FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT: JOHN 11:1-45

Now a man was ill, Lazarus from Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. Mary was the one who had anointed the Lord with perfumed oil and dried his feet with her hair; it was her brother Lazarus who was ill. So the sisters sent word to him saying, "Master, the one you love is ill." hen Jesus heard this he said, "This illness is not to end in death, but is for the glory of God, that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. So when he heard that he was ill, he remained for two days in the place where he was. Then after this he said to his disciples, "Let us go back to Judea." The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just trying to stone you, and you want to go back there?" Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours in a day? If one walks during the day, he does not stumble, because he sees the light of this world. But if one walks at night, he stumbles, because the light is not in him." He said this, and then told them, "Our friend Lazarus is asleep, but I am going to awaken him." So the disciples said to him, "Master, if he is asleep, he will be saved." But Jesus was talking about his death, while they thought that he meant ordinary sleep. So then Jesus said to them clearly, "Lazarus has died. And I am glad for you that I was not there, that you may believe. Let us go to him." So Thomas, called Didymus, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go to die with him."

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, only about two miles away. And many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to comfort them about their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went to meet him; but Mary sat at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that whatever you ask of God, God will give you." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise." Martha said to him, "I know he will rise, in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world."

When she had said this, she went and called her sister Mary secretly, saying, "The teacher is here and is asking for you." As soon as she heard this, she rose quickly and went to him. For Jesus had not yet come into the village, but was still where Martha had met him. So when the Jews who were with her in the house comforting her saw Mary get up quickly and go out, they followed her, presuming that she was going to the tomb to weep there. When Mary came to where Jesus was and saw him, she fell at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

When Jesus saw her weeping and the Jews who had come with her weeping, he became perturbed and deeply troubled, and said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Sir, come and see." And Jesus wept. So the Jews said, "See how he loved him." But some of them said, "Could not the one who opened the eyes of the blind man have done something so that this man would not have died?"

So Jesus, perturbed again, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone lay across it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the dead man's sister, said to him, "Lord, by now there will be a stench; he has been dead for four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus raised his eyes and said, "Father, I thank you for hearing me. I know that you always hear me; but because of the crowd here I have said this, that they may believe that you sent me." And when he had said this, He cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, tied hand and foot with burial bands, and his face was wrapped in a cloth. So Jesus said to them, "Untie him and let him go."

Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what he had done began to believe in him.

ADULTS: How does belief in the final resurrection from the dead affect your family's daily life?

CHILDREN: What do you hope for after your life on earth is ended?



"God made me to know Him, to love Him and serve Him in this world to be happy forever with Him in the next." Is that what we are living? Our primary purpose on earth is to glorify God. We are created chiefly for the life beyond the grave. This present life is merely a preparation for everlasting life. Are we living for that purpose, or for just the fleeting happiness the world and flesh can give? "Behold, now is the acceptable time; behold, now is the day of salvation!" 2 Corinthians 6:2 - Keeping this quote in mind will help us when we have been weak or forgetful in persevering in our Lenten resolutions. It doesn't matter what we did yesterday, or even a few minutes ago. The

important time is **NOW**, and we need to make the best of NOW. Not the past, not the future, but the present. Lent is not the time for procrastinating!

Resurrection is the theme of 5th Sunday of Lent readings. We, as Christians, hope in the resurrection; therefore, we lead a life of holiness, trusting in Jesus, who is the resurrection and life. In raising Lazarus from the dead, Jesus shows us that He is above death; in Him, death finds its new meaning as entry into eternal life. Although the resurrection is highlighted, the underlying message for us today is to believe in Jesus and find new life. Jesus weeps - which can be interpreted as a call to conversion. This weeping could be for the lack of faith of people in the healing and strengthening power of God. Today Jesus looks at you and me, weeps and wants us to be raised from our shortcomings and weaknesses. After rising from all our iniquities, God will instill in us a new spirit to live a life of true followers of Christ. This journey of faith is not in isolation but in the care of others. To be risen again with Christ, one has to be in a close relationship with one's neighbor. So, let us not be a cause of destruction to others. Instead, be an instrument that leads everyone to new life. Pray and Practice: Dear Jesus, by raising Lazarus to life, vou promised and showed us that the resurrection and new life are

This Sunday at Noon, March 26 is the cut off for taking orders!! Fund Raising Event for Fr. Bose Jujuvarapu, HGN and Family in India: Fr. Bose, Sacramental Minister for Sacred Heart Catholic Church and St. Mary of the Assumption - Megargel, is facing a very hard and bad financial crisis for his family back in India. His senior parents are hardworking (day labor) and his brother is a cab driver struggling to make ends meet. There is a severe diabetic child also in the home. They sold their house and moved to a larger city where there is access to hospital care and better paying jobs. They are currently renting an apartment. The old home of 33 years was in disrepair and so they will use those funds to purchase a plot of land for future construction. The estimate for a modest 1,300 sq. ft. house is about \$50,000. Fr. Bose is planning to take out some loans to complete the project. Our parishes want to help by asking support for a Kolache and Cinnamon roll bake sale. The baking days will be held on Saturday, April 1 and Sunday, April 2. Flavors for kolaches are: cream cheese, cherry, and apricot. Both cinnamon rolls and kolaches are \$15 per dozen. Pick-ups will be after 2 p.m. on that Sunday and then on Monday, April 3 until 2 p.m. at the Sacred Heart parish hall.
