



SACRAMENT of BAPTISM:

ADULT BAPTISM: Adults who desire to become Catholic will participate in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

INFANT BAPTISM (under the age of 7 years old): We celebrate Infant Baptism on the 2nd Saturday of each month. Parents of infants to be baptized are to attend Baptismal classes, preferably before the child is born. Godparents are encouraged to attend but are not required.

SACRAMENT of CONFIRMATION:

Adults and older youth who have not been Confirmed should contact the parish office.

SACRAMENT of MARRIAGE

Couples who are considering marriage are to contact the parish office, at least six (6) months (preferably earlier) before the couple's projected wedding date.

SACRAMENT of ANOINTING of the SICK:

Any Catholic who is to have surgery due to a serious illness OR whose health is seriously impaired due to a serious illness or old age should be anointed ASAP, preferably before going to the hospital. Contact ASAP a priest to schedule an anointing.

SIGNIFICANCE of BOWING

A bow signifies reverence & honor shown to the names or event being mentioned. We are to do the following:

1) A **bow** of the head is made when the three Divine Persons (the Trinity) are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated.

2) A bow of the body (a profound bow) is made during the Creed with the words "and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man."

Dear Friends in Christ,

We begin a new liturgical year this weekend with the 1st Sunday of Advent, wearing purple vestments, except rose vestments on the 3rd Sunday. Advent (from the Latin word "*ad-venire*" meaning "to come to") is the season encompassing the 4 Sundays & weekdays leading up to the celebration of Christmas.

This year is unique with Christmas Day occurring on a Monday. That makes it more of challenge since the 4th Sunday of Advent is celebrated in the morning of Sunday, Dec. 24th. But that same Sunday in the evening, we celebrate Christmas Eve. As a result, there are no weekdays for the 4th Week of Advent. Yes, the Church expects us to attend the Mass both on the 4th Sunday of Advent and Christmas. The Advent season is a hopeful time of preparation that directs our hearts & minds to Christ, reminding us of His birth on Christmas but also challenging us to prepare for His 2nd coming at the end of time. The final days of Advent, from Dec. 17-24, focus particularly on our preparation for the celebrations of the Nativity of our Lord (Christmas). To help you to meditate & reflect during the Advent Season, there are different online reflection opportunities listed on p. 8.

Since we are beginning a new liturgical church year, we begin a new cycle or year of Sunday scriptural readings (Year B) focusing on the Gospel of Mark & chapter 6 of the Gospel of John. There are 3 cycles / years of Sunday readings: A, B & C.

We just finished Year A readings that focused on the Gospel of Matthew. In Year C, we read the Gospel of Luke. In all 3 years, the Gospel of John is read in the Easter Season (Easter Sunday through Pentecost). The 1st reading, usually from the Old Testament (except in the Easter Season from Acts of the Apostles) reflects important themes from the Gospel reading. The 2nd reading is usually from one of the epistles, a letter written to an early church community. These letters are read semicontinuously. Each Sunday, we pick up close to where we left off the Sunday before, though some passages are never read.

The weekday cycle of readings is divided into 2 years, Year I & Year II. Year I is read in odd-numbered years (2025, 2027, etc.) and Year II is used in even-numbered years (2024, 2026, etc.) With Advent, we begin Year II readings. The Gospels for both years are the same. During the year, the Gospels are read semi-continuously, be-

ginning with Mark, then moving on to Matthew and Luke. The Gospel of John is read during the Easter season. For Advent, Christmas, and Lent, readings are chosen that are appropriate to the season. The first reading on weekdays may be taken from the Old or the New Testament. Typically, a single book is read semi-continuously (i.e., some passages are not read) until it is finished and then a new book is started.

See the Christmas Mass schedule on p. 10. Since Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday evening, the Sunday 12 Noon Mass on Dec. 24th has been cancelled for that one Sunday due to the number of Masses on one day and the challenge to find so many people to read, distribute Holy Communion, usher, sing in the choir, etc. An out of town priest will celebrate 2 of the Masses that day. I will celebrate the other 3 Masses.

Also on p. 10, I have posted an expanded confession times during Advent. Please take advantage of the additional times. Remember this Friday, Dec. 8th is the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mass, a holy day of obligation. I am offering a Thursday (Dec. 7th) 7 pm Vigil Mass and a Friday (Dec. 8th) 8:30 am & 7 pm Mass with confessions around those 3 Mass times. I am trying to make confessions accessible & easy for you. See p. 5 for the Immaculate Conception schedule.

There are 3 important events occurring this month that helps others. One is Share Your Blessings, working in partnership with Catholic Charities. Please take a gift tag off one of the 3 Christmas trees (2 in the narthex/entrance & 1 in the transept near the chapel). Buy a gift for the person listed, bring that <u>unwrapped</u> present with the gift tag taped to it by no later Dec. 10th. See p. 6 for more info.

Our second event is the Christmas Joy of Sharing 2023. We will prepare & serve meals to over 1,200 people at 11 different Houston area shelters on Christmas Day. See p. 8 on different ways to volunteer, make donations, etc.

