

SACRAMENT of BAPTISM:

ADULT BAPTISM: Adults who desire to become Catholic will participate in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

INFANT BAPTISM (under the age of 7 years old): We celebrate Infant Baptism on the 2nd Saturday of each month. Parents of infants to be baptized are to attend Baptismal classes, preferably before the child is born. Godparents are encouraged to attend but are not required.

SACRAMENT of CONFIRMATION:

Adults and older youth who have not been Confirmed should contact the parish office.

SACRAMENT of MARRIAGE

Couples who are considering marriage are to contact the parish office, at least six (6) months (preferably earlier) before the couple's projected wedding date.

SACRAMENT of ANOINTING of the SICK:

Any Catholic who is to have surgery due to a serious illness OR whose health is seriously impaired due to a serious illness or old age should be anointed ASAP, preferably before going to the hospital. Contact ASAP a priest to schedule an anointing.

SIGNIFICANCE of BOWING

A bow signifies reverence & honor shown to the names or event being mentioned. We are to do the following:

1) A **bow** of the head is made when the three Divine Persons (the Trinity) are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated.

2) A bow of the body (a profound bow) is made during the Creed with the words "and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man."

—General Instruction to the Roman Missal, #275

March 10, 2024 - Laetare (Rejoice) Sunday

Dear Friends in Christ,

The 4th Sunday of Lent is known as *Laetare* (Rejoice) Sunday, coming from the entrance antiphon, "Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning; exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast" (cf. Is. 66:10-11). Just like on the 3rd Sunday of Advent, known as *Gaudete* (Rejoice) Sunday, we may wear rose colored vestments if the parish has such vestments and the celebrant so chooses. These are the only 2 Sundays of the year we may wear such vestments. Notice how the bulletin reflects the liturgical color of the year.

How is Lent unfolding? Even if our Lenten sacrifices have not been lived out as fully as one desires, do not get discouraged. We can start afresh today. Do not beat yourself up over the past, but try to live today for God.

The question always arises "Does our fasting in Lent also include fasting on Sundays?" Officially, the answer is "no." Lent includes 40 days, not counting the 6 Sundays of Lent. Lent reminds us Jesus being in the desert for 40 days. The 6 Sundays of Lent are not considered by the Church as days of Lenten Fast, though they are days of the Lenten Season. Why? Every Sunday is considered a "small Easter Sunday" since it commemorates the Resurrection of Jesus. The Church does not oblige us to fast on Sundays. Choosing to continue your Lenten sacrifice can be your personal choice. Though we are not obliged to fast on Sunday, that does not mean we should over-indulge on Sundays, just like we should not be feasting on gourmet or luxurious seafood on days of abstinence on Ash Wednesday & Good Friday and on Fridays of Lent.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends officially on Holy Thursday evening with the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper. But the Lenten fasting continues through Holy Saturday, making the 40 days. With Holy Thursday evening, we begin the Sacred Triduum, the high 3 holy days through Easter Sunday.

I want to highlight that we will have the traditional blessing of the Easter baskets or food on Holy Saturday, March 30th in the chapel at 9 am. For many Eastern European countries, it's a tradition to have a basket of food blessed on Holy Saturday. This Catholic ritual has been cherished for centuries among many families. It has now been adopted by people of all ethnic backgrounds who enjoy this richly symbolic custom. What goes into a food basket depends on the family's preferences. Typical foods are bread, ham, sausage,

butter, decorated eggs, wine, but can be any food that will be used on Easter Sunday to break the paschal fast of the Easter weekend. Decorate a food basket or simply bring your Easter food to be blessed and start a family tradition!

Thank you to the Catholic Daughters (CDA) for sponsoring the St. Joseph's Altar & spaghetti dinner last weekend. All proceeds go to charity. Continue to support the KC's with their remaining Lenten Friday Fish dinners with the CDA's providing the desserts. The last fish dinner is on Friday, March 22nd. On Fridays, we have 7 pm Stations of the Cross, with confessions available 6:30 pm-7:30 pm. Yes, confessions are heard during the Stations. Invite others to come to confessions, stations & the fish dinner.

Graduating high school seniors: are you aware the Knights of Columbus & the Catholic Daughters of America offer college scholarships? The deadline is April 1st. Please see p. 9 for more info. Proceeds from the KC & CDA's fund raisers help fund these scholarships.

For those grieving the loss of a loved one, this Sunday we begin a Consolation ministry. See p. 9 for more info.

Please sign up for 1 or 2 hour shifts for Saturday, March 16th at Planned Parenthood—see p. 8. We will pray for an end to abortions & for assistance with life, especially with challenging pregnancies. This is all so crucial since France added in the past week to their constitution a "guaranteed freedom" to abort an unborn child. This was approved by an overwhelming 780-72 vote by the French government leadership, accompanied by a standing ovation when the result was announced as the parliament met in Versailles. Several opinion polls indicate that as many as 80% of the French population supposedly supported this vote.

