



SACRAMENT of BAPTISM:

ADULT BAPTISM: Adults who desire to become Catholic will participate in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

INFANT BAPTISM (under the age of 7 years old): We celebrate Infant Baptism on the 2nd Saturday of each month. Parents of infants to be baptized are to attend Baptismal classes, preferably before the child is born. Godparents are encouraged to attend but are not required.

SACRAMENT of CONFIRMATION:

Adults and older youth who have not been Confirmed should contact the parish office.

SACRAMENT of MARRIAGE

Couples who are considering marriage are to contact the parish office, at least six (6) months (preferably earlier) before the couple's projected wedding date.

SACRAMENT of ANOINTING of the SICK:

Any Catholic who is to have surgery due to a serious illness OR whose health is seriously impaired due to a serious illness or old age should be anointed ASAP, preferably before going to the hospital. Contact ASAP a priest to schedule an anointing.

SIGNIFICANCE of BOWING

A bow signifies reverence & honor shown to the names or event being mentioned. We are to do the following:

1) A **bow** of the head is made when the three Divine Persons (the Trinity) are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated.

2) A bow of the body (a profound bow) is made during the Creed with the words "and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man."

Dear Friends in Christ,

We are celebrating the First Sunday of Lent. "The word Lent comes from an old English word meaning "spring," or "a new birth." This time of year helps us to renew our lives as Catholics & renew our life in Jesus, his Church, & his Father. These 40 days allow us to journey with Jesus through his passion & death leading us to rejoice in his resurrection. This is the reality of the Paschal Mystery, the essence of our sacramental life in the Church."

"In order to be fully immersed in the Lenten experience, the Church gives us 3 ways or pillars to draw closer into this mystery: **Prayer**, **Fasting & Almsgiving**." "These 3 pillars lead us to the heart of what Lent is about - a deeper conversion."


"Prayer is conversation with God. It is essential for fasting & almsgiving because prayer gives us the strength to fast. Pope Francis said, "Lent is a privileged time for prayer." In prayer, we draw closer in relationship with God. Relationship with God makes us grateful for the blessings we have received. Prayer is the cornerstone of our Lenten journey & is vital to all of our actions in life. Scripture References for Prayer: Zephaniah 3: 17; Joel 2: 1-2; John 16: 33; Philippians 3: 10-11."

"Fasting & Abstinence are old traditions in Judeo-Christian history & early Lenten practice. Found in the Scriptures, they offer a way of growing closer to God. Pope Francis reminds us, "Fasting makes sense if it really chips away at our security and, as a consequence, benefits someone else..." In addition to the above traditional forms, try fasting from social media, technology, gossip & excessive screen time. Fasting reminds us of our hunger for God. See p. 8 for norms for fasting & abstinence. Scripture References for Fasting: Joel 2: 12-14; Isaiah 58: 6-7; Matthew 6: 16-18; Mark 1: 12-15."

"Almsgiving (giving) is a response to God, one that we can come to through prayer & fasting. It is a way to live out our gratitude for all that God has given us, reflecting the realization that we are the Body of Christ, responsible for each other. Justice, mercy & charity are integral elements of our baptism that call us to be disciples of Jesus. Scripture References for Almsgiving: Leviticus 19: 9-10; Proverbs 19: 17; Luke 19: 1-10; Romans 15: 25-28." (Source: Archdiocese of New Orleans' website)

Mark your calendar for the weekend of Feb. 24th-25th & Monday - Wednesday, Feb. 26th-28th for our Parish Lenten Mission. See p. 8 for a fuller explanation of what will occur. Note the extended confessions during the mission & how on Tuesday evening, we will have 5 total priests hearing confessions during Sr. Lisa's 7 pm - 8 pm talk. We figured you can continue to listen to her talk when you are in line for confession. Then you will miss only a brief portion of her talk once you are in confession. Though the priests will stay beyond 8 pm if necessary, we want to get you home ASAP after a long day. Also, see p. 8 for extended confession times all during Lent.

See p. 6 for various online spiritual enrichments to assist you with Lent, as well as some booklets in the narthex. I bring your attention our St. Maximilian day of prayer outside Planned Parenthood on Saturday, March 16th: 7 am - 3 pm. You are asked to sign up for 1 or 2 hour prayer shifts. If you are not able or desire not to travel, you may sign up for a prayer time and pray from your home. See p. 8 for more info. When praying for life, yes pray for the conversion of hearts & minds away from abortion to life. But also pray for the conversion of hearts & minds against all the other travesties & assaults against human life.

I spoke about almsgiving earlier. What about donating the gift of life by donating blood on Sunday, Feb. 25th (see p. 6)? With almsgiving, consider bringing every weekend to Mass at least one or more, non-perishable food item(s) to replenish our food pantry.

Thank you for your attentiveness to my homily last weekend on reaching out to all people, including the marginalized & by making a DSF donation to ensure that occurs. Thank you for all who donated in the past. But I am challenging the many people who do not contribute to DSF. As I stated, the parish will receive this year 50% back from any new donor contributions. If our parish has the highest number of new donors, we will receive a \$5,000 bonus. Last year, we had 407 donors. Let's double or even triple the number of donors this coming year. I realize for many people you are struggling economically. What about sacrificing a certain item & donating that sacrificed amount to DSF, whether is small or larger? See p. 7 on how to donate. As I also stated, let's meet our mandatory DSF amount in pledges or preferably in payments by June 30th.

