SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: LUKE 10:38-42

Jesus entered a village where a woman whose name was Martha welcomed him. She had a sister named Mary who sat beside the Lord at his feet listening to him speak. Martha, burdened with much serving, came to him and said, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me by myself to do the serving? Tell her to help me." The Lord said to her in reply, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her."

ADULTS: Which response to God's call is more natural to you—prayer or action? Why?

CHILDREN: In the past week, when have you prayed and when have you done good things for others? Which could you do better?

ST. MARY MAGDALENE – FEAST DAY – JULY 22nd:

The feast of St. Mary Magdalene is considered one of the most mystical of feasts, and it is said that of all the songs of the saints, that of Mary Magdalene is the sweetest and strongest because her love was so great. That love was praised by Jesus Himself who said that because much was forgiven her, she loved much. Where she is buried, no one knows. Legend has her dying in Provence, France, in a cavern where she spent her last days, and her body resting in the chapel of St. Maximin in the Maritime Alps. Another has her buried in Ephesus where she went with St. John after the Resurrection. This latter view is more likely, and St. Willibald, the English pilgrim to the Holy Land in the eighth century, was shown her tomb there.

She was the first recorded witness to the resurrection of Jesus, His most ardent and loving follower. She had stood with Mary at the foot of the Cross on that brutal Good Friday afternoon and had been by the side of Mary during these difficult hours. On Easter morning, she went with the other women to the tomb and it was there, in the garden near the tomb, that Jesus appeared to her. It was she who brought the news of the Resurrection to the Apostles, and Peter and John raced to the tomb to see what had happened.

She was from Magadala, a small fishing town on the Sea of Galilee, between Capernaum and Tiberias. She was known to be a "great sinner," a woman of the streets who heard Jesus speak of the mercy and forgiveness of God and changed her life completely. Her matter-of-fact witness to the Resurrection moved Peter and John to go and see for themselves: "I have seen the Lord and these things he said to me." Jesus had chosen her to bring the news to them and she simply told them what had happened.

She has always been the example of great love and great forgiveness, one of those close to Jesus who grasped the truth of God's love for human beings and spent her life bearing witness to that love.

ST. JAMES, APOSTLE – FEAST DAY - JULY 25th:

In Spain, he is called El Senor Santiago, the patron saint of horsemen and soldiers, and his great shrine at Santiago de Compostela in that country has been a place of pilgrimage for centuries. He is one of those that Jesus called Boanerges, "son of thunder," the brother of John the Evangelist and the son of Zebedee the fisherman from Galilee.

St. James the Greater and his brother John were apparently partners with those other two brothers, Peter and Andrew, and lived in Bethsaida, on the north shore of the Sea of Galilee. How and where James first met Jesus, we do not know; but there is an old legend that makes Salome, his mother, a sister of Mary, and if this were the case, he would have known Jesus from childhood.

Along with Peter and his brother John, James was part of the inner circle of Jesus, who witnessed the Transfiguration, were witnesses to certain of His miracles, like the raising of the daughter of Jairus, and accompanied Him to the Garden of Gethsemani. Like his brother, he was active in the work of evangelization after the death of Jesus, and one legend, very unlikely, even has him going to Spain after Jesus' resurrection.

His prominence and his presence in Jerusalem must have been well known, for scarcely a dozen years after the Resurrection, he became involved in the political maneuverings of the day and was arrested and executed by King Herod Agrippa. This was followed by the arrest of Peter also, so his death must have been part of a purge of Christian leaders by Agrippa, who saw the new Christian movement as a threat to Judaism.

Jesus had foretold this kind of fate when He prophesied that James and his brother John would "drink of the same chalice" of suffering as Himself. The two brothers had asked to be seated at the right of Jesus and at His left in His kingdom, and Jesus told them that they would be with Him in a far different way than they expected.

