



SACRAMENT of BAPTISM:

ADULT BAPTISM: Adults who desire to become Catholic will participate in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

INFANT BAPTISM (under the age of 7 years old): We celebrate Infant Baptism on the 2nd Saturday of each month. Parents of infants to be baptized are to attend Baptismal classes, preferably before the child is born. Godparents are encouraged to attend but are not required.

SACRAMENT of CONFIRMATION:

Adults and older youth who have not been Confirmed should contact the parish office.

SACRAMENT of MARRIAGE

Couples who are considering marriage are to contact the parish office, at least six (6) months (preferably earlier) before the couple's projected wedding date.

SACRAMENT of ANOINTING of the SICK:


Any Catholic who is to have surgery due to a serious illness OR whose health is seriously impaired due to a serious illness or old age should be anointed ASAP, preferably before going to the hospital. Contact ASAP a priest to schedule an anointing.

SIGNIFICANCE of BOWING

A bow signifies reverence & honor shown to the names or event being mentioned. We are to do the following:

1) A **bow** of the head is made when the three Divine Persons (the Trinity) are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated.

2) A bow of the body (a profound bow) is made during the Creed with the words "and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man."

Dear Friends in Christ,

This is a very busy week. Ash Wednesday begins this Wednesday with 5 opportunities to receive ashes: 2 Masses (8:30 am & 7 pm) & 3 Liturgy of the Word services (7 am, 12 Noon & 5:30 pm; no Holy Communion). Ample confession times are available on Ash Wednesday & during the entire Season of Lent. See p. 8 for the schedule for confessions, stations of the cross, Friday fish dinners, etc. I will be available for confessions every Friday evening of Lent for at least one hour, except this very 1st Friday of Lent, Feb. 16th since I have confessions at the Women' ACTS retreat this Friday. See pp. 6-7 for different Lenten resources to help you to enrich your Lenten spiritual experiences.

Please mark your calendar to attend the Parish Lenten Mission. Sr. Lisa Valentini will be the presenter. Many of you will remember her from a few months ago when she gave a Mission appeal, and so many people were pleased with her talk (see p. 8 for her picture). The theme is "A Time to Remember that God loves you...God LOVES you...God REALLY loves you!" It is a simple message that so many people struggle to really believe. Sr. Lisa will speak at all the weekend Masses on Feb. 24th-25th. On Monday, Feb. 26th thru Wednesday, Feb. 28th, Sr. Lisa will speak about 30 minutes after the 8:30 am Mass each day (I am adding an 8:30 am Mass on that Tuesday). Sr. Lisa will speak for up to an hour at 7 pm on those 3 days. Her talk in the mornings will be different than the talk in the evenings.

"Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting & almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday & ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. Since Sundays are considered 'mini-Easters' and thus are excluded from the count, the season lasts 40 days. The 40 days of Lent is rooted in the biblical usage of the number forty. Forty is typically indicative of a time of testing, trial, penance, purification & renewal, such as 40 years in the desert. In the New Testament, 40 days is the length of Jesus' time of trial in the desert in preparation for his public ministry, proclaiming the Gospel."

Remember Ash Wednesday is a day of fast & abstinence. See p. 8 for the requirement for fast & abstinence. "Many know of the tradition of abstaining from meat on Fridays during Lent, but we are also called to practice self-discipline & fast in other ways throughout the season. Contemplate the meaning & origins of the Lenten fasting tradition. In addition, the giving of alms is one way to share God's gifts—not only through the distribution of money,

but through the sharing of our time & talents. As St. John Chrysostom reminds us: 'Not to enable the poor to share in our goods is to steal from them and deprive them of life. The goods we possess are not ours, but theirs.' (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2446)."

I challenge you during this entire Season of Lent to remember the poor in your prayers. I encourage you to bring some food items (at a minimum one item, if not more) <u>every weekend</u> to help us to replenish our food pantry. Please leave these food items (no outdated items) near the exit door of the church.

Today, Sunday, Feb. 11th, is known as World Day of the Sick, instituted by Pope St. John Paul II. Please pray the Prayer for the Sick & Prayer for the Caregiver on p. 7. Also this Sunday, Feb. 11th, is known as World Marriage Day. Please pray the Prayer for Married Couple on p. 6. Also, I encourage all married couples to enter into a One Week Retreat for Married Couples, by doing a reflection each day for 7 days. Anyone who is married will admit that a good marriage involves a lot of hard work & much communication & forgiveness, much prayer & graces. While we affirm those who are married, let us pray also for those marriages that are struggling, fractured & broken, and for spouses who lost a spouse through death.

Thank you to the Catholic Daughters who coordinated the Eucharistic Miracles of the World. Plenty of people came over to learn. TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading: The Lord directed Moses & Aaron on handling potential leprosy, requiring priestly examination &, if confirmed, declaring the person unclean. Afflicted individuals had to signify their condition by their appearance, vocalize their unclean status, & live in isolation, highlighting the seriousness with which leprosy was treated. (Lv 13: 1-2, 44-46)

Psalm: In confessing my sins, the Lord forgave me, turning my distress into the joy of salvation. Let the righteous find joy & refuge in Him, celebrating His mercy. (Ps 32)

Second Reading: In everything, even in eating & drinking, aim to honor God. Avoid causing offense, seeking the good of many for salvation. Follow my example, as I follow Christ's. (1 Cor 10:31011:1)

Gospel: A leper's plea for healing was met with Jesus' compassionate touch & affirmation, leading to immediate cleansing. Despite Jesus' directive for discretion & adherence to Mosaic law for verification, the healed man publicized his miracle, complicating Jesus' public ministry & drawing even larger crowds to seek him in solitude. (Mk 1:40-45)

Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 32: The Parts of the Liturgy of the Eucharist By Fr. Luke Spannagel: Step-by-Step through the Mass

As we continue our journey through the Mass, we come to the **Liturgy of the Eucharist**. Growing up as an altar server, the preparation for the Liturgy of the Eucharist was always one of the most action-packed moments of the Mass. There are several things to bring to the altar and an order to how they should arrive. As we have noted, every part of the Mass has a background and a significant meaning,

even some of the quick (and sometimes quiet) gestures in this part of the Mass. There are special cloths, shiny chalices, candles, bread, wine, and water, among many other things. All of them will serve a purpose, and with the words of Christ, the bread and wine will become Christ himself—his true Body and Blood—his true presence with us!

