholic Social Teaching on dignity of work and the rights of workers, has assembled a brief description of *Rerum Novarum* and of five succeeding documents on the topics with links to the documents themselves.