James's death is the only biblical record we have of the death of one of the Apostles, and he was the first of that chosen band to give his life for his Master. BLESSING OF ENCOUTNER GOD: In the first reading, Abraham welcomes three visitors with kindness and generosity. This small act becomes a way of encountering God. The meeting of these guests was the blessed moment for Abraham and his wife Sarah. They brought God's message to the broken family and filled them with unending hope. In the 2nd reading St. Paul talks about the joy he finds even in his suffering for Christ. He sees himself as a servant of the Gospel, helping others understand the great mystery: "Christ in you, the hope of glory." He encourages us to stay faithful and trust that God is with us, even in hard times. In the Gospel reading, Jesus visits Martha and Mary. Mary chooses to sit and listen to Jesus while Martha is busy serving. Jesus praises Mary, showing us that being with Him and listening to His word is more important than being busy with tasks. He also reminds us that whatever task is chosen, to do it with total commitment and not to complain. Hence, Jesus reminds us to balance our 'being' and "doing' and open our hearts to encounter God in our work and in quiet moments of prayer to receive His blessings in abundance. Pray and Practice: Dear Lord, teach us to be generous. Grant us the heart and mind of yours so that we may be ever faithful and recognize your encounter in every step of our lives. St. Anne & St. Joachim – Feast Day, July 26th

Who does not know about the great shrine of Ste. Anne de Beaupre in Canada, where miracles abound, where cured cripples leave their crutches, and where people come from thousands of miles to pray to the grandmother of Jesus? At one time, July 26 was the feast of St. Anne only, but with the new calendar the two feasts of the parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary have been joined and are celebrated today. Our information about Mary's parents comes from an apocryphal Christian writing, the *Protoevangelium Jacobi* (or *Gospel of James*), written about the year 170. According to this story, Joachim was a prominent and respected man who had no children, and he and his wife, Anne, looked upon this as a punishment from God. In answer to their prayers, Mary was born and was dedicated to God at a very early age. From this early Christian writing have come several of the feast days of Mary, particularly the Immaculate Conception, the Nativity of Mary, and her Assumption into Heaven. Very early also came feast days in honor of SS. Joachim and Anne, and in the Middle Ages numerous churches, chapels, and confraternities were dedicated to St. Anne. The couple early became models of Christian marriage, and their meeting at the Golden Gate in Jerusalem has been a favorite subject of Christian artists. Anne is often shown in paintings with Jesus and Mary and is considered a subject that attracts attention, since Anne is the grandmother of Jesus. Her two great shrines — that of Ste. Anne d'Auray in Britanny, France, and that of Ste. Anne de Beaupre near Quebec in Canada — are very popular. We know little else about the lives of Mary's parents, but considering the person of Mary, they must have been two very remarkable people to have been given such a daughter and to have played so important a part in the work of the Redemption.

There is a church of St. Anne in Jerusalem and it is believed to be built on the site of the home of SS. Joachim and Anne, when they lived in Jerusalem. —Excepted from *The One Year Book of Saints* by Rev. Clifford Stevens https://www.catholicculture.org/culture/liturgicalyear/calendar/day

LITURGICAL NORMS IN ORDINARY TIME

The Sundays in Ordinary Time are most frequently characterized by the use of green vestments to emphasize that we are a pilgrim Church in process of growth. However, on occasion, Ordinary Time is punctuated with the celebration of a special feast on Sunday with the use of white vestments as a sign of special joy for Jesus, Mary or a Saint. Always, we feed upon the Word and Sacrament at each Liturgy. The wisdom of the Hebrew Scriptures, the teachings of the Apostles in the Epistles, and the preaching of the Kingdom of God by Christ in the Gospels are proclaimed to nurture us. Eucharist is the source and summit of our life and nourishment. The use of flowers, song and music complement the liturgy. In Ordinary Time we are always between the major seasons of the Church year. Our Theme throughout all of Ordinary Time is "Thy Kingdom Come!"

MISSIONARIES OF CHRIST THE MEDIATOR

Who we are: our history, mission and charism.



