TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: MATTHEW 20:1-16a

Jesus told his disciples this parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out at dawn to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with them for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. Going out about nine o'clock, the landowner saw others standing idle in the marketplace, and he said to them, 'You too go into my vineyard, and I will give you what is just.' So they went off. And he went out again around noon, and around three o'clock, and did likewise. Going out about five o'clock, the landowner found others standing around, and said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' They answered, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You too go into my vineyard.' When it was evening the owner of the vineyard said to his foreman, 'Summon the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and ending with the first.' When those who had started about five o'clock came, each received the usual daily wage. So when the first came, they thought that they would receive more, but each of them also got the usual wage. And on receiving it they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last ones worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us, who bore the day's burden and the heat.' He said to one of them in reply, 'My friend, I am not cheating you. Did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what is yours and go. What if I wish to give this last one the same as you? Or am I not free to do as I wish with my own money? Are you envious because I am generous?' Thus, the last will be first, and the first will be last."

ADULTS: Which has deepened your faith more—being treated justly or being treated with love and care? Who needs you to treat them with care this week?

CHILDREN: Think of a time when you were very fair, then think of a time when you were very generous. Which felt better?

STS. MICHAEL, GABRIEL AND RAPHAEL feast day September 29th

The liturgy celebrates the feast of these three archangels who are venerated in the tradition of the Church. Michael (Who is like God?) was the archangel who fought against Satan and all his evil angels, defending all the friends of God. He is the protector of all humanity from the snares of the devil. Gabriel (Strength of God) announced to Zachariah the forthcoming birth of John the Baptist, and to Mary, the birth of Jesus. His greeting to the Virgin, "Hail, full of grace," is one of the most familiar and frequent prayers of the Christian people. Raphael (Medicine of God) is the archangel who took care of Tobias on his journey.

Angels are pure, created spirits. The name "angel" means servant or messenger of God. Angels are celestial or heavenly beings, on a higher order than human beings. Angels have no bodies and do not depend on matter for their existence or activity. They are distinct from saints, which men can become. Angels have intellect and will, and are immortal. They are a vast multitude, but each is an individual person. Archangels are one of the nine choirs of angels listed in the Bible. In ascending order, the choirs or classes are 1) Guardian Angels, 2) Archangels, 3) Principalities, 4) Powers, 5) Virtues, 6) Dominations, 7) Thrones, 8) Cherubim, and 9) Seraphim. https://www.catholicculture.org/culture/liturgicalyear/calendar/day

GOD'S THOUGHT SURPRISES - On this Twenty-Fifth Sunday in ordinary time, we hear the prophet Isaiah saying that God's ways are not ours; His thoughts are not ours. He reminds us that God's way of doing things is different. He surprises us. He invites us to leave our wickedness and unrighteous thoughts behind. In the Gospel, we see how Jesus' thoughts are different from ours. Jesus communicates to us God's way of thinking through the parable of labourers who are called to work at different hours but are paid equally at the end of the day. For human beings, it is not a just act. We expect that those who work more hours should be paid more. For us, we have to have that distinction on the basis of merits and performance. Somehow, we long to be different and be treated differently. It is not the same for God. For Him, we are all equal in His eyes because He had created us equally in His own image and likeness. He was compassionate to all the labourers because they had no work. He calls some even at the last hour and pays equally. God accepts us at any time and rewards us equally. Therefore, we are invited to be just in our way of thinking and acting and treat everyone equally without jealousy. Are we envious of others whom we think are not deserving but get equal benefits or treatment like us? Pray and practice: Lord, give us the grace to think and act for the good and betterment of others we often envy. Have a blessed week. Fr. Bose

A STEWARDSHIP MOMENT:

Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time – From an early age, we tend to distort the concept of "fairness." I am good. I deserve good things. I am not receiving good things. Something must be wrong. Who's going to fix it?" We also know the age-old expression: "Who ever said life was fait?" Jesus knew this expression when he offered his parable in today's Gospel reading. Christian stewards acknowledge, with humility, that they receive good things from the Lord in abundance; even if these gifts are not the ones they think they need when they need them. Consider which servants you identify with most in the Gospel reading, the ones who demand "fairness," or that final servant who, seemingly, deserves the least."
