# FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: LUKE 10:25-37

There was a scholar of the law who stood up to test Jesus and said, "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus said to him, "What is written in the law? How do you read it?" He said in reply,

"You shall love the Lord, your God,

with all your heart,

with all your being,

with all your strength,

and with all your mind,

and your neighbor as yourself."

He replied to him, "You have answered correctly; do this and you will live."

But because he wished to justify himself, he said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man fell victim to robbers as he went down from Jerusalem to Jericho. They stripped and beat him and went off leaving him half-dead. A priest happened to be going down that road, but when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side. Likewise a Levite came to the place, and when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side. But a Samaritan traveler who came upon him was moved with compassion at the sight. He approached the victim, poured oil and wine over his wounds and bandaged them. Then he lifted him up on his own animal, took him to an inn, and cared for him. The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper with the instruction, 'Take care of him. If you spend more than what I have given you, I shall repay you on my way back.' Which of these three, in your opinion, was neighbor to the robbers' victim?" He answered, "The one who treated him with mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

# St. Bonaventure, Bishop and Doctor of the Church - Feast Day is July 15th

"In Bonaventure we meet a unique personality. He was unsurpassed in sanctity, wisdom, eloquence, and gifted with a remarkable skill of accomplishing things, a heart full of love, a winning disposition, benevolent, affable, pious, charitable, rich in virtue, beloved by God and man. . . . The Lord endowed him with such a charming disposition that everyone who saw him was immediately attracted to him." In these words the historian of the Council of Lyons concludes his account on St. Bonaventure.

At an early age he was a celebrated teacher and a powerful preacher. At thirty-six he was called to the highest post among the Franciscans, the Order which honors him as a second founder. He was an important figure at the Council of Lyons. His virtue and wisdom, his versatility and mildness were major factors in attaining the happy result that the Greeks so easily returned to the unity of the Church.

Bonaventure was a subtle scholastic and a profound mystic. Because of the latter he is known as the "Seraphic Teacher." In philosophy he was the principal leader of the Platonic-Augustinian school of Franciscan thought; as such he stood opposed to the Aristotelianism that was making its way into the schools of the time (Thomas of Aquin). Bonaventure's Life of St. Francis was a favorite book of the Middle Ages. When St. Thomas was told about Bonaventure's work, he said: "Let us allow one saint to labor for another." His contemporaries are said to have believed that no one was "more handsome, more holy, or more learned" than he. Excerpted from The Church's Year of Grace, Pius Parsch

#### **Prayer:**

We beg the all-merciful Father through thee, his only-begotten Son made man for our sake, crucified and glorified for us, to send upon us from his treasure-house the Spirit of sevenfold grace, who rested upon thee in all his fullness:

the spirit of wisdom, enabling us to relish the fruit of the tree of life, which is indeed thyself;

the gift of understanding: to enlighten our perceptions;

the gift of prudence, enabling us to follow in thy footsteps;

the gift of strength: to withstand our adversary's onslaught;

the gift of knowledge: to distinguish good from evil by the light of thy holy teaching;

the gift of piety: to clothe ourselves with charity and mercy;

the gift of fear: to withdraw from all ill-doing and live quietly in awe of thy eternal majesty.

These are the things for which we petition. Grant them for the honor of thy holy name, to which, with the Father and the Holy Ghost, be all honor and glory, thanksgiving, renown, and lordship for ever and ever. Amen.



