Over 225 students and family members attended and experienced a fun variety of mathematics-based games and activities creatively designed and coordinated by the teachers. Decks of cards, bean bags, dice, dominoes, triominoes, and wood shapes were the featured playing pieces at a number of the math stations. "Fraction Snacks," coordinated by fourth grade teacher Mrs. Westermann, was a popular attraction: Students grabbed a bag of Chex mix, Skittles or M&M's and then had fun with math by estimating, writing fractions, adding, tallying, sorting, and comparing. On Ash Wednesday, 8th graders at Holy Trinity volunteered at the Oregon Food Bank as a class. Students geared up, rocked out, and repacked an amazing amount of carrots. Students helped to repack 6,347 pounds of carrots. That works out to be 5,289 meals, or 89 meals repacked per student!

The Madeleine Water1st Board Members are Changing Lives

The Madeleine Catholic School

Madeleine students on the Water1st Youth Board made big strides in their first year. The Youth Board, led by Mimi Baldwin, Claire Gaber, Teddy Gehred, Ellie Matteri and Katie Stolberg, have led by example and inspired the rest of The Madeleine community to help raise funds for Water1st, which is a nonprofit implementing water and sanitation projects in the world's poorest



communities to improve health, create opportunity, and break the cycle of poverty. During the 2017–2018 school year, each board member organized multiple fundraisers at school and helped recruit walkers for the annual Portland Carry5 Walk for Water fundraiser, resulting in donations totaling \$6,700, which will directly help 80 people in La Virtud, Honduras get clean water and toilets for life.

Connecting Over Coffee

La Salle Catholic College Preparatory

La Salle Prep students opened a coffee shop in May to raise money for Mexican growers and students who want to go on immersion trips. Open before classes on select days of the school year, Café Justo features drinks such as El Otro Latte and Chiapas Cold Brew. Prices start at \$1.75. The



student-run shop buys supplies from Cafe Justo, a coffee growers' co-op based in Chiapas, Mexico. Students work in the shop for free, channeling proceeds and tips to a scholarship fund. "I want this shop to symbolize fair trade and justice for everyone," said barista Lenora Mathis, who will graduate in 2019. "I hope it can bring together the La Salle community while also connecting us to other parts of the world." The idea to open Café Justo came from 2017 graduates Emma Ly and Christian Reyes after going on La Salle's immersion trip to the U.S.-Mexico border. Ly says that the shop shows how students can-and shouldmake a difference. "Do something," she said.

STEM in the Classroom

St. Joseph Catholic School

St. Joseph Catholic School in Salem has recently adopted the Smithsonian Institute's Science and Technology program to make hands-on STEM more accessible to all. Part of these new



materials includes squid dissection for the fourth graders! Students gathered with Mrs. Dewar and Mrs. Stone in the Science Lab to fully explore all that a squid dissection has to offer. We went through all of the external anatomy, telling the difference between the dorsal and ventral side. Students were thrilled to learn that the chromatophores can be activated just by rubbing them! Students were able to separately look at the beak and the mouth. The "pen," the hard bit of cartilage that gives a squid its shape, was easily removed. Students also identified the ink sac, and used the pen to write with the ink on their worksheets! The last step was to find the lens in the eye - it's like an unpolished marble, much like a fish eye.

Bee Observation Hive Installed at SJF St. John Fisher Catholic School

On Wednesday, April 25, 2018, SJF the colony of honey bees arrived at their new home in the library at St. John Fisher.



The observation hive was donated to the school by local green coffee distribution company, Costa Oro Intl, who has worked with "The Bee Cause" over the last 3 years to promote honey bee education for our future generation. This is the 4th observation hive that Costa Oro has donated to local schools for this purpose. The mission of the "Bee Cause Project" is to stimulate curiosity in young people about the importance of honey bees and the need to understand and embrace them and to care about their well-being through the installation of bee hives in over 1,000 schools.


The Oregon Association of School Libraries presented the Distinguished Library Service Award for School Administrators to Merrit Holub, principal of St. John Fisher.