The French Bishops' Conference called for "fasting & prayer." They said: "As Catholics, we must continue to serve life from conception to death, to be artisans of respect for every human being, which is always a gift given to all others, and to support those who choose to keep their child even in difficult circumstances." The Pontifical Academy for Life, the Vatican body which focuses on issues related to bioethics, said in a statement that "in the era of universal human rights, there can be no 'right' to take human life."

Since 1982, much of the costs of abortions are paid for by the French social security system which allows women in France to access abortion free of charge. In 2022, there were over 234,000 abortions for 723,000 births in France, the highest number of abortions since 1990 and the highest number among European Union countries.

Pray for life in all stages of life & the protection of life.

TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading: Judah's betrayal of faith led to their exile as Babylon destroyed Jerusalem & the temple. God's warnings were ignored, resulting in captivity. Fulfilling Jeremiah's prophecy, the exile lasted until Cyrus of Persia decreed the rebuilding of the temple, marking the beginning of the return. (2 Chr 36:14-23)

Psalm: In Babylon's captivity, we wept for Zion, unable to sing our sacred songs in a foreign land. Forgetting Jerusalem would be my greatest loss, my joy silenced without its memory. (Ps 137)

Second Reading: God, in His mercy, made us alive with Christ, saving us by grace through faith, not by our deeds, to display His grace in Christ. We are created for good works, predestined by God. (Eph 2:4-10)

Gospel: Jesus has a conversation with Nicodemus & references Moses lifting up the serpent in the wilderness as a foreshadowing of his own crucifixion & the salvation that it would bring. Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 35: Offertory Water and Wine By Fr. Luke Spannagel: Step-by-Step through the Mass

As we continue through the **Offertory**, this time we take a closer look at some of the prayers at the altar as the bread and wine are placed there. After the bread and wine are brought forward, they are placed on the altar by the priest (or a deacon if there is one present). Then the priest, speaking either silently or aloud, says the prayers over the bread and wine. These are the prayers that begin, "Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation, for through your goodness we have

received the bread we offer you: fruit of the earth and work of human hands, it will become for us the bread of life."

You may also recognize the prayer as the priest holds the chalice: "Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation, for through your goodness we have received the wine we offer you: fruit of the vine and work of human hands, it will become our spiritual drink." As the Diocese of Peoria reminds us, "If there is no music playing, [the priest] may do this out loud. In this case, we



would respond to these prayers by saying, 'Blessed be God forever!' These prayers are ancient and have profound meaning. We place before him in our procession 'our' gifts, yet in these formulas we immediately admit that while they are 'work of human hands' they are still ultimately from God. For this reason, we bless God for his goodness and ask him to accept and transform the gifts into 'bread of life' and 'spiritual drink'" (A Study of the Mass, p. 11).

The Mystery of the Water and Wine

As the priest is preparing the wine, the Diocese of Peoria continues, "notice that he places a small amount of water into the chalice with the wine. As he does this he says: 'By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity.' The Church maintains this very ancient custom of mixing water and wine as it uniquely symbolizes what we pray for. At the Mass, we offer our lives in union with Christ. In all our weakness, in all our smallness, we pray to be inseparably united to the divine. The small drops of water symbolize us. As the water becomes inseparably united to the wine, we pray we may become inseparably united to Jesus Christ" ("A Study of the Mass," p. 11–12).

Along these lines, Charles Belmonte teaches, "It was ancient custom to take the wine mixed with water, which the chalice of Jesus in the Last Supper contained. The Church retained this gesture to symbolize the sanctification of the Christian which is accomplished through his union with Jesus Christ. The water becomes the symbol of ourselves: our lives, with our weaknesses. Have you stopped to think what happens to the drops of water mixed with the wine?



They are absorbed by it and then become inseparable from it. So does Jesus absorb us. The drops of water are of negligible worth; they are not even enough to quench anyone's thirst. Yet they will end up being divine blood! And all that because they let themselves be mixed with the wine and be dissolved in it, thus manifesting self-denial, personal renunciation. At this moment, we grow in our desire to offer ourselves in total self-surrender, as the few drops of water in the chalice have reminded us. So, we will be able to become one with Jesus Christ after the Consecration" (*Understanding the Mass*, p. 114).

An Opportunity for Personal Prayer

What a meaningful moment in this part of the Mass! A transition time in the Mass that could be easily missed, these brief prayers sometimes said silently provide a great invitation for prayer:

Jesus, help my heart to unite more perfectly with yours. I feel at times so far from you, but you give of yourself so that I have this opportunity to be more closely united with you. Help me to be attentive in this moment and bring my heart joy from knowing you will soon be truly present on the altar, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity, in the Eucharist!


For Reflection:

- 1. Make Father Luke's prayer above your own as you participate more fully in the Liturgy of the Eucharist.
- 2. Next time you participate in Mass, pay close attention to the preparation of the chalice and the mixing of water and wine. Make an act of faith, trusting that Jesus can and will receive all you offer him and transform your weakness into strength by his divine power.


