



SACRAMENT of BAPTISM:

ADULT BAPTISM: Adults who desire to become Catholic will participate in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

INFANT BAPTISM (under the age of 7 years old): We celebrate Infant Baptism on the 2nd Saturday of each month. Parents of infants to be baptized are to attend Baptismal classes, preferably before the child is born. Godparents are encouraged to attend but are not required.

SACRAMENT of CONFIRMATION:

Adults and older youth who have not been Confirmed should contact the parish office.

SACRAMENT of MARRIAGE

Couples who are considering marriage are to contact the parish office, at least six (6) months (preferably earlier) before the couple's projected wedding date.

SACRAMENT of ANOINTING of the SICK:

Any Catholic who is to have surgery due to a serious illness OR whose health is seriously impaired due to a serious illness or old age should be anointed ASAP, preferably before going to the hospital. Contact ASAP a priest to schedule an anointing.

SIGNIFICANCE of BOWING

A bow signifies reverence & honor shown to the names or event being mentioned. We are to do the following: 1) A **bow** of the head is made when the three Divine Persons (the Trinity) are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and of the Saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated.

2) A bow of the body (a profound bow) is made during the Creed with the words "and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man." —General Instruction to the Roman Missal, #275

Each year, I re-run an explanation of what occurs during Holy Week as a refresher. We begin Holy Week, the most holy of all weeks, when we remember the Paschal Mystery: the suffering, death, resurrection & ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ. Make this Holy Week truly special & holy, different by not only attending the liturgies but striving to pray more & to live out more fully the great commandments to love God, neighbor & self. On Passion/Palm Sunday, we commemorate Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem by hearing the passion according to Matthew.

At the 7 pm Chrism Mass on Tuesday, March 26 at the Co -Cathedral of the Sacred Heart, Cardinal DiNardo will bless the Oil of the Sick (used in the Anointing of the Sick) & Oil of Catechumens (used to anoint individuals prior to Baptism). The Cardinal will consecrate the Chrism Oil. All 3 oils consist of olive oil. But only the Chrism Oil has the fragrant perfume of balsam, symbolizing the sweetness of Christ. The Chrism Oil is used at Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Orders (both for priesthood & the episcopate but not for the diaconate) & the dedication of a new church and/or new altar. These 3 oils will be brought to each parish & they will be presented here at the 7 pm Holy Thursday Mass. Since Fr. Lawrence & some of the deacons will be at the Chrism Mass, there will be no 6:30 pm Mass on Tuesday, March 26 at St. Maximilian (and no confessions prior to that Mass).



The Sacred Triduum

With the 7 pm Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, we enter the Easter Triduum—3 high holy days that conclude with evening vespers on Easter Sunday. The Church advises us not to have any Masses until the evening on Holy Thursday. At 7 pm, we remember Jesus' example of service when He washed the feet of his 12 apostles in the Gospel. In the Roman Missal, the washing of the feet is an option, not mandatory. But the Gospel mandate is that we all are called to serve one another. We remember the institution of the Eucharist & the ordained priesthood. We keep watch until midnight, praying before the Blessed Sacrament in Kolbe Hall. Can you spend at least one hour in prayer, spending time before the Lord?

There will be 8:30 am Morning Prayer in the Chapel on Holy Thursday, Good Friday & Holy Saturday. 9 am Holy Saturday: Blessing of Easter Baskets of Food in the Chapel



On Good Friday, we have the 3 pm Liturgy of Friday of the Passion of the Lord. This liturgy has 3 main components: 1) the Liturgy of the Word with the reading of the Passion from the Gospel of John; 2) the Veneration of the Cross: everyone is asked to venerate the cross with some sign of reverence: a kiss, touching the cross, a genuflection or bow, etc. But the Roman Missal does allow a "corporate" veneration of the cross from the pews; 3) Distribution of Holy Communion that was consecrated the evening before on Holy Thursday. Good **Friday** is the only day of the year that Mass is not offered.

Good Friday is a day of fast & abstinence (See p. 6).



On Holy Saturday, we have the great Easter Vigil that begins at 8:30 pm since the Church insists that this liturgy does not begin prior to nightfall. There is no 5 pm Saturday Vigil Mass this Saturday only. This liturgy consists of 4 parts: 1) A Service of Light with the lighting of the new Paschal Candle & singing of the *Exultet*, the Easter Proclamation; 2) Liturgy of the Word with scripture readings reminding us of salvation history, with the sung Gospel Alleluia returning after its Lenten absence; 3) Reception into the Church either through Baptism or non-Catholic Christians joining the Church. Also baptized Catholics will receive Confirmation & Eucharist; and 4) Liturgy of the Eucharist. At the end of the Easter Vigil, a final blessing & dismissal is given, unlike at the end of Holy Thursday & Good Friday. On Easter Sunday, we have our normal Mass times (8 & 10 am; 12 Noon).

Make every effort to enter into this most Holy Week.