Let us pray for peace & healing in our world & homes. Let us pray for one another's intentions during this Lent.

TODAY'S READINGS

Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 33: Altar Setup By Fr. Luke Spannagel: Step-by-Step through the Mass

After the Creed and Intercessions, for which we used a standing posture of prayer, we sit down while the preparations for the Liturgy of the Eucharist take place. As the Diocese of Peoria teaches, "Before Jesus sat down with his disciples to celebrate the Last Supper, he instructed that various preparations be made. Preparations such as securing and preparing a room, making bread and purchasing wine all needed to be done before this sacred event could take place. The same is true when we celebrate Mass... Typically, there is music during the preparations—either instrumental, by the choir, or a common hymn. The music at this point should assist in our proximate preparation for the Liturgy of the Eucharist" ("A Study of the Mass," p. 11). Since we are about to participate in the celebration of the Lord's Supper, music can help us be more prayerfully prepared and in the right mindset. Have you ever noticed that songs at this point in the Mass are often slower in tempo and more flowing in words? No doubt, this is to help prepare us for the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Singing and listening

to meditation-type music can help us prepare to pray and meditate on the most beautiful mystery in front of us: Jesus Christ's one perfect sacrifice before the Father is made present to his spouse, the Church, and the bread and the wine are changed into the Body and Blood of Christ.

In complement to the preparation for the people, what about everything the celebrant and the servers are doing in the sanctuary? The General Instruction for the Roman Missal reminds us that certain items are needed for the Liturgy of the Eucharist (GIRM, 117-118). Let's take a quick look at each material:

- 1. Two to six lighted candles
- 2. A **crucifix** on or near the altar (the altar should be covered by a white cloth).
- 3. The Missal (the big red book with all the prayers the priest says). This book contains words in black and red ink. The words in black are the words that the priest says and the words in red are instructions for the priest on what to do (how and where to stand, how to speak, what arm gestures to use, etc.).
- 4. Corporal: This is a square white cloth that is unfolded and placed on the altar. Since it comes from the word meaning body, it makes sense that the Body and Blood of Christ will become present upon this cloth during Mass.
 - 5. Chalice: This special cup is made of precious metals (generally gold-plated or silver-plated) because we use the most precious materials we have to honor Jesus truly there in his most precious Body and Blood.
 - 6. **Purificator:** This is a long and narrower white cloth that is used to wipe the rim of the chalice.
- 7. Paten: This item which looks like a small plate is also generally gold-plated or silver-plated and is used for the large host which the priest holds up during the Eucharistic Prayer. Note: In some places, you might see a deeper gold -plated dish used which is typically called a dish paten.
- 8. Ciborium: This is another gold or silver-plated item that has a matching lid and which holds the smaller hosts. When hosts are reserved in the tabernacle, they are typically kept in a ciborium. There are other materials you might see, depending on the local parish customs:
- · Pall: This is a square white cloth stiffened with cardboard that is used to cover the chalice. This cover prevents flies, insects, dust, etc., from getting into the chalice.
- Chalice veil: This is a cloth cover for the chalice. It not only can protect the chalice when not in use, but it also helps heighten our sense of mystery by "veiling" the chalice from our sight until the time for the Most Blessed Sacrament draws near. Chalice veils can match the color of the priest's vestments or can always be white in color.
- Burse: This "pouch," which often matches the chalice veil/vestments in color, is placed on top of the chalice veil and is used for the keeping of corporals.
- Communion patens: Plates with handles that the servers hold during Communion. These patens are meant to help catch any particles of the Eucharist which may fall from a Host or help to catch a Host which accidentally falls.

As you can see, there are many items we use for the Liturgy of the Eucharist, each with purpose and meaning. No wonder the altar servers sometimes seem to be reviewing a checklist in their minds to make sure we have everything we need! For Reflection:


- 1. Next time you participate in Mass, pay more attention to the preparation of the altar. While remaining prayerful, see if you can identify the materials Father Luke described and see what role each plays as the Liturgy of the Eucharist continues.
- 2. 



Fridays are days of abstinence. Good Friday is day of fast & abstinence. (Canon 1251).

Fasting binds all persons who have completed their 18th birth-day through those who have completed their 59th year, unless prevented by poor health. On days of fast, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's own needs. Eating between meals is not allowed although fluids may be taken. (Canon 1252)

Abstinence binds all persons who have completed their 14th birthday, unless prevented by poor health. (There is no upper age cut off for abstinence as there is for fasting.) On days of abstinence during Lent (Ash Wednesday & Fridays), the consumption of meat of mammals or fowl is not allowed. The Church strongly encourages the observance of Friday abstinence throughout the year, but failure to do so is not regarded as sinful. (Canon 1252)

Penitential Days: The divine law binds all the Christian faithful to do penance each in his or her own way. In order for all to be united among themselves by some common observance of penance, however, penitential days are prescribed on which the Christian faithful devote themselves in a special way to prayer, perform works of piety and charity, and deny themselves by fulfilling their own obligations more faithfully and especially by observing fast and abstinence, ... (Canon 1249). The penitential days and times in the universal Church are every Friday of the whole year & the season of Lent (Canon 1250).




