

Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Every week, some treasures from our tradition are shared here. Where does all this history come from? The history of God's people of prayer is always coming to light, mostly because scholars have dedicated their lives to research. They translate and ponder prayers and songs; explore the places used for worship; look at the vessels, books, and vestments; and read works from legal documents to letters and diaries. In the 1930s, Hitler's rush to arm Germany closed seminaries as priests and seminarians alike were drafted into service.

One professor, Father Josef Jungman, forced from his classroom, spent the war years in an Austrian library. His careful work disclosed much of what we know of the history of the Mass. His great work, *The Mass of the Roman Rite*, describes the evolution of Eucharistic celebration and inspired generations of scholars to explore a tradition surprisingly rich and varied. It was said of him that he had a command of the past that cast new light on the present, and opened up a clear direction to the future. His contributions to the Second Vatican Council helped shape the way that we worship today. At the end of his life, in 1975, his studies completed, he told a friend that he was waiting patiently for the Lord's knock at the door to take him to the heavenly banquet.

"He didn't hesitate to look to God and ask for it". (Luke 18, 13)

<u>Meditation:</u> It's ironic, isn't it? The tax collector in this parable, the man who kept his distance and wouldn't even raise his eyes to heaven, connected with God far more deeply than the Pharisee did.

This tax collector, keenly aware of his sinfulness, focused his attention and his faith on God. He knew he was a sinner in need of grace, but that's not where he directed his eyes. That's because he was also keenly aware of who God is and what he dared hope to receive from God. Although he had done nothing to deserve forgiveness, he didn't hesitate to look to God and ask for it (Luke 18:13).

By contrast, the Pharisee—although he was expressing thanks to God and busying himself with holy activities—was praying "to himself" rather than to God (Luke 18:11). He may have raised his eyes, but he was not looking at the Lord. Instead, he proudly listed his own accomplishments in the assurance that they entitled him to good standing with God. But to no avail. He did not go home justified (18:14).

When we come to pray, Jesus wants us neither to brag about our efforts and achievements nor to wallow in our failures and shortcomings. Both attitudes fix our attention on ourselves rather than on God, the One we approach in prayer. Instead, like that tax collector, we can simply acknowledge our sins and our profound need for God's mercy and then move forward confidently, counting on his grace.

When you pray today, make sure you focus your attention on God rather than on yourself. It might help if you start off with some short declarations about him. Today's responsorial psalm gives you a few to begin with: You, Lord, are merciful (51:3). You are compassionate (51:3). You are bountiful (51:20). You are kind (51:20). With your gaze fixed on the Lord, your prayer will always be on the right footing!

Chúa Nhật, ngày 26 tháng 10 năm 2025

"... Ông không ngần ngại hướng về Chúa và cầu xin ". (Lc 18, 13)

Suy niệm: Thật mia mai phải không? Người thu thuế trong dụ ngôn này, người giữ khoảng cách và thậm chí không dám ngước mắt lên trời, đã kết nối với Chúa sâu sắc hơn nhiều so với người Pharisêu.

Người thu thuế này, nhận thức sâu sắc về tội lỗi của mình, nên đã tập trung sự chú ý và đức tin vào Chúa. Ông biết mình là một tội nhân cần ân sủng, nhưng đó không phải là nơi anh hướng mắt tới. Đó là bởi vì ông cũng nhận thức sâu sắc về Chúa là ai và ông dám hy vọng nhận được điều gì từ Chúa. Dù không làm gì để đáng được tha thứ, nhưng ông không ngần ngại hướng về Chúa và cầu xin điều đó (Lc 18,13).

Ngược lại, người Pharisêu – mặc dù ông đang tạ ơn Chúa và bận rộn với các hoạt động thánh thiện – nhưng lại cầu nguyện "với chính mình" hơn là với Thiên Chúa (Lc 18,11). Có thể ông đã ngước mắt lên nhưng ông không nhìn vào Chúa. Thay vào đó, ông tự hào liệt kê những thành tích của mình với sự bảo đảm rằng chúng giúp ông có được vị thế tốt trước mặt Chúa. Nhưng không có kết quả. Ông không về nhà được xưng công chính (18,14).

Khi chúng ta đến cầu nguyện, Chúa Giêsu muốn chúng ta đừng khoe khoang về những nỗ lực và thành tựu của mình cũng như không đắm mình trong những thất bại và thiếu sót của mình. Cả hai thái độ đều hướng sự chú ý của chúng ta vào bản thân hơn là vào Thiên Chúa, Đấng mà chúng ta đến gần trong lời cầu nguyện. Thay vào đó, giống như người thu thuế đó, chúng ta có thể đơn giản thừa nhận tội lỗi của mình và nhu cầu sâu sắc của chúng ta đối với lòng thương xót của Chúa và sau đó tin tưởng tiến bước, trông cậy vào ân sủng của Ngài.

Khi bạn cầu nguyện hôm nay, hãy chắc chắn rằng bạn tập trung sự chú ý vào Chúa hơn là vào chính mình. Sẽ có ích nếu bạn bắt đầu bằng một số tuyên bố ngắn gọn về Ngài. Đáp ca thánh vịnh hôm nay cho bạn vài điều để bắt đầu: Lạy Chúa, Chúa là Đấng nhân từ (51,3). Chúa có lòng trắc ẩn (51,3). Chúa thật quảng đại (51,20). Chúa thật nhân hậu (51,20). Với cái nhìn hướng về Chúa, lời cầu nguyện của bạn sẽ luôn đứng vững!

Lạy Chúa, con tạ ơn Chúa vì tình yêu và lòng thương xót tuyệt vời của Chúa.

