TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: MATTHEW 16:13-20

Jesus went into the region of Caesarea Philippi and he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" They replied, "Some say John the Baptist, others Elijah, still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?" Simon Peter said in reply, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Jesus said to him in reply, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah. For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my heavenly Father. And so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven. Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven." Then he strictly ordered his disciples to tell no one that he was the Christ.

The Passion of St. John the Baptist – August 29th

In addition to the feast of the nativity of St. John the Baptist (June 24), the Church, since the fourth century, commemorates the martyrdom of Christ's precursor. According to the Roman Martyrology, this day marks "the second finding of his most venerable head." The body of the saint was buried in Samaria. In the year 362 pagans desecrated the grave and burned his remains. Only a small portion of his relics were able to be saved by monks and sent to St. Athanasius at Alexandria. The head of the saint is venerated at various places. That in the Church of St. Sylvester in Rome belongs to a martyr-priest John. Also in the Dominican church at Breslau the Baptist's head is honored.

There is no doubt that blessed John suffered imprisonment and chains as a witness to our Redeemer, whose forerunner he was, and gave his life for him. His persecutor had demanded not that he should deny Christ, but only that he should keep silent about the truth. Nevertheless, he died for Christ. Does Christ not say: "I am the truth"? Therefore, because John shed his blood for the truth, he surely died for Christ.

Through his birth, preaching and baptizing, he bore witness to the coming birth, preaching and baptism of Christ, and by his own suffering he showed that Christ also would suffer.

Such was the quality and strength of the man who accepted the end of this present life by shedding his blood after the long imprisonment. He preached the freedom of heavenly peace, yet was thrown into irons by ungodly men. He was locked away in the darkness of prison, though he came bearing witness to the Light of life and deserved to be called a bright and shining lamp by that Light itself, which is Christ.

To endure temporal agonies for the sake of the truth was not a heavy burden for such men as John; rather it was easily borne and even desirable, for he knew eternal joy would be his reward.

Since death was ever near at hand, such men considered it a blessing to embrace it and thus gain the reward of eternal life by acknowledging Christ's name. Hence the apostle Paul rightly says: "You have been granted the privilege not only to believe in Christ but also to suffer for his sake." He tells us why it is Christ's gift that his chosen ones should suffer for him: "The sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory that is to be revealed in us."

BE HUMBLE AND FAITHFUL: On this 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time, Jesus asks two questions to Peter. Both questions were personal. Peter's answers were very significant because his answers were based on his personal experience. Messiah means the anointed one. Jesus was well pleased with Peter's response and gave authority to Him. Jesus said to Peter, "You are Peter, and upon this rock, I will build my Church. The rock refers to the foundational belief on which the Church is built. The rock is Peter's faith. Showing Peter's faith, Jesus gave the keys to the kingdom of Heaven. In today's first reading, Isaiah tells us how the keys of authority were taken away from the Shebna, the unfaithful and proud "master of the royal palace", and given to the humble and faithful Eliakim. Humility and faithfulness are the great qualities of a human being. These qualities of people make life unique. When we see at the life of Jesus and find that He was humble before His Father. He surrendered everything to God the Father and chose to become poor. Jesus teaches us to be humble before everyone because it is a sign of strength, but we think that humility is a sign of weakness. On the other side, Jesus was faithful to His Father unto death. As Christians, we are called to be faithful to the Lord and have strong faith in Jesus, like Peter, to enter Heavenly bliss. Pray and practice: Dear Lord, help us look into ourselves the gifts of humility and faithfulness so that we may recognize these virtues and grow in them. Have a great week, Fr. Bose

Update on Deacon Jim Novak's Recovery

Just to give everyone a little update on my present condition. It's been a long several months for me... beginning last November 2022 when I decided to have my right arm and hand nerves repaired. The arm and the shoulder were experiencing constant pain and tingling to the point I couldn't sleep well. That was the spinal fusion surgery on my 5, 6, 7th vertebrae conducted by a neurosurgeon in Round Rock, Tx. last November. If you recall, I wore a full neck brace for a full three months. I was told to not drive and take it easy with plenty of rest. I finally after six weeks began working part time ... half-days for a week or so.

I also began driving again for about three weeks when I suffered a stroke. That happened during Lent. It was in the back part of my brain which affects the vision. My left quadrant's vision in both eyes have a distortion that I must compensate for. I was told at the hospital that I had a migraine headache. Waking up the next morning with the same visual symptoms, we decided to go straight to Wichita Falls United Regional for a MRI and I was admitted immediately. They did a head CT and two MRI's which spotted the stroke and a tumor, the size of a lemon. I truly believe it was a God-send. Why would I have ever had any reason to check my head area for that tumor?

The tumor was suspicious of cancer... but to do a biopsy then could cause further damage or another stroke. That's why I was told by protocol to wait a full three months before the craniotomy. It had to come out because of its size and location. I received another MRI in May, which was inconclusive, only minor growth if any. The date chosen for the craniotomy was set for June 12.

June 5th our two seminarians arrived and we mapped out their assignments to include visitations to the sick, shut-ins, VBS, the CHWC in Kansas and such. They were to assist with all liturgies and take care of the garden with weeding and harvesting. I only had a week with them before my surgery.

I survived the surgery finding the tumor to be completely benign. However, about day two, I developed a severe brain bleed and another stoke which required platelets being given. I had no memory of three weeks or so. Family told me I knew no one's names or relationship, or even who I was and would only repeat back what someone would say. I slowly began to heal and regain my strength and physical abilities. I spent two weeks at Encompass Rehab in Wichita Falls doing therapy... speech, physical, and occupational. I finally gained enough strength and progress to be released after 2 weeks there to go home. Most of my struggles were remembering people and their names. I spent most of my waking time in prayer, reading the bible and the Catholic Catechism. I had begun both of the pod-cast

series... the "Bible in a Year" and the "Catechism in a Year"... both by Fr. Michael Schmitz by Ascension Press. I was trying to gain back my cognitive recollection and prayer life.

I am currently completing two full months of physical and speech therapy at the North Texas Rehab Center in Wichita Falls. My two therapists are very pleased with my progress. I still require about 10 or so hours of rest daily. It has been a great ordeal.

My gratitude goes out to all who have been there for me. I thank God, the Holy Trinity, Mother Mary, St. Joseph, my guardian angel, Blessed Father McGivney, and all the saints. I thank especially my spouse, Rilda, as my soulmate for 51 years. She has been so loving and caring...feeding me, clothing me, and all the "driving." I am truly blessed! To all our children, grandchildren, friends who have prayed for my recovery, I appreciate your efforts. I also wish to recognize Bishop Olson as he invoked all deacons and their wives to pray to Blessed Fr. McGivney for his intercession for healing. An invocation prayer was sent to all the deacons in our diocese. I cannot fathom the numerous prayer notes, cards and best wishes I have received and all those who have called, visited and checked in on me and my recovery. Thanks to Fr. Bose and all those who brought me the Blessed Sacrament. Thanks to Belinda Bench, our secretary, for her generous work and filling in for the parish duties I once did. Thanks to all the priests and seminarians for their prayers.

Please know I will be trying to apply shortly for my driving privileges in the next two weeks so I can get back to part-time work at the office and garden. Please again know how blessed I have been and how much everyone has touched my recovery experience.