TODAY'S READINGS

Procession: As Jesus neared Jerusalem, He sent disciples to fetch a colt, instructing them on how to respond if questioned. Successfully bringing the colt to Jesus, they prepared it for Him. Entering Jerusalem, Jesus was greeted exuberantly by crowds laying cloaks & branches before Him, acclaiming Him with shouts of "Hosanna" & recognizing Him as the herald of God's kingdom, fulfilling a messianic prophecy & symbolizing His kingship in a humble manner. (Mk 11:1-10)

First reading: Endowed with the gift of speech by God, I encourage the weary & listen to His teaching daily. Despite suffering, I stand firm, supported by God, confident in facing humiliation without shame. (Is 50:4-7)

Psalm: In my deepest despair, scorned & wounded, I feel abandoned. Yet, I call for God's swift aid, promising to proclaim His greatness to those who suffer, urging them to praise & honor Him. (Ps 22)

Second Reading: Christ, though divine, embraced humility, becoming human & obeying to the point of death on a cross. Consequently, God elevated Him, ensuring every being honors Jesus as Lord, glorifying God the Father. (Phil 2:6-11)

Gospel: Jesus' final days were marked by betrayal, the Last Supper, & teachings on readiness. After being betrayed by Judas, Jesus faced trials, denial by Peter, & crucifixion. His death on the cross, amidst mockery, fulfilled prophecies & demonstrated profound love. Buried by Joseph of Arimathea, Jesus' sacrifice offered hope beyond death, emphasizing redemption & eternal life for humanity. (Mk 14:1-15:47)

Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 37: Silent, Humble, Contrite By Fr. Luke Spannagel: Step-by-Step through the Mass

As we continue our walk through the **Offertory** of the Mass, have you ever noticed that sometimes the priest is saying something you can't hear (or can barely hear)? As we have reflected on previously,

there are moments in the Mass—such as before proclaiming the Gospel—where the priest prays a prayer silently or quietly. These prayers are to prepare the priests (or deacons) for what comes next; they provide a moment of reflection for the priest and open his heart. Another one of these quiet prayers happens after the offering of bread and wine during the Offertory. We offer ourselves...



After placing the bread and wine on the altar, the priest bows and says quietly, "With humble spirit and contrite heart may we be accepted by you, O Lord, and may our sacrifice in your sight this day be pleasing to you, Lord God." As the Diocese of Peoria explains, "In this prayer, the priest silently speaks in his own name and on behalf of all the faithful, asking that God accept the sacrifice and find us in humility and contrition" (A Study of the Mass, p. 12). The priest acknowledges the truth about how much we need God and that we at times fall short of living up to his standards. With that mindset, the priest is asking God to accept us and the sacrifice as we are, not faulty Christians who have given up and thrown in the towel, but honest Christians who admit our shortcomings and yet strive toward that perfection to which God calls us.

Reflecting on this prayer, Edward Sri invites us: "Notice how the sacrifice envisioned in this prayer is not some *thing* being offered to God, like bread and wine, but the people assembled: 'May we be accepted by you...' This theme, as well as the mention of a humble spirit and contrite heart, recalls the petition of the three Hebrew men thrown in the fiery furnace in

Daniel [Chapter 3]" (A Biblical Walk Through the Mass, p. 90). If you have read this interesting story, you know that these three faithful men would not worship a false image made of gold by King Nebuchadnezzar. As punishment, they were thrown into a burning furnace, heated seven times more than normal. Instead of burning, the three men walked around unharmed and began singing a long hymn of praise to God. This hymn praises God for his goodness, recalls the many blessings he has given to his people, and then asks every part of creation to sing praise to God. Just before this last part, the three men say to God that they offer all they have (which is themselves) and ask him to accept them as if they were providing the best offering one could imagine (tens of thousands of rams, bulls, and fat lambs).

... and receive God himself.

Our prayer in the Mass, which echoes the prayer of the three faithful men, works in a very similar way. We have just said to God that we offer him the gifts of bread and wine, which are not much even by human standards. Along with the bread and wine, we have ourselves

to offer, and we all know that sometimes we are not very worthy offerings to God either. Yet, we ask God to accept what we offer as if it were good and pleasing to him. And what is God's response? For the last 2000 years of Masses, no matter how big or small the congregation, no matter how strong or how weak their faith, no matter how worthy (or unworthy) we think our offerings are, God accepts them. As if that weren't enough, God in his love and generosity does something unbelievable with our meager offerings. He changes them into the very Body and Blood of Jesus Christ! God accepts the bread and wine from us and gives us back the gift of himself! What a generous exchange! What a great God we have!

For Reflection: 1. Reflect on Daniel 3 and pray with the words of the three young men in the fiery furnace.

2. This prayer at the conclusion of the Offertory was at one time called the "Secret." Consider these words from the Book of Tobit: "A king's secret should be kept secret, but one must declare the works of God and give thanks with due honor" (Tob 12:7, 11). Reflect on the intimate values you hold in "sacred silence" within your own heart. Allow this sense of reverence & wonder at God's generosity to inspire how you participate in the Offertory prayer at Mass.



Join other Catholics in a walking procession to pray the Way (Stations) of the Cross, beginning at 10:15 am at the Chapel of St. Basil at the University of St. Thomas & ending up at the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart. There will be 5 different stations along the way with Scripture readings & a homily.



Good Friday is day of fast & abstinence. (Canon 1251)

Fasting binds all persons who have completed their 18th birthday through those who have completed their 59th year, unless prevented by poor health. On days of fast, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's own needs. Eating between meals is not allowed although fluids may be taken. (Canon 1252)

<u>Abstinence</u> binds all persons who have completed their 14th birthday, unless prevented by poor health. (<u>There is no upper</u> age cut off for abstinence as there is for fasting.) On days of abstinence (Good Friday) the consumption of meat of mammals or fowl is not allowed. The Church strongly encourages the observance of Friday abstinence throughout the year, but failure to do so is not regarded as sinful. (Canon 1252)

Penitential Days: The divine law binds all the Christian faithful to do penance each in his or her own way. In order for all to be united among themselves by some common observance of penance, however, penitential days are prescribed on which the Christian faithful devote themselves in a special way to prayer, perform works of piety and charity, and deny themselves by fulfilling their own obligations more faithfully and especially by observing fast and abstinence, ... (Canon 1249). The penitential days and times in the universal Church are every Friday of the whole year & the season of Lent (Canon 1250).