Friends, therefore witnesses



.... Let us consider the message the Apostle John gives us at the end of the fourth Gospel: "This is the disciple who is bearing witness to these things, and who has written these things; and we know that his testimony is true" (Jn 21:24). The entire preceding account is summarized as a "testimony," full of gratitude and wonder, from a disciple who never reveals his name, but calls himself "the disciple whom Jesus loved." This title reflects a relationship: it is not the name of an individual, but the testimony of a personal bond with Christ. That is what really matters to John: being a disciple of the Lord and feeling loved by him. We understand, then, that Christian witness is the fruit of a relationship of faith and love with Jesus, in whom we find the salvation of our lives. What the Apostle John writes also refers to you, dear young people. You are invited by Christ to follow him and sit beside him, to listen to his heart and share closely in his life! Each one of you is a "beloved disciple" for him, and from this love comes the joy of witness.

Another courageous witness to the Gospel is the Precursor of Jesus, John the Baptist, who came "to bear witness to the light, that all might believe through him" (Jn 1:7). Although he enjoyed great fame among the people, he knew well that he was only a "voice" pointing to the Savior when he exclaimed, "Behold, the Lamb of God" (Jn 1:36). His example reminds us that true witnesses do not seek to occupy the center stage, nor to bind their followers to themselves. True witnesses are humble and inwardly free, above all from themselves, that is, from the pretense of being the center of attention. Therefore, they are free to listen, to understand, and also to speak the truth to everyone, even in the presence of those who are powerful. From John the Baptist, we learn that Christian witness is neither a proclamation of ourselves nor a celebration of our spiritual, intellectual or moral abilities. True witness is recognizing and pointing to Jesus when he appears, as he is the only one who saves us. John recognized him among sinners, immersed in common humanity. To that end, Pope Francis insisted so often that if we do not go beyond ourselves and our comfort zones, if we do not go to the poor and those who feel excluded from the Kingdom of God, we cannot encounter Christ and bear witness to him. We lose the sweet joy of being evangelized and of evangelizing.

Dear friends, I invite each of you to continue to individuate Jesus' friends and witnesses in the Bible. As you read the Gospel, you will find that they all discovered the true meaning of life through their living relationship with Christ. Indeed, our deepest questions are not heard or answered by endlessly scrolling on our cell phones, which captures our attention but leaves us with tired minds and empty hearts. This search will not take us far if we keep it closed within ourselves or in narrow confinements. The fulfillment of our authentic desires always comes through going beyond ourselves. The month of November is dedicated to pray for the Dying

November 2nd is the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, also known as All Souls Day, a day set aside to pray for all the dead. All Souls Day shifts the Church's focus on praying for the Faithful Departed throughout November. The need and duty of prayer for the dead has been acknowledged by the Church. It is recommended in the Scriptures of the Old Testament: "It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins" (2 Macc. 12: 46). This duty is expressed in public and private prayers but especially in the offering of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass for the repose of souls.

The prayers are particularly directed for the souls who are being purified in Purgatory, waiting for the day when they will join the saints in heaven. The celebration of Mass is the highest means the Church can provide for charity for the dead, but we can also relieve their sufferings through our prayers, sufferings and penances. We can particularly help the Poor Souls by doing acts and prayers that have indulgences attached to them.

Please Save the Dates for a Special Opportunity to Help the Holy Souls in Purgatory November 1-8

From Nov 1-8, you have a special opportunity to gain a plenary indulgence for a soul in purgatory each day by visiting a cemetery and praying for the dead. This indulgence is a powerful act of mercy that helps release souls undergoing purification and bring them closer to Heaven. Here's what you need to do:

- 1. Visit a cemetery
- 2. Pray for the deceased, offering your prayers for the souls in purgatory.

To receive the plenary indulgence, the usual conditions must also be met:

- Be in the state of grace and free from all attachment to sin, even venial sins (make an act of the will for this).
- Receive Holy Communion
- Pray for the traditional intentions of the Holy Father (not just any intention). An Our Father and a Hail Mary are common prayers for this. The 6 objective intentions of the Holy Father are as follows:
 - ⇒ The Exaltation of the Church.
 - \Rightarrow The Propagation of the Faith.
 - ⇒ The Extirpation of Heresy.
 - ⇒ The Conversion of Sinners.
 - ⇒ The Concord between Christian Princes.
 - ⇒ The Further Welfare of the Christian People.
- Receive Sacramental Confession (within 20 days)

Additionally, on All Souls' Day (November 2), there's another way you can seek a plenary indulgence— visit any church and pray an Our Father and the Creed for the faithful departed.

Mark your calendars and make a plan to visit a cemetery each day from November 1-8!

Update The HML 10. 12. 2025 (Debt Reduction Program)

Dear St. Mary Parishioners,

Our beautiful Parish Life Center Building and the renovated Religious Education Building have been open for just about one year. This means that our ongoing debt reduction initiative, "Honoring Mary's Legacy" has been established also for about a year. The HML program has been very successful, and we have all of you generous St. Mary's parishioners to thank for this success.

We have a truly wonderful new garden area complete with stunning Catholic Sanctuary, pray seats, benches for prayer and contemplation and symbolic arches and paver stones. These are just of few of the physical additions to the St. Mary ground not to mention all the new plants and lawn!

Of course, the "main objective" of the HML effort is to reduce the debt of the parish resulting from the construction project. To that end, of the original \$400,000 funding shortfall that required our church to borrow necessary monies, has been reduced to approximately \$150,000. In other words, nearly 2/3 of the debt has been eliminated!


