#### TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: MATTHEW 18:21-35

Peter approached Jesus and asked him, "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus answered, "I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times. That is why the kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who decided to settle accounts with his servants. When he began the accounting, a debtor was brought before him who owed him a huge amount. Since he had no way of paying it back, his master ordered him to be sold, along with his wife, his children, and all his property, in payment of the debt. At that, the servant fell down, did him homage, and said, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back in full.' Moved with compassion the master of that servant let him go and forgave him the loan. When that servant had left, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a much smaller amount. He seized him and started to choke him, demanding, 'Pay back what you owe.' Falling to his knees, his fellow servant begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.' But he refused. Instead, he had the fellow servant put in prison until he paid back the debt. Now when his fellow servants saw what had happened, they were deeply disturbed, and went to their master and reported the whole affair. His master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you your entire debt because you begged me to. Should you not have had pity on your fellow servant, as I had pity on you?' Then in anger his master handed him over to the torturers until he should pay back the whole debt. So will my heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you forgives your brother from your heart."

**ADULTS:** When someone hurts you, are you more inclined to be just or to be merciful?

CHILDREN: When have you forgiven someone who treated you unfairly?

### St. Matthew – Feast Day September 21

No one was more shunned by the Jews than a publican, who was a Jew working for the Roman enemy by robbing his own people and making a large personal profit. Publicans were not allowed to trade, eat, or even pray with others Jews.

One day, while seated at his table of books and money, Jesus looked at Matthew and said two words: "Follow me." This was all that was needed to make Matthew rise, leaving his pieces of silver to follow Christ. His original name, "Levi," in Hebrew signifies "Adhesion" while his new name in Christ, Matthew, means "Gift of God." The only other outstanding mention of Matthew in the Gospels is the dinner party for Christ and His companions to which he invited his fellow tax-collectors. The Jews were surprised to see Jesus with a publican, but Jesus explained that he had come "not to call the just, but sinners."

Though little else is known about the life of St. Matthew, we know that he was close to Jesus, becoming an apostle and authoring one of the four gospel accounts. Matthew wrote his Gospel for Jewish people who had become followers of Christ. He wanted his audience to know that Jesus was the Messiah that God had promised to send to save all people. Matthew's Gospel makes clear that Jesus is the fulfillment of everything said by the prophets in the Old Testament. Matthew is also the only Evangelist who shares the eight Beatitudes with his readers. His Gospel faithfully reports how Jesus described who will be truly blessed by God in the Kingdom and the attitudes and actions that are required for those who follow the new Law Jesus came to bring.

After Jesus' Ascension, Matthew preached the Gospel, as Jesus asked his disciples to do. It is believed that he established Christian communities in Ethiopia and other sections of the continent of Africa. Tradition tells us that he died as a martyr. https://www.catholicculture.org/culture/liturgicalyear/calendar/day - While he was at table in his house, many tax collectors and sinners came and sat with Jesus and his disciples. The Pharisees saw this and said to his disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners?" He heard this and said, "Those who are well do not need a physician, but the sick do. Go and learn the meaning of the words, 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' I did not come to call the righteous but sinners."—Matthew 9:10-13

FORGIVE TO BE FORGIVEN "If we do not become this Church of closeness with attitudes of compassion and tender love, we will not be the Lord's Church." - Pope Francis. On this 24<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time all three readings concentrate on a theme which is forgiveness. The first reading says that one who seeks vengeance will be paid vengeance, while the second reading speaks of our living for Christ. In the Gospel, through a parable, Jesus shows that, while a man is often incapable of forgiving in even a petty issue, at the same time, we seek mercy from the Lord for our grievous sins. The Lord is compassionate, gracious, slow to anger, and merciful. He is always willing to forgive us, but what is our disposition towards others to whom we hold our grudges and hatred? We cannot dispose of ourselves well unless we forgive others to receive God's forgiveness. If you hope for mercy, show mercy. If you want to receive, give. If you ask for yourself what you deny to others, you are asking is a mockery. Let this be the pattern for all of us when we practice mercy: show mercy to others in the same way, with the same generosity, with the same promptness, as you want others to show mercy to you. Jesus said, "I desire mercy, not sacrifice." (Mt 9:13) Pray and Practice: Lord, teach us Your generosity. Give us the grace to forgive others wholeheartedly as You forgive us, and by forgiving, may we grow in mercy. Have a great week, Fr. Bose

#### A STEWARDSHIP MOMENT:

**Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time** – Today's Gospel reading continues Jesus' instructions on being good stewards of others—the direction that if we love Jesus Christ, we must forgive an individual 77 times. The reading compels us to consider one of the most difficult practices of Christian discipleship. Forgiveness is the way of Jesus, the way of the cross. Vengeance, bitterness and hatred seem much easier and certainly more desirable. Forgiveness is a hard road to travel, but it is the only road that leads to life in Christ. Consider this week who you need to forgive."
