FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT: MARK 1:1:12-15

The Spirit drove Jesus out into the desert, and he remained in the desert for forty days, tempted by Satan. He was among wild beasts, and the angels ministered to him.

After John had been arrested, Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the gospel of God: "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel."

ADULTS: When or how could you step away from your daily responsibilities to renew yourself, so that you can do a better job of following in the footsteps of Jesus?

CHILDREN: What good habit could you work on during Lent so you could grow closer to God?

LITURGICAL NORMS FOR LENT

The Sundays in the Lenten Season are characterized by the use of violet vestments to emphasize that we have entered into a time of repentance in our lives and in our worship together. Some of these changes are required and others are optional. So that we can better enter into the penitential spirit of Lent we are observing the following changes. During Mass we are kneeling for the Penitential Rite as we plead for God's mercy for our sins. We see the color purple displayed in the church and sanctuary as a sign of our call to conversion from sin and to life in Christ. Singing the Gloria and the Alleluia are completely suspended for all Sunday Masses during Lent as a reminder that our joy is suppressed until we can praise the Lord of Glory as his Resurrection dawns at Easter. No fresh flowers are used and the more limited use of music complements this penitential season. All of this helps us to experience the dying of ourselves that must precede our rising to new life. During the entire season of Lent no baptisms are celebrated, except in cases of life-threatening emergencies. Instead, Lent is a time of catechesis preparing us for Baptism. Baptisms will again be celebrated beginning on Saturday night, March 31, at the Easter Vigil. The Baptismal Font and all of the Holy Water Fonts remain full of Holy Water until Holy Thursday and then removed so that we might thirst for the living waters of Baptism which make of us a new creation on Easter. As we break out of our usual mode of celebrating the Sundays in Ordinary Time, let these external changes spur us on toward internal changes that are a sign of our response to God's call for a deeper Conversion during this Season of Lent. Our Theme throughout all of the Lenten Season is "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel."

THE CHAIR OF ST. PETER THE APOSTLE – FEAST DAY- FEBRUARY 22ND:

The Lord said to Peter, "You are Peter and upon this rock I will build my Church" Matthew 16:18, and "Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" Matthew 16:19.

The chair of St. Peter is a symbol of authority, as Jesus refers to this in Matthew 23: 2, when he commands and warns the crowd and his disciples, "The Scribes and Pharisees have taken their seat on the chair of Moses". The "chair" is metaphorically referring to the teaching and judging office that Moses held in the Name of God. The name that Jesus gives to Peter is a second metaphor for an office of teaching and judging, and to drive the point home, Jesus uses a third metaphor by speaking of the "Keys of the kingdom of Heaven" Mathew 16:19. The "power of the keys" is used in many ways; some are specific to the Office of St. Peter the Papacy, others are shared with those ordained to priestly ministry, the Sacrament of Confession. During this season of Lent, we pray for these human leaders of the Church chosen by God, so they are faithful ministers of God's grace to us.

This feast day is an anniversary and celebration of the "authority" of the Papacy, and the particular mission entrusted to St. Peter by Jesus. The Roman Missal explains, the symbol of the chair, and emphasizes the mission of teacher and pastor of Christ conferred upon Peter, to whom He formed in His person and in St. Peter's successors, a visible foundation of unity of the Church. The chair, literally is a fixed seat of the supreme Pontiff and the Bishops, permanently placed in the Mother Church of the Diocese – Cathedral and is the symbol of the Bishop and his ordinary magisterium in the local church. The Chair of St. Peter indicates his position in the Apostolic College, established by the express will of Jesus, who assigned the task of "feeding" the flock, to lead the People of God, the Church.

We celebrate the feast of the Chair of Saint Peter rejoicing in the guidance and the role of the Holy Spirit, thanking Jesus for the authority he shares with mere humans, and we pray for the person God has chosen to occupy the Chair of Saint Peter at the present time.

On this first Sunday of Lent, we encounter the profound theme of God's covenant with humanity. It's a theme that stretches from the ancient times of Noah to the ministry of Jesus in the Gospel of Mark. This covenant reveals God's unwavering love and His invitation to us to respond with faith and repentance. In the 1st reading from Genesis, God establishes a covenant with Noah and all living creatures, symbolized by the rainbow. This covenant is a promise of God's protection and mercy, even in the face of our human failings. The 2nd reading, from the first letter of Peter, speaks of Christ's suffering and sacrifice. It highlights the transformative power of His redemption, bringing us into a new covenant with God. In the Gospel of Mark, we see Jesus beginning His ministry by proclaiming, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news". God's covenant is a call to a life of faith, repentance, and transformation. It's a call to trust in God's promises, to turn away from sin, and to follow the path of righteousness. As we journey through Lent, let us reflect on the covenant God has made with us and the incredible love He has shown. Pray and Practice: Heavenly Father, we find redemption and hope in the covenant of grace. As we reflect on your boundless love, we're humbled by our imperfections. Today, we answer Your call to repentance. Grant us the strength to turn from our ways and walk in Your light as we strive to live in the beauty of Your covenant. Have a blessed season of Lent Fr. Bose

HELPFUL DEFINITIONS - LENT

FAST: Eating less food than normal (doesn't necessarily mean no food). What you can eat: One normal, full-sized meal, and two smaller meals which if combined would not exceed one full meal.

<u>Why:</u> "Denying material food, which nourishes our body, nurtures an interior disposition to listen to Christ and be fed by His saving word. Through fasting and praying, we allow Him to come and satisfy the deepest hunger that we experience in the depths of our being: the hunger and thirst for God."—Pope Benedict XVI

ABSTINENCE: Do not eat meat. What you can eat: fish and seafood

<u>Why:</u> "Catholic peoples from time immemorial have set apart Friday for special penitential observance by which they gladly suffer with Christ that they may one day be glorified with Him. This is the heart of the tradition of abstinence from meat on Friday where that tradition has been observed in the holy Catholic Church."—USCCB

ALMSGIVING: Material generosity to the less fortunate.

What you can give: money, goods, acts of charity

<u>Why:</u> Almsgiving "represents a specific way to assist those in need and, at the same time, an exercise in self-denial to free us from attachment to worldly goods . . . Almsgiving helps us to overcome this constant temptation, teaching us to respond to our neighbor's needs and to share with others whatever we possess through divine goodness." –Pope Benedict XVI

The season of Lent is a Catholic liturgical season consisting of forty days of fasting, prayer, and penitence beginning at Ash Wednesday and concluding at sundown on Holy Thursday. The official liturgical color for the season of Lent is violet. Ash Wednesday marked the beginning of Lent, the 40 days of preparation for the Easter season when Christians are called to renew their commitments to spiritual practices like prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Lent is an annual opportunity to grow in our faith, which means it's about much more than giving up unhealthy foods or treats, as you may have done when you were a kid. It is about abstaining from whatever is unhealthy in our lives - gossip, laziness, lack of social conscience - and, most importantly, taking concrete steps to do something more. Challenge yourself this year and go beyond the clichés of "giving up" something. Now is a great time to take stock of your spiritual life, and to grow in it. Some things you can do during Lent:

- Make a commitment to reading the Sunday readings before you go to Mass.
- Go to a weekday Mass one day during the week or come for Holy Hour Adoration on Wednesdays
- Read the entire Gospel of Mark in one sitting.
- Read the Works of Mercy as Jesus describes them in Matthew 25.
- Think about a habit that has kept you from being whom God is calling you to be and give it up for Lent.
- Attend the Stations of the Cross.
- Pray for somebody.
- Set aside 30 Minutes a day or more for Praying and/or reading the Bible.
