Confirmation Class of 2021 Patron Saints Sunday, April 11, 2021

Austin (St. Joseph) Bjerk



I chose St. Joseph as my saint. St. Joseph is the patron saint of workers, fathers, carpenters and civil engineers to name a few. He is also a saint of hesitation and a saint against doubt. I've prayed to St. Joseph to help me with any doubts with decisions that are hard for me to make. I also look up to St. Joseph because he was a wonderful role model and stepped up unconditionally to fill in the role of "foster" father to Jesus. Since I am looking into a career of either an electrician or plumber, I feel St. Joseph would help guide me in any kind of work I do pursue. St. Joseph's feast day is March 19.

Zachary (St. Dunstan of Canterbury) Dufault



Saint Dunstan of Canterbury lived from AD 909 or 919 to May 988. He was the patron saint of Blacksmiths, Goldsmiths, Locksmiths, Silversmiths, Musicians, and of bell ringers. In his lifetime he became an English Bishop, he was successively Abbot of Glastonbury Abbey, Bishop of Worcester, Bishop of London, and Archbishop of Canterbury. And later was canonized as a Saint. His work had changed the English Church. He began to rebuild the abbey. He also established Benedictine monasticism at Glastonbury. He also reformed the church and had restored monastic life in England. In his life, there have been stories of St. Dunstan outsmarting or making a deal with the Devil to leave an area and to never return again.

Catie (St. Drogo) Erickson



Saint Drogo (or Dreux, Drugo, Druron) was born on March 14th, 1105, in Epinoy, Flanders and on April 16th, 1186, he died in Sebourg, France. His feast day is April 16th, and he is known as the patron saint of shepherds, coffee, and the ugly. When he was born, his mother died. The reason for her death was revealed to him, and it had an emotional impact on him. He took responsibility for his actions. He went to severe penances later in life, probably to alleviate his remorse. When Drogo was a teenager, he was orphaned. He gave up all of his possessions at the age of eighteen and became a penitential pilgrim. He visited Rome about nine or ten times as a pilgrim. For about six years, he worked as a shepherd in Sebourg, near Valenciennes, where he was employed by Elizabeth de l'Haire. Drogo was said to be able to bi-locate, or be physically present, in two separate locations at the same time. Witnesses claimed to have seen Drogo employed in fields and attending Mass every Sunday.

He was diagnosed with an unsightly bodily ailment while on a pilgrimage. He became so horribly deformed that the townspeople were afraid of him. When he was in his twenties, a cell was built for him to shield the village's inhabitants from his appearance. His cell was constructed next to his church because he was so holy. Except for a small window from which he received the Eucharist and obtained his food, St. Drogo remained in his cell with no human interaction. He remained there for the rest of his life, roughly forty years, subsisting solely on barley, water, and the holy Eucharist.

Justin (Saint Raphael the Archangel) Solie



I chose the patron saint of healing, the blind, travelers, nurses, and physicians. Saint Raphael the Archangel! I chose this saint because I would like to pursue the medical field when I go to college and become a doctor in some division. Saint Raphael the Archangel was one of the 7 archangels; he was the angel who moved the waters of the healing sheep pool. His feast day is September 29th Another reason I chose this saint because we are in the middle of a global pandemic and healing is what our world needs right now especially through these stressful times that are occurring right now.
