



SACRAMENT of BAPTISM:

ADULT BAPTISM: Adults who desire to become Catholic will participate in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

INFANT BAPTISM (under the age of 7 years old): We celebrate Infant Baptism on the 2nd Saturday of each month. Parents of infants to be baptized are to attend Baptismal classes, preferably before the child is born. Godparents are encouraged to attend but are not required.

SACRAMENT of CONFIRMATION:

Adults and older youth who have not been Confirmed should contact the parish office.

SACRAMENT of MARRIAGE

Couples who are considering marriage are to contact the parish office, at least six (6) months (preferably earlier) before the couple's projected wedding date.

SACRAMENT of ANOINTING of the SICK:

Any Catholic who is to have surgery due to a serious illness OR whose health is seriously impaired due to a serious illness or old age should be anointed ASAP, preferably before going to the hospital. Contact ASAP a priest to schedule an anointing.

SIGNIFICANCE of BOWING

A bow signifies reverence & honor shown to the names or event being mentioned. We are to do the following: 1) A **bow** of the head is made when the three Divine Persons (the Trinity) are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated.

2) A bow of the body (a profound bow) is made during the Creed with the words "and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man." —General Instruction to the Roman Missal, #275

January 8, 2023

Last week, I taught on the central truth of the Catholic faith: the real presence of Jesus in Holy Communion—what appears to be bread & wine have been transformed into the body and blood, soul and divinity of Christ (the doctrine of transubstantiation) & how one receives the <u>full</u> Christ in either the consecrated Host <u>or</u> the Chalice alone (doctrine of Concomitance). Christ can never be separated & one receives the full graces of the Eucharist under the Host <u>or</u> the Chalice alone. This weekend the <u>option</u> to receive from the Chalice begins. It is important to review some of the basics of church etiquette & receiving Holy Communion.

- 1) All people are welcome to worship here at Mass. The Order of the Mass is listed in the hymnal, #166-#187 (for a quick reference, the Gloria & Creed are on the inside front cover of the hymnal). In order to receive Holy Communion, you are to be a Catholic. It is not only believing in what the Catholic Church teaches on the Eucharist (the doctrine of transubstantiation), but you are to believe in the rest of the teachings / doctrines of the Catholic Church. If you are not a Catholic but believe in the Eucharist, then you should investigate becoming a Catholic through RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults).
- 2) To receive Holy Communion, a Catholic is to be in a state of grace. If you, as a Catholic, are aware that you are in a state of grave / mortal sin, you are to go to confession first (Canon 916; cf. 1 Cor. 11:27-29). Once you have received the priest's absolution in confession, you can receive Holy Communion, even if you have not had time to complete the penance given by the priest in confession. But you are to complete your penance ASAP.
- 3) Before leaving home, does your clothing attire reflect the worthiness of receiving Jesus' Real Presence? Or have you become too casual in what you wear?
- 4) You are to abstain at least one hour before Holy Communion from any food & drink, except for water & medicine (Canon 919). Gum chewing in church is inappropriate.
- 5) Arrive early to Mass so as to prepare yourself in prayer, by reading the scriptures (# in hymnal listed in the bulletin on p. 4). If you arrive late once the Scriptures have begun, wait to be seated during the *sung* Gospel Acclamation after the 2nd reading & prior to the Gospel. This is out of the respect for the Word & others listening to the Word. The same is true if your child becomes a distraction during Mass. Take your child to the cry room or narthex when necessary.
 - 6) Participate as fully as possible during Mass.
- 7) Are you "joyful" when you receive Jesus Himself in Holy Communion? Or are you just going through the motions or just look bored? Even if you are experiencing hardships in life, you can receive with reverence, appreciation & joy Jesus, the food of life.