The third event is called Clean out your Closet with collection of such clothing occurring on Dec. 30/31 & Jan. 6/7. Jan. 7 is the Solemnity of Epiphany which in some cultures is gift sharing. This clothing drive will be supported by Kolbe House & our parish men's ministries: That Man is You!, Fishers of Men & Knights of Columbus. Collected items will be distributed by Kolbe House, with help from the men of St Max. We would again advertise specifically for MEN'S jeans, coats, shoes, hoodies, sweatshirts, socks, hats, gloves, blankets, as the vast majority of downtown homeless are men, but we'll accept clothing for women & children too. Anything not distributed will be given to Cypress Assistance Ministries (CAM).

Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 22: The Harmony of the Gospels By Fr. Luke Spannagel: Step-by-Step through the Mass

Is anyone else still thinking about having four different Gospels? This question was discussed and pondered by some of the earliest Christians. Some tried to develop a harmonious account of the life, death, and teachings of Jesus, and the result was a kind of one-volume gospel. Although we don't

have any historical manuscripts of it, a one-volume harmonization called "The Gospel" is referred to by some early Christian writers, including St. Ignatius of Antioch (writing around 115 AD). There is a manuscript dated 170 AD by a man named Tatian, who was a student of St. Justin Martyr. This manuscript is called the Diatessaron and is subtitled "The Gospel Harmony." Others tried this as well through the ages, including St. Augustine (writing in 405 AD) who wrote a work titled "On the Harmony of the Evangelists."

Uniquely Harmonious Remarkably, what each person found was that the 4 Gospels could not be squeezed into one without losing something important. As we have reviewed previously, every detail of each of the Gospels is written for a specific purpose. To miss one of these details is to miss an important part of the life of Jesus and his message of salvation to the world. Each of the 4 Gospel writers gives us a special understanding of Jesus, something we would miss if we forced them into just one Gospel. As the early Church moved forward toward the finalizing of the Canon of Scripture (the official list of the books included in the Bible), we see that the 4 Gospels are consistently included & honored.

The Canon of Scripture The Canon of the Bible is the official list of texts discerned and compiled by the Roman Catholic Church over time and confirmed by Church Councils, first completed around the time of the Council of Hippo in 390 AD. This list was reiterated by the Council of Trent in the 1500s and again at the First Vatican Council in the 1800s. We believe that certain



books are inspired by the Holy Spirit and therefore are included in the canon. No known inspired book is outside the canon and no non-inspired book is inside it. Since the Church is entrusted with Sacred Scripture, the Church declares what is included in the canon. A couple of other definitions are helpful here:

Inspiration: The Holy Spirit was present and inspired the human writers of the Bible so what God intended—and only those things—were not only understood correctly, but following from this understanding, the Gospel writers wrote them down, expressed in appropriate and meaningful language. (See *Providentissimus Deus*, 1, 4, and 14).

Inerrancy: The Bible is free from errors, not just in faith and morals, but in all parts that pertain to and which God wished to teach for our salvation. (See *Dei Verbum*, 6 and 11).

These definitions help us know with confidence that what we are reading is God's Word to us, & they can also help us understand what we read. We come to see the unity of all of Scripture & that all the books are important. We read through the lens of our lived faith and tradition. We value how Scripture has been understood and prayed with over the last 2000 years. We recognize that the Church Fathers and saints have much to tell us about Scripture and how it helps us live life in Christ today.



A Synopsis of the Gospels An interesting alternative to the idea of a Gospel harmony is called a Synopsis of the Gospels. A synopsis keeps all four Gospels intact as they were written and arranges the passages in four columns so that all four Gospels are side-by-side. The passages are arranged and spaced out so that one can compare the details of each Gospel account. Doing this really helps one see how each of the four writers gives a special flavor to the life and ministry of Jesus. A synopsis is like having each of

the Gospel writers with us, sitting in his own armchair, telling us about Jesus.

For Reflection

- 1. What are some of your favorite Gospel passages? Do you know which Gospel(s) feature these passages? Take some time to find some of your "favorites" and develop your relationship with particular Gospel authors.
- 2. Our Catholic liturgies and traditions celebrating the birth of Jesus and his Passion, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension draw from different Gospel accounts. Choose either <u>Matthew 1-2</u> and <u>Luke 1-2</u> or the Passion narratives in the four Gospels for deeper study to see how each Gospel contributes to our understanding of these events in our salvation.





About Advent Wreaths

Traditionally, Advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which 4 candles are inserted, representing the 4 weeks of Advent. Ideally, 3 candles are purple & one is rose, but white candles can also be used.

The purple candles in particular symbolize the prayer, penance & preparatory sacrifices & goods works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the 3rd Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over & are close to Christmas.

The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation & hope surrounding our Lord's 1st coming into the world & the anticipation of his 2nd coming to judge the living and the dead.

For a blessing of the Advent wreath in the home, it is appropriate for a parent or another member of the family to lead it. For such a blessing, go to:

The 1st Advent candle symbolizes "HOPE" and is called the "Prophet's Candle". The prophets of the Old Testament, especially Isaiah, waited in hope for the Messiah's arrival.


