

MISSION STATEMENT



FATHER JOHN'S CORNER:

I had a second-grade student ask me quietly if I ever had a bad day. Yes, I responded, as if she thought that I was exempt from bad days. We all have bad days. Unfortunately, at times there can be more bad days than good days. We are reminded in the 2nd reading today from St. Paul's letter to the Philippians (4:6-9), "Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petitions, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." In addition to prayer of petition for help, Paul also includes thanksgiving. When we are having a bad day, when we are anxious, it can be hard to remember to be thankful for what we do have. If you have not found peace, then maybe what Paul writes will direct you to the peace you long for.

When you are dealing with physical health issues, it can be easy to become anxious. There are so many unknowns. Next weekend, there will be an opportunity to receive the Anointing of the Sick following each Mass. In addition to those who are in need of physical healing, the Sacrament is also intended for those who are in need of emotional or spiritual healing. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick reminds us of God's healing presence which will "guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

I'm trying something different this year due to not having a Liturgy Committee, and that is having a meeting for anyone who would like to help plan for the Advent and Christmas Seasons here at the parish. On **Wednesday, Oct 25** at 7:00pm in the Gathering Area of the Church, we will meet to plan how the liturgies during the Advent Season and Christmas Season will look. The focus will primarily be on the weekend Mass. There is an extra challenge this year as Christmas Eve falls on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, so we lose a week of the season. How can we not lose the entire feel and message of Advent in this shortened year? Come with ideas.

Remember to set aside time on **Wednesday, October 18 between 2:30 and 6:30pm** to spend in quiet prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. And to set aside **Monday, October 23 at 6:30pm to pray the rosary as a parish at the Living Rosary**. In both of these prayer experiences, please keep in your prayers the strengthening of our respect for all life and for the defeat of the Abortion Amendment.

We will be meeting in the Gathering Area at 7:00pm, following 6:30pm Mass for one hour. This one hour will enrich your life and your participation at Mass.

Twenty -Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time Where are the Grapes?

Jesus' parable is a little different from the one in the first reading. Isaiah has the vineyard under good and faithful care, but still it produces wild grapes. In the Gospel, the vineyard presumably had a good harvest, but the workers refuse to give any of the grapes to the landowner. The question for us is, which parable is about me?

Do I ignore all that God does to help me be a good disciple? Am I too busy to take time to pray or read the Bible? Do I hold onto grudges instead of forgiving and releasing them? Do I only go to church when someone drags me there, or only at Christmas and Easter? (If that were true, I probably would not be reading this bulletin.) Do I decline the invitations to go on a retreat? Am I afraid to share my faith with someone who needs encouragement? If any of these are true, I might be like the vineyard in the first reading, producing no fruit despite all the opportunities God has given me.

Or we may be the other side of the coin. We had our children baptized when they were babies, sent them to the parish school or religion classes. We went to church every Sunday and took them with us. We gave them as good an example as we could, teaching them to love others and be generous with what they have. Yet they grew up and drifted away from the faith. Then we have to remember how patient God is with us, God's people who don't always produce the fruits of faith.

The Gospel is a little more difficult to relate to. The tenants in the parable refer to those who mistreated or killed the prophets sent by God or the people who would have Jesus crucified. Yet the kingdom of God is still being proclaimed in spite of them. God is patient with them. Look what happened to Saul, who persecuted many Christians before he became one himself. In our second reading he tells us to follow his example as he follows Christ. Then, he says, the peace of God will be with us, too (Philippians 4:6–9