- 8) When approaching the Host or Chalice distributor, you are first to make a sign of reverence <u>normally</u> by *bowing* toward Jesus in Holy Communion. If you genuflect, be careful that person behind you is not "surprised" & possibly stumbles by your genuflection. The <u>norm</u> in the U.S. is to receive Holy Communion standing, though one may kneel if you so choose (Roman Missal #160).
- 9) You are to respond clearly & audibly "Amen" when the distributor states "The Body or Blood of Christ."
- 10) The person who receives the consecrated Host may choose to receive on the tongue or in the hand. Make your choice obvious to the distributor (with no mixed signs).
- —If receiving on the tongue, your tongue is fully extended over your bottom lip (with your hands folded).
- —If Communion is received in the hand, the hands should first of all be clean & extended outward & upward. If one is right handed, the left hand should rest upon the right. The Host will then be laid in the palm of the left hand & then taken by the right hand to the mouth. If one is left-handed, this is reversed. This forms a "throne" to receive the Real Presence of Christ—cf. p. 4.
- —Step immediately to the side a very short distance & consume the Host immediately (whether in the hand or the tongue). It is not appropriate to reach out with the fingers & take the Host from the distributor. It is the act of *receiving* Communion, not taking it from the distributor. Never walk away with the Host in your hand. You are to consume the Host *immediately* upon reception next to the distributor.
- —If the Host accidently falls to the floor, pick it up & consume it. Or allow the distributor to pick it up.
- —If your hands are impeded by holding a child, a cane, crutches, etc., then it might be best to receive on the tongue.
- —It is your own piety if you make the sign of the cross after receiving the Host or from the Chalice. It is not required to do so.
- 11) It is your decision alone to receive from the Chalice or not. Make a sign of reverence, normally by bowing, when approaching the Chalice. Say "Amen" when you hear "The Blood of Christ." Gently take the Chalice & take a small sip. Gently return the Chalice to the distributor.
- —If you have a cold or are not feeling well, you are encouraged not to receive from the Chalice.
- 12) When you have returned to your pew, say a prayer of thanksgiving for receiving Christ. You are also encouraged to join in with singing. Depending on your ability to kneel, you may kneel or be seated. It is each person's decision on how long to kneel. Some choose to kneel until the Blessed Sacrament is placed in the tabernacle.
- 12) You are to stay for the final blessing of the Mass and ideally until the closing hymn has finished. Some like to say a prayer after the Mass.

Let us always reverence the celebration of the Mass!

Throne of your hand
St. Cyril of Jerusalem in the 4th century offered a beautiful & powerful catechesis on the mode of receiving Holy Communion in the hand that is still applicable today: "When you approach, do not go stretching out your open hands or having your fingers spread out, but make the left hand into a throne for the right which shall receive the King, and then cup your open hand and the Body of Christ, reciting the 'Amen.' Then sanctify with all care your eyes by touching the Sacred Body, and receive it. But be careful that no particles fall, for what you lose would be to you as if you had lost some of your members. Tell me, if anybody had given you gold dust, would you not hold fast to it with all care, and watch lest some of it fall and be lost to you? Must you not then be even more careful with that which is more precious than gold and diamonds, so that no particles are lost?"

How to Bless Your Home on Epiphany

- Let this be a family prayer event. Gather all who live in your home together (and invite others if you so desire).
- Make the sign of the cross.
- Gracious God, as a shining star once guided the magi to the birthplace of the child Jesus, so enable those who dwell here and all who visit to be your light in the world. We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."
- Read Colossians 3:12-17
- Using chalk, mark the current year and the initials of the Magi above the outside, horizontal frame of the doorway to your home. Place a cross in between each of the letters. Wetting the chalk will make it easier to write with. It should look something like this: 20 # C # M # B # 23
- After completing the markings, pray the *Our Father, Hail Mary, Glory Be* & the following prayer:

May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find that Christ lives here. May we seek & serve, in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is Lord of all people forever & ever. Amen.

- Conclude by making the sign of the cross and praying:

May God bless us and keep us. May his face shine upon us and be gracious to us. May God look upon us kindly and give us peace (Numbers 6:24-26). Amen.

Why do this? Christians have found that this is one way to witness to their faith in Jesus Christ. The crosses indicate that your house is a Christian home. The initials C-M-B represent the legendary names of the Magi: Caspar, Melchior & Balthasar. The C-M-B also stands for the Latin words Christus Mansionem Benedicat which translates: "May Christ bless this dwelling place." When visitors ask about the markings above your door, you can explain the above to them & so you will be giving a witness to Christ. The markings are left all year & then renewed on the next Epiphany.
