NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: LUKE 12:32-48

Jesus said to his disciples: "Do not be afraid any longer, little flock, for your Father is pleased to give you the kingdom. Sell your belongings and give alms. Provide money bags for yourselves that do not wear out, an inexhaustible treasure in heaven that no thief can reach nor moth destroy. For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be.

"Gird your loins and light your lamps and be like servants who await their master's return from a wedding, ready to open immediately when he comes and knocks. Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival. Amen, I say to you, he will gird himself, have them recline at table, and proceed to wait on them. And should he come in the second or third watch and find them prepared in this way, blessed are those servants. Be sure of this: if the master of the house had known the hour when the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."

Then Peter said, "Lord, is this parable meant for us or for everyone?" And the Lord replied, "Who, then, is the faithful and prudent steward whom the master will put in charge of his servants to distribute the food allowance at the proper time? Blessed is that servant whom his master on arrival finds doing so. Truly, I say to you, the master will put the servant in charge of all his property. But if that servant says to himself, 'My master is delayed in coming,' and begins to beat the menservants and the maidservants, to eat and drink and get drunk, then that servant's master will come on an unexpected day and at an unknown hour and will punish the servant severely and assign him a place with the unfaithful. That servant who knew his master's will but did not make preparations nor act in accord with his will shall be beaten severely; and the servant who was ignorant of his master's will but acted in a way deserving of a severe beating shall be beaten only lightly. Much will be required of the person entrusted with much, and still more will be demanded of the person entrusted with more."

August 15, Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary, Holy Day of Obligation



The Feast of the Assumption is one of the most important feasts of our Lady. We Roman Catholics believe in the Assumption of the Virgin Mary into heaven. We believe when her earthly life was finished, Mary was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, where the Lord exalts her as Queen of Heaven. (Catechism of the Catholic Church, # 966). The Assumption is the feast of Mary's total liberation from death and decay, the consequences of original sin. It is also the remembrance of the day when the Church gave official recognition to the centuries-old belief of Christians about the Assumption of their heavenly mother. In the Orthodox church, the koimesis, or dormitio ("falling asleep"), of the Virgin began to be commemorated on August 15 in the 6th

century. The observance gradually spread to the West, where it became known as the feast of the Assumption. By the 13th century, the belief had been accepted by most Catholic theologians, and it was a popular subject with Renaissance and baroque painters. It was on November 1, 1950, that, through the Apostolic Constitution Munificentimus Deus, Pope Pius XII officially declared the Assumption as a dogma of Catholic faith. On this important feast day, we have to answer two questions: 1) What is meant by "Assumption?" 2) Why do we believe in Mary's Assumption into heaven despite the fact that there is no reference to it in the Bible? "Assumption" means that after her death, Mary was taken into heaven, both body and soul, as a reward for her sacrificial cooperation in the divine plan of salvation. "On this feast day, let us thank the Lord for the gift of the Mother, and let us pray to Mary to help us find the right path every day" (Pope Benedict XVI).

The feast days of the Church are not just the commemoration of historical events; they do not look only to the past. They look to the present and to the future and give us an insight into our own relationship with God. The Assumption looks to eternity and gives us hope that we, too, will follow Our Lady when our life is ended.

Memorial of St. Clare of Assisi (1194-1253) is celebrated August 11th. Clare was the first woman to practice the life of entire poverty as taught by St. Francis. Placed by him at the head of a few companions in the small convent of San Damiano, she governed her community for forty-two years thus founding at the gates of Assisi the Order of Poor Clares. Their Rule included austerities hitherto unknown in monasteries of women. They went barefoot, slept on the ground, kept perpetual abstinence and made poverty the basis of their lives. St. Clare died on August 11, 1253, and was canonized two years after her death.--https://www.catholicculture.org/culture/liturgicalyear/calendar/day.cfm?date=2025-08-11

HAVE FAITH IN GOD AND BE WATCHFUL: On this 19th Sunday in ordinary time, the first reading, from the Book of Wisdom, refers to the night of the Passover, recalling God's promises and oaths to deliver the righteous and destroy their enemies. It serves as a reminder and a call for everyone to walk in the path of righteousness. In the 2nd reading, Abraham and Sarah are presented as exemplars of faith. They responded to God's call with prompt obedience, despite not knowing what lay ahead. Abraham left his homeland and the security it offered, solely trusting in God's promise. Likewise, Sarah, though advanced in age and barren, conceived Isaac because she believed in God's faithfulness. Their story teaches us that faith in God makes everything possible even if it seems humanly unachievable. Today's Gospel also invites us to trust in God, remain detached from material possessions, and be ever-prepared for the coming of the 'Son of Man'. Jesus urges us to work for heavenly treasures through our good deeds, charity, forgiveness, faith, mercy etc. that neither perish nor can be stolen. While we work for the treasures of heaven we also need to be ready and vigilant to welcome the Lord at any moment. Those whom the Master finds watchful will be blessed and rewarded, while the unfaithful servant will face punishment. With greater blessings, knowledge, and responsibilities comes greater accountability. Pray and Practice: Lord, deepen our faith, keep us ever watchful, and instill in us a longing for the treasures of heaven. Have a great week Fr. Bose
