



SACRAMENT of BAPTISM:

ADULT BAPTISM: Adults who desire to become Catholic will participate in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

INFANT BAPTISM (under the age of 7 years old): We celebrate Infant Baptism on the 2nd Saturday of each month. Parents of infants to be baptized are to attend Baptismal classes, preferably before the child is born. Godparents are encouraged to attend but are not required.

SACRAMENT of CONFIRMATION:

Adults and older youth who have not been Confirmed should contact the parish office.

SACRAMENT of MARRIAGE

Couples who are considering marriage are to contact the parish office, at least six (6) months (preferably earlier) before the couple's projected wedding date.

SACRAMENT of ANOINTING of the SICK:

Any Catholic who is to have surgery due to a serious illness OR whose health is seriously impaired due to a serious illness or old age should be anointed ASAP, preferably before going to the hospital. Contact ASAP a priest to schedule an anointing.

SIGNIFICANCE of BOWING

A bow signifies reverence & honor shown to the names or event being mentioned. We are to do the following:

1) A **bow** of the head is made when the three Divine Persons (the Trinity) are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated.

2) A bow of the body (a profound bow) is made during the Creed with the words "and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man."

Dear Friends in Christ,

Thank you to all of you who participated in the parish Lenten Mission, led by Sr. Lisa Valentini. As she stated, the graces are available for the entire parish, whether you were able to attend or not. We prayed for everyone. Many people were impressed by the "charismatic or faith filled enthusiasm" Sr. Lisa exhibited. Yes, she is a dynamic speaker, but most importantly she is in love with God, and she truly believes God loves each and everyone of us totally & unconditionally. There are no exceptions. Or how 1 John 3:1 states "See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God."

How did I meet Sr. Lisa? She came to my previous assignment to give a financial mission appeal. In doing so, I discovered she gave parish missions, and I asked her to do so in my previous assignment. Well, the same thing occurred here. Sr. Lisa came & spoke this past fall on how her religious community serves the poor in the missions. She was so well received that I asked her if she would return to give our Lenten Mission. She graciously agreed to do so.

Sr. Lisa did not request any "fee" to conduct the Lenten Mission. Instead, she asked for a free will offering for the mission work her religious community, Missionary Sisters of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus offers. They support the "poorest of the poor" with whom Sr. Lisa works when she is on Mission – particularly in the Dominican Republic. Your donations will help to support 2 specific areas: 1) a school for children with special needs in Santo Domingo, which is under the care of the MSC Sisters, & 2) the Mission Parish of St. Francis of Assisi, in the town of El Factor, where each year Sr. Lisa takes several groups of young people as well as Parish groups on Mission Immersion Experiences. In El Factor, the Missionaries spread the message of God's Love to hundreds of children - gathering them for prayer, song and to do Arts & Crafts that help them to hear & understand Bible stories.

If you were not able to donate to this cause, you can still donate by marking your donation specifically to missions by Sr. Lisa. Any checks are to made out to St. Maximilian, and we will forward all such donations to Sr. Lisa.

Last weekend, our 40 youth candidates for the Sacrament of Confirmation joined up with about 30 candidates from St. Michael Church from Needville, TX (near Rosenberg, TX) in a retreat at Camp Kappe near Plantersville, TX. This retreat is in preparation to receive the Sacrament of Confirma-

tion this fall. I was able to join the youth Saturday morning for breakfast, 2 hours of confessions followed by Mass & lunch. Then I returned back to the parish for 3 pm confessions & 5 pm Vigil Mass. In the evening, 2 other priests heard for 1 hour each for the rest of the youth's confessions. I was so impressed how seriously the youth approached confession. They did a serious examination of conscience, reflected on their sins & really desired to do better. It is sad when some people sell our youth short. The youth need to be listened to & ministered to, just like all people! See p. 9 for a group picture of our parish youth retreatants.

Thank you to Chris Wuenscher, our Coordinator of Youth Ministry, who led a core team of 9 adults & 8 youth team members who presented the Confirmation retreat. Thank you also to all the 10 volunteers who came Saturday to cook breakfast, lunch & dinner. I am always amazed & pleased on how many volunteer their time, many of whom do not have any children, on this retreat. They do it to serve the Lord & our parish. Thank you.

Thank you for those who have contributed to DSF so far. Since our youth went to Camp Kappe, just know we as a parish "benefitted" from that facility which is supported by DSF. Camp Kappe Youth Retreat Facility provides quality unique Catholic retreat, camp & school experiences for children, youth & young adults throughout the Archdiocese. Located on 130 acres in Plantersville, TX, Camp Kappe serves as a center for youth retreats, youth camping, spiritual growth programs & the School of Environmental Education (known as S.E.E.). The school fosters environmental studies for 5th grade archdiocesan Catholic School children. All of Camp Kappe programs & activities foster Catholic values & traditions rooted in Christ and guided by the Holy Spirit through Sacred Scripture & Tradition while providing an enriching camp experience. These facilities are available to all parishes, schools & youth groups in the Archdiocese. To donate to DSF, see p. 7.

Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 34: Collection & Procession By Fr. Luke Spannagel: Step-by-Step through the Mass

It's time to pass the basket for the **Offertory**. For many people, the word offertory might make us think simply of the money offerings we place in the collection basket. While that certainly is part of the typical Sunday offertory, this is also an important spiritual moment for uniting ourselves to

the offering on the altar.

The Collection in the Early Church

The practical details of this part of the Mass have looked different at various points in history. In earlier times, the gifts would typically be things that people brought from their homes. People would bring all sorts of food, along with bread and wine, and gifts for the poor (money or otherwise). These *gifts* would all be brought up and then sorted. The bread and wine were used for the Mass, some food and money were given to the priest to provide for him, and the remainder of the food and money were divided up and given to the poor. So, one can see that even in the earliest times, this part of the Mass was about *offering* and *giving*. In our modern day, to simplify the offertory, the ushers collect money. This money still symbolizes our gift: what we give to God for the Mass (bread, wine, candles, etc., are purchased for the

Mass), what we give to provide for the needs of the priest and the upkeep of the church, and what we give to provide for the needs of the poor and those less fortunate. As the ushers prepare to collect the offerings, we can take a look at our lives, all that we have, all that the Lord has provided for us. We can show our gratitude and thank the Lord by offering a portion of what we have back to him for the good of the Church and others.

Along with the collection, the bread and wine (and water in some places) are brought forward, just as in the days of the early Church. Around the year 150 A.D., St. Justin Martyr describes

d of the state of

this part of the Mass by saying simply: "bread, water, and wine are brought" (*Understanding the Mass*, p. 109). The gifts are brought forward by members of the faithful. Whether it is the ushers, family members who requested the Mass intention, or other parishioners, whoever brings the gifts forward represents the whole congregation, bringing forth our offerings to God.

An Offering of Spiritual Gifts

As we think about our practical or material gifts during this part of the Mass, we should not overlook the opportunity to also offer spiritual gifts. Mother Teresa of Calcutta was known for asking priests to leave room on the paten for her intentions. One priest also recalled her saying that she would place her heart on the paten so that it would be near Jesus in the Mass. If we think about this part of the Mass, offering the gifts we have in thanksgiving to God and in union with Jesus, it is true that one of the best offerings we can make is ourselves! Along these lines, Charles Belmonte teaches, "Together with Christ, we offer everything that we are and all that we possess, all that we have done or try to do. We offer our memory, intelligence, and will; our family, profession, hobbies, success, sufferings, failures, and worries; and our aspirations, [joys and hopes], and spiritual communions. Likewise, we offer our small and big mortifications: all those acts of love we performed yesterday and as many as we plan to perform today" (*Understanding the Mass*, p. 110).

If you haven't thought about the offertory in this way before, I encourage you to think about including your personal spiritual offering along with whatever you drop in the basket. It certainly is a great way to join to the prayers the priest offers at the altar spiritually and a great way to deepen our unity with the perfect offering of Jesus!



For Reflection:

- 1. Respond to Father Luke's invitation by considering what spiritual offering(s) you will offer at the next Mass in which you participate.
- 2. At least once a year, take time to reflect on the portion of your material or financial wealth you give during the Offertory. Compare this offering to various expenses in your life. Ask Jesus to help you identify what you can generously give. In addition to your financial offering, consider how Jesus may be inviting you to give of yourself to parish life in other ways.
- 3. Have you ever been privileged to represent the congregation by bringing forward the gifts during the offertory procession? Thank God for that experience. If not, pray about the opportunity to do so and inquire at your parish about how you can participate in the offertory procession.



In many Eastern European countries, it's a tradition to have a basket of food blessed on Holy Saturday. The roots of this tradition date back to the early 12th century history of Poland. This



Catholic ritual has been cherished for centuries among many families. It has now been adopted by people of all ethnic backgrounds who enjoy this richly symbolic custom. More information will be coming soon about this tradition.

Fridays are days of abstinence. Good Friday is day of fast & abstinence. (Canon 1251).

Fasting binds all persons who have completed their 18th birth-day through those who have completed their 59th year, unless prevented by poor health. On days of fast, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's own needs. Eating between meals is not allowed although fluids may be taken. (Canon 1252)

Abstinence binds all persons who have completed their 14th birthday, unless prevented by poor health. (There is no upper age cut off for abstinence as there is for fasting.) On days of abstinence during Lent (Ash Wednesday & Fridays), the consumption of meat of mammals or fowl is not allowed. The Church strongly encourages the observance of Friday abstinence throughout the year, but failure to do so is not regarded as sinful. (Canon 1252)

Penitential Days: The divine law binds all the Christian faithful to do penance each in his or her own way. In order for all to be united among themselves by some common observance of penance, however, penitential days are prescribed on which the Christian faithful devote themselves in a special way to prayer, perform works of piety and charity, and deny themselves by fulfilling their own obligations more faithfully and especially by observing fast and abstinence, ... (Canon 1249). The penitential days and times in the universal Church are every Friday of the whole year & the season of Lent (Canon 1250).