What is the Liturgy of the Eucharist?

As the *General Instruction for the Roman Missal* teaches, "At the Last Supper Christ instituted the Paschal Sacrifice and banquet, by which the Sacrifice of the Cross is continuously made present in the Church whenever the Priest, representing Christ the Lord, carries out what the Lord himself did

and handed over to his disciples to be done in his memory. For Christ took the bread and the chalice and gave thanks, broke the bread and gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Take, eat, and drink: this is my Body; this is the chalice of my Blood. Do this in memory of me.' Hence, the Church has arranged the entire celebration of the Liturgy of the Eucharist in parts corresponding to precisely these words and actions of Christ, namely:

At the Preparation of the Gifts, the bread and the wine with water are brought to the altar—the same elements, that is to say, which Christ took into his hands.

In the Eucharistic Prayer, thanks is given to God for the whole work of salvation, and the offerings become the Body and Blood of Christ.

Through the fraction and through Communion, the faithful, though many, receive from the one bread the Lord's Body and from the one chalice the Lord's Blood in the same way the Apostles received them from the hands of Christ himself" (GIRM, 72).

The Parts of the Liturgy of the Eucharist

For an in-depth summary of the parts of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, we turn to the *Catholic Encyclopedia*:

"The Liturgy of the Eucharist, the essential part of the sacrifice, includes: the preparation of the altar;

the preparation of the gifts: bread, wine, and water are brought to the altar ([and in many places] the money offerings or offerings for the poor), [typically] the offertory song is sung during this preparation; the priest washes his hands; an invitation to prayer is prayed by the priest. There follows the Eucharistic prayer, which is a prayer of thanksgiving and sanctification and the center of the Eucharistic celebration. It contains: the preface, expressing thanksgiving in the name of the entire people of God; the acclamation or sanctus (holy, holy), which is recited by the priest and people or sung, the Eucharistic prayer; the invocations for the Church, the epiclesis; narration of the institution and consecration of the bread and wine in the words of Christ; the fulfillment of the command given by Christ to the Church to carry on this mystery of the sacrifice, called the anamnesis; the offering of the victim to God the Father in the Holy Spirit; the intercessions for the living and the dead and for the faithful present; the final doxology, and concluding Amen" (Catholic Encyclopedia, Thomas Nelson Inc., Nashville, 1976, p. 197).

Now that is a table of contents! Although this listing may seem complex, we'll be taking each section one at a time, breaking it down so we can understand the importance of each part in the Mass and its importance for us. As we journey through the parts of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, remind yourself that these pieces all serve a grand purpose: our pathway to the true presence of Christ on the altar at Mass!

For Reflection:

1. As Father Luke leads us into deeper appreciation for each part of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, consider beginning this journey by reflecting on each of the New Testament accounts of the institution of the Eucharist: 1 Cor. 11:24, Mt. 26:26–30, Lk 22:24–30, Jn 13:1–15, Mk 14:22–26. You could reflect on one passage each day during the week in preparation for participation at Mass on Sunday.




2. As you fulfill the obligations of your state in life each day, bring to the altar of your heart a reflection on all the words, materials, and actions that form your daily work and prayer. Bring your own experience of preparing and executing work and your intentionality around it to our deepening understanding of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, and allow Father Luke's insights to inform your attitude towards your daily tasks.

World Day of the Sick: Sunday, Feb. 11th

February 11 is World Day of the Sick, an observation introduced by Pope St. John Paul II as a way for believers to offer prayers for those suffering from illnesses.

"Let us remember this central truth in life: we came into the world because someone welcomed us; we were made for love; and we are called to communion & fraternity."

"To those of you who experience illness, whether temporary or chronic, I would say this: Do not be ashamed of your longing for closeness and tenderness! Do not conceal it, and never think that you are a burden on others. The condition of the sick urges all of us to step back from the hectic pace of our lives in order to rediscover ourselves."

Ash Wednesday & Good Friday are days of fast & abstinence (Canon 1251).

Fasting binds all persons who have completed their 18th birthday through those who have completed their 59th year, unless prevented by poor health. On days of fast, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's own needs. Eating between meals is not allowed although fluids may be taken. (Canon 1252)

Abstinence binds all persons who have completed their 14th birthday, unless prevented by poor health. (There is no upper age cut off for abstinence as there is for fasting.) On days of abstinence during Lent (Ash Wednesday & Fridays), the consumption of meat of mammals or fowl is not allowed. The Church strongly encourages the observance of Friday abstinence throughout the year, but failure to do so is not regarded as sinful. (Canon 1252)

Penitential Days: The divine law binds all the Christian faithful to do penance each in his or her own way. In order for all to be united among themselves by some common observance of penance, however, penitential days are prescribed on which the Christian faithful devote themselves in a special way to prayer, perform works of piety and charity, and deny themselves by fulfilling their own obligations more faithfully and especially by observing fast and abstinence, ... (Canon 1249). The penitential days and times in the universal Church are every Friday of the whole year & the season of Lent (Canon 1250).



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
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
