Introduction to the Liturgy

Today, having reached the halfway point of Lent, we celebrate the Laetare Sunday. This Latin word, pronounced lay-TAR-ray, means "rejoice." We rejoice in the knowledge that the cross does not end in death, that Jesus' story does not end in the tomb. The Church also celebrates the second scrutiny today, a significant step for catechumens but also an opportunity for all of us to look into our hearts for the sinful habits and tendencies we may not even see. In today's Gospel, Jesus heals a blind man. More significantly, he can heal our blindness to sin as well.

Let us rejoice!

Refresher on the Rules of Fasting & Abstinence During Lent 2023


Abstinence: All who have celebrated their 14th birthday are bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.

Fasting: Everyone, from the celebration of their 18th birthday to their 59th birthday, is bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fasting means eating only one full meal each day. Two other partial meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken; but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids are allowed.

Almsgiving: Catholics are encouraged to support generously the charitable works of the whole Church: through regular stewardship to their parish, support of charities, and their generous response to the diocesan Catholic Stewardship Appeal.

Prayer: To deepen one's love for Christ, Catholics are urged to participate in the sacramental life of the Church during Lent by attending daily Mass and frequenting the sacrament of Reconciliation.

Reconciliation Monday: Lent is also a privileged time for celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation. On Monday, April 3rd, 3:00—8:00 pm, Father Evers will be available for anyone wishing to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation before Easter.



The Chosen is a TV series based on biblical events surrounding the ministry years of Jesus Christ after His baptism by John the Baptist and His 40 days in the desert. The first season of this series covers the beginning of Jesus' ministry up until His encounter with a Samaritan woman at the well (John 4:4-29). The Chosen takes liberties with artistic imagination and dialogue to present a backstory of some of the characters which helps add to the significance of the biblical events even though it's fictitious. The series provides a fresh perspective on familiar biblical characters and presents an inspiring yet entertaining story. PUT PREVENTION INTO PRACTICE

MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS EDUCATION and AWARENESS MONTH

Multiple sclerosis, or MS, is a disease of the central nervous system that can cause symptoms throughout the body ranging from difficulty walking to bladder dysfunction to changes in memory and thinking abilities. MS is believed to be an autoimmune condition, in which the immune system mistakenly attacks the myelin sheath that normally protects nerve fibers in the brain, spinal cord, and optic nerve. As the myelin sheath is gradually destroyed, the resulting scar tissue (sclerosis) disrupts the electrical impulses between the brain and other parts of the body. It's not clear what causes the onset of this immune reaction, although recent research points to infection with the Epstein-Barr virus as a likely trigger. And while there are treatments that can slow the progression of MS, there is no cure. (Source: https://www.everydayhealth.com/multiple-sclerosis/awareness-month)

The campaign seeks to raise awareness about including people with developmental disabilities in all facets of community life.