LOVE BRINGS HAPPINESS: In today's reading from Deuteronomy, Moses gives the people of Israel a simple choice: follow God's commandments and live a good, prosperous life, or turn away from God and face hardship. It shows that choosing to live by God's will is not just about following rules but about choosing a life that leads to true happiness and peace. In the second reading St. Paul explains that Jesus is the "image of the invisible God," meaning He shows us exactly what God is like. Jesus is the perfect reflection of who God is and what He wants for humanity. And the Gospel reading about the Parable of the Good Samaritan, teaches us to live out our faith through acts of love and compassion. It goes beyond being kind to those we know, urging us to help anyone in need, even those who are different from us. In a world filled with division, the parable calls for love that breaks down barriers. The Samaritan, who was usually despised, becomes the hero, showing us how to love without limits. "Go and do likewise," means that living with Christ's mercy should be part of our everyday lives, not just isolated acts of kindness. By living this way, we reflect God's love and help transform the world into a place of understanding and care. ## LIGHT OF CHRIST PARISH STEWARDSHIP AWARD:

You are the light of the world.... Your light must shine in the sight of all, so that, seeing your good works, they may give the praise to your father in Heaven. – Matthew 5:14-16 - Congratulations to John Cuba (St. Mary of the Assumption) and Terry Bench (Sacred Heart) for being the honorees for the Diocese of Fort Worth Light of Christ Parish Stewardship award for our Parishes. They will be recognized for living out their baptismal call in an extraordinary way through their stewardship and leadership on Thursday, July 31 at Sacred Heart in Wichita Falls.

#### Our Lady of Mount Carmel - Feast Day July 16th:

Through the efforts of the crusader Berthold, a group of hermits living on Mount Carmel were organized into an Order after the traditional Western type about the year 1150. Oppressed by the Saracens, the monks slowly immigrated to Europe. During the night proceeding the sixteenth of July, 1225, the Blessed Virgin is said to have commanded Pope Honorius III to approve the foundation. Since the Carmelites were still under constant harassment, the sixth General of the Order, St. Simon Stock, pleaded with the Blessed Virgin for some special sign of her protection. On July 16, 1251, she designated the scapular as the special mark of her maternal love. That is why the present feast is also known as the feast of the Scapular. The scapular, as part of the habit, is common to many religious Orders, but it is a special feature of the Carmelites. A smaller form of the scapular is given to lay persons in order that they may share in the great graces associated with it. Such a grace is the "Sabbatine privilege." In the so-called Bulla Sabbatina John XXII affirmed that wearers of the scapular are soon freed from the flames of purgatory, at least by the Saturday after death. The confirmation of the Bulla Sabbatina was promulgated by the Sacred Congregation of Indulgences, July 4, 1908. #### CHRISTIAN INITIATION AND MARRIAGE

Persons married to a divorced person or a person remarried after divorce(s) are required to receive a "decree of invalidity" for former marriage(s) before entering into full communion of the Catholic Church. This process may take more than a year. If a person is presently married to a Catholic, but not according to the proper norms required by the Catholic Church, these norms must first be fulfilled before the initiation sacraments of baptism, confirmation and Eucharist can be received. Marriage already contracted between the couple, though unlawful, is of such great importance to their lives as a couple that the Catholic Church places the highest priority in validating it as soon as possible. By validating their marriage first, the Catholic Church honors the couple so that they are now properly prepared to receive the other sacraments of the Catholic Church. In the meantime, the couple is encouraged to continue worshipping with our faith community each Sunday. However, they are asked to suspend receiving all the sacraments until after their present marriage is validated.

# Memorial of St. Kateri Tekakwitha – July 14 (1656-1680).

Kateri was born in 1656 near the town of Auriesville, New York, the daughter of a Mohawk warrior. She was baptized by Jesuit missionary Fr. Jacques de Lambertville on Easter of 1676 at the age of twenty. She devoted her life to prayer, penitential practices, and the care of the sick and aged in Caughnawaga near Montreal (where her relics are now enshrined). She incurred the hostility of her tribe because of her faith. She was devoted to the Eucharist, and to Jesus Crucified, and was called the "Lily of the Mohawks." She died in 1680 and was beatified June 22, 1980, and canonized on October 21, 2012—the first native American to be declared "Blessed" and "Saint." —Excerpted from Magnificat, 2003 https://www.catholicculture.org/culture/liturgicalyear/calendar/day.cfm? date=2025-07-14