Our religious Institute, Missionaries of Christ the Mediator, was born in the Church because of the urgent need for the proclamation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, specially to those who, being baptized, do not live their faith.

The Community of Missionaries of Christ the Mediator was founded on December 28, 1981, in the garage of the Parish of Ahuacatlán de Jesús, in the state of San Luis Potosí, Mexico, by our Founder, Father Servando G. Nieto.

Our charism is "Living the liturgy and help others to live it", as the font and summit of the Christian life. Living the liturgy in a conscious, active and fruitful way, leads the faithful to a growth in their faith.

Our Community is formed by forty members, 20 of whom are priests and the rest are distributed in the various stages of formation: minor seminary, novitiate, juniorate and the group of brothers who study philosophy and theology.

Our General House is located in Tampico, Tamaulipas, Mexico. Currently our Founder lives there, and the Superior General in turn, and some of the groups in the process of formation.



Our apostolates

The Priestly Order is a gift that the religious Missionary of Christ the Mediator receives from God, for his own sanctification and help to sanctify his brothers through the ministry, developing it in different apostolates:



- As a responsible of the formation in the community itself
- Vocational promotion
- Apostolate in parishes
- Catechesis and Evangelization.
- Accompanying and helping in the formation of couples preparing for marriage.
- Formation of the ecclesial movements, such as: Christian Family Movements, Cursillos Movement, Catechists, Youth Groups.
- Assistance and spiritual care for the sick.
- Attention to formation and spiritual assistance to the

different religious communities that ask us.

- Preaching Retreats and Spiritual Exercises in our retreat house in the Mexican state of Querétaro.

Since six years ago we also have founded a private elementary school to provide Catholic education to young children in poor areas, where violence, crime and drugs are very common.

Our institute community is also present in other parts of Mexico, serving some parishes in different states; a parish in Brownsville TX and three parishes in Italy, where we also have a house for our students of philosophy and theology.

Change: New floor for itemizers

Starting with the 2026 tax year, you will need to give at least 0.5% of your adjusted gross income (AGI) to claim a charitable deduction.

Change: New limit for top earners

Currently, top earners get a 37-cent tax benefit for every dollar deducted. Starting in 2026, that drops to 35 cents.

What it means for you: If you are in the highest tax bracket, consider giving more this year for greater tax savings.

Change: Higher standard deduction made permanent and will be indexed for inflation

For 2025, the deduction will be \$15,750 for single filers and \$31,500 for married couples filing jointly. If you are 65 or older, you may qualify for a bonus deduction of up to \$6,000, although it begins to phase out at higher income levels.

What it means for you: Even if you don't itemize, you may still benefit if you give appreciated stock, real estate or, if you are 70½ or older, from your IRA.

Change: Deduction limit for cash gifts made permanent

What it means for you: You can still deduct cash gifts of up to 60% of your AGI. Consider a blended gift strategy that combines cash and non-cash assets to maximize your tax benefits as well as your impact. Great Year-End Gift Ideas This Year (and Beyond)

Make an Immediate Difference

Important note: If sending by mail, your envelope must be postmarked by the U.S. Postal Service on or before Dec. 31 for your donation to qualify this year.

Use Appreciated Stock

Donating appreciated stock that you have owned for longer than one year allows you to qualify for an income tax deduction and eliminate any tax on the appreciation.

Important note: If the stock is electronically transferred to us, the gift date is the day the stock enters our account, not the date you ask your broker to make the transfer.

Make a Gift From Your IRA

If you are 70½ or older, you can give any amount up to \$108,000 from your IRA directly to the Catholic Diocese of Fort Worth Advancement Foundation. You will not pay income taxes on the transfer. This gift can also count toward your required minimum distributions.

Important note: Your IRA administrator must transfer the funds by Dec. 31. If you have check-writing features on your IRA, your check must clear your account by Dec. 31 to count toward your required minimum distribution for the calendar year.
